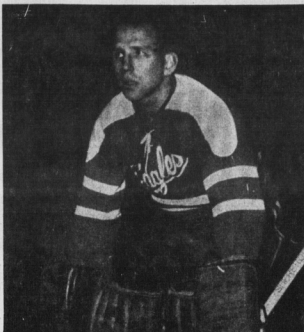

Fleming And Beamer Are Leading Lions

VANCOUVER (CP)—A half-back with override and a full-back with non-skid differential give British Columbia Lions one of the best-balanced attacks in Canadian football.

And for a change of pace, they have the kicking of a rookie flanker with a built-in bombast.

Willie Fleming, the backfielder with the deceptive change of speed, rolled up 12 touchdowns this season, his 72 points a matching the score amassed by fullback Nob Beamer.

However, whereas Willie was carrying Joe Kapp's passes on seven of his touchdowns runs, Beamer picked up only one of his dozen by the overhand route.

Faloney Claims Grey Cup Games Are All the Same

Packers Meet Detroit Lions

DETROIT (AP)—Green Bay Packers, who must win them all and hope for a stumble on the part of Chicago Bears, battle the stuttering Detroit Lions today in their annual Thanksgiving Day game.

Packers, faltering in their drive for a fourth straight western division and third straight National Football League championship, trail the Bears by one-half game with three games left.

As usual, the Thanksgiving game will feature two crackling defenses. The Packers have the league's toughest pass defence. They have held opponents to a 67-per-cent completion record and allowed the fewest first downs on passes, 60.

Detroit is the stingiest with first downs on the ground, having allowed just 59 in 11 games.

LOST TWICE: Packers, whose only two defeats have been at the hands of Bears, will have quarterback Bart Starr back in the lineup and no serious injuries. Two star Detroit defensive backs, Yelo Lary and Dick (Night Train) Lane, are hurt but have been running in practice and may play.

The Lions have lost three straight, to Baltimore, Los Angeles and Minnesota, and have a 4-7 record. Packers are 9-2, just behind the 9-1 record of the Bears.

The Packers dumped the Lions 20-10 earlier this year. Detroit handed Green Bay its only defeat last year in the Thanksgiving Day game.

Freeze Goes To Pirates

CINCINNATI (AP)—Cincinnati Reds sold veteran first baseman Gene Freeze Wednesday to Pittsburgh Pirates for cash and a minor league player to be delivered later.

The amount of cash was not disclosed, but it was described as "substantial."

In going to the Pirates, Freeze will be returning to the club with which he started his major league baseball career in 1953. He also has played with St. Louis Cardinals, Philadelphia Phillies and Chicago White Sox.

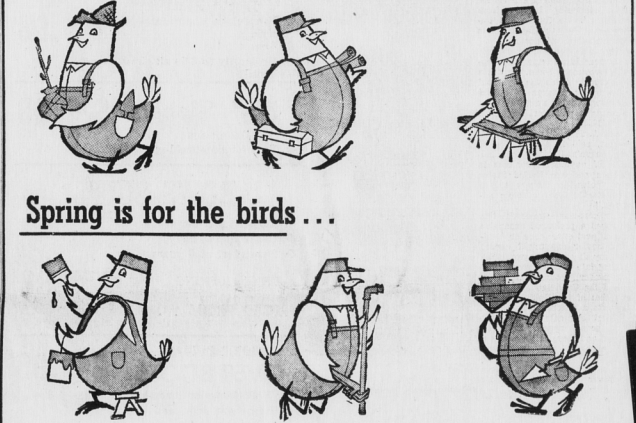
