HOME MANUFACTURE AGAIN. Believing as they do in home made goods, when Messrs. Mark Wright & Co. wanted a funeral car, they gave the order to Messrs. Melvin Bros. of this city. A few days ago this car made its first appearance on our streets. It is built after the latest American pattern, and is pronounced by competent judges to be the finest funeral car in Canada. The lines of the car are all straight. Four handsomely carved columns support the top, the sides are enclosed with half-inch polished glass with two-inch beveled edges. There are beautifully carved brass set on each corner immediately over the columns. The top rises towards the centre where stands a centre piece twenty-six inches high of handsome design and elegant carving. The driver's seat is entirely covered with a Hammercloth, neatly draped and fringed with heavy black silk bullion fringe. The interior is finished in quarter oak, the curtains are of heavy plaid broadcloth edged with deep silk fringe and large tassels. At each side of the bottom are heavy silver rails to protect the glass. The platform gears are of the latest pattern used, and the s at handles, rails, t glass board, and other trimmings are very heavy and all of silver. The carvings, mounting, glass and trappings were supplied by the owners. The carriage work and painting is of the highest order and is a credit to Messrs. Melvin Bros., who are fast making a world wide reputation for superior work in their line. It is pleasing to know that such work can be produced at home, and we congratulate both the owners and the makers. We are told that the American price of car of this kind is \$1,200, while the cost of this one was something under \$1,000. This is a fact worth noting.

NEWS NOTES. This year has been a record breaker for visitors to Stratford-on-Avon. The attempts of an American speculator to purchase Ann Hathaway's cottage for the Chicago Exhibition sent a constant crash of tourists to Stratford and the pretty village of Shrottery. The Shakespeare trustees will know better in future than to giving up such a paying investment.

During the year ending June, 1894, there was an increase of £795,000 in ordinary bank deposits in Ireland, £216,000 more in the savings bank, and £292,000 more paid as interest on Government securities. The liberals say the advance of prosperity is due to the conciliatory policy of the present Government. The Unionists say the reason is to be found in the fact that the prospects of Home rule are fading away into nothingness.

Royal commissioners sometimes get answers they do not expect. Lord Carrington, an English peer, is at the head of a commission appointed by the Gladstone Government to enquire into the Welsh land question. He asked a Welsh farmer what, in his opinion, was the cause of the agricultural depression. "Well," said the farmer, in my opinion, it's the Liberal Government. I have noticed that whenever a Liberal Government is in the farmers have had times." After that Lord Carrington let the farmer alone.

In England railway travelling is gradually being reformed on the improved system that prevails on this continent. The small boxes of compartments are giving place to roomy cars; there are sleepers on some of the night expresses and dining cars on some of the best day trains. The three classes are being reduced to two, and the second class, the emblem of English respectable mediocrity, is fast disappearing. Nearly everybody "travels third" now-a-days. The American system of checking baggage is beginning to be held, and altogether, though there is nothing like the ease of mind and body to be found in travelling on this side of the water, there are signs of improvement.
