# Outstanding Concert

## as season's opener

(The following was written especially for an outstanding concert by the director of music for P.E.I.)

The Community Concert Association is to be congratulated on their luck or good judgment in securing the services of the Societa Corelli, a chamber orchestra of twelve strings and a continuo, for an outstanding concert on Wednesday night.

This concert was the first of the new season, and also the first Community Concert to be held in the Confederation Theatre.

To most music-lovers Italy is thought of pre-eminently as the land of opera. True enough, in the latter part of the eighteenth century down to very recent years opera has been the main preoccupation of Italian musicians. In Italy itself the opera is almost as popular as football among all classes of society.

Yet before this intense specialization set in Italy led the world for over three hundred years in all branches of music.

The grand Italian tradition of instrumental music, of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries formed the main stream of musical development until the rise of the German tradition. The only serious contenders in this period were the French, and even they were led by Lully, an Italian by birth.

The music of Italy is saturated in the tradition of Corelli, and this made him more of a cosmopolitan, musically speaking, than Bach or Vivaldi.

This chamber orchestra gave a very fine disciplined performance throughout the evening. Tradition, once again tradition - says that chamber music stops at the magic number of nine. Anything above that number becomes an orchestra.

At the same time, this group played more as a chamber group than as an orchestra. The very fact that they dispensed with a conductor was significant. I might also mention that they scarcely ever returned their instruments except at intermission, and yet their intonation was beyond reproach.

The Corelli Corentino Grosso which opened the programme was a noble piece of work, and played with meticulous attention to style. The penultimate movement, a fugato, was rich and satisfying, reminding one of two other works, the Grieg of the Bach B minor Mass and the William Byrd Golden Canon "Non nobis, Domine", which both use the same motif.

Mirella Zucorini gave a sparkling performance of the Haydn D major piano concerto. It is not Haydn at his greatest, perhaps, but Haydn is always interesting, even when he is not working at full pressure.

The Suite from Puccini's Gelizzer contains the theme that Benjamin Britten put in the last summer play by the National Youth Orchestra.

The nearabilities of Puccini's false relations are appreciated by the young men of the orchestra, and even they were led by Lully, an Italian by birth.

The Chamber Orchestra of the G minor is a fine and happy work, and I was very lucky to make my first acquaintance with it. The orchestra played with authority and feeling.

This chamber orchestra gave a good mood the Sinfonia Concertante of Beethoven was chosen. This is a pleasing work with some interesting contrasts of violin and cello timbres. Some of the accuracy and precision of Beethoven is a Haydn without the wit and the flashes of deep insight of that master.

Summing up, this was a very fine concert by a group of the finest musicians that could be had to have the privilege of bearing alive. Arrivederci!
