

Vocal Solos And Choruses Yesterday At High School

Patricia Leightizer of Charlottetown received 86 marks for her singing in the Girls' solo class yesterday. It was the highest mark of the morning and afternoon session at Queen Charlotte High School. Said Mr. Kilburn: "This young lady showed good technique and has imagination and flair for this piece. I am disappointed that few of the girls caught the dream intent of their piece, 'Cloud Shadows'."

Mr. Kilburn was emphatic while speaking about the Festival and the idea of it to the young artists. "If you enter with only one thought to win I suggest that you stay away. The idea is to learn, of course from the adjudicators and the other participants and naturally to do one's best. But to win, No."

Said Mr. Mitchell during the afternoon session: "Some excellent group singing has been done today by the Model, Parkdale and Montague School. The competition was keen and the spread of marks not very broad. This is always a good thing since it is a sign of healthy competition and a generally even standard of achievement among the entrants."

In the class for School choruses in French, unison, the highest marks for the afternoon were made by the East Royalty and Montague Schools who tied for first place with 85 marks. "Unison singing is the hardest to do and for an English speaking class to do so well is a credit to themselves and their teachers," said the adjudicator.

Festival Results Yesterday At Prince Of Wales College

The 40 young ladies and gentlemen who have been playing the piano since the last music festival took most of the spotlight at Prince of Wales College yesterday morning. There were three firsts and two seconds awarded by Mr. Blackford in this class. He commended them for their technical abilities as beginners.

In the class for rural pupils 12 years and under two firsts were given and two seconds. In the piano solo class for 13 years and over Eileen MacInnis, Tracadie Cross, and Bonnie MacLean of Souris, tied for first place with a mark of 80.

Gwyn Phillips of Montague was awarded 87 marks for his solo work in the class for boys, 16 years and under. "I am very happy that the committee for the Festival has selected a number of Stephen Foster's songs for competition," stated Mr. F. Wharram, who was on hand at Prince of Wales College for the afternoon sessions. "This boy has a simple approach to the song and possesses an unspoiled voice," he said. "The voice is a musical instrument and is not meant to be strained or overworked any more than any other wind instrument and that is what the human voice is," he continued while speaking about the approach of vocalists to singing.

In class 118, Piano solo, 16 years and under the adjudicator stressed the point that the test piece, First Movement of Mozart's "Sonata in G Major, was much too difficult for the pianists and that only two of the six players achieved anything like the idea of the piece.
