

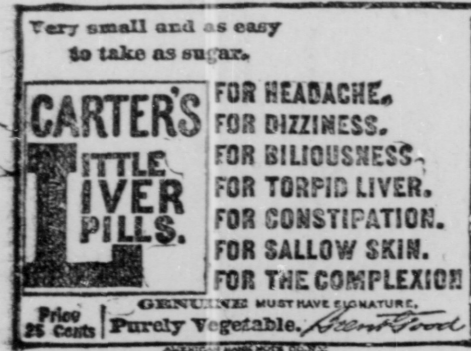

EVOLUTION OF CONSCIENCE.

A thoughtful lecture, unadorned by stereoscopic views, is a rare thing nowadays. Rarer still is a good audience in attendance at such a lecture. But both were found in the basement of Zion Church last evening, where and when the Rev. W. H. Smith, M. A., of Summerside, lectured on "the Evolution of Conscience."

Whether that faculty, power or inward principle which decides as to the character of one's own actions, purposes and affections, warning against and condemning that which is wrong, and approving and prompting to that which is right,—whether that which we call "conscience" is supernaturally implanted in man alone of all the animal creation or whether it has been "evolved" according to the latter-day theory,—this was the question discussed by the reverend and learned lecturer.

Mr. Smith showed that he had given much thought to the subject and investigated it carefully. He contended that conscience was supernaturally implanted in man. We have neither time nor space to follow the course of the elaborate argument by which this contention was supported. But we may be permitted to express the opinion that both mind and conscience are so closely connected with our physical nature that they are both strongly influenced by it—yes, in the case of even the most spiritualized of men and women. Let the body be never so little out of sorts, and the intelligence of even the most intelligent will be affected, and so will the governor of both mind and body, the conscience.

Shakespeare tells us that "conscience does make cowards of us all." Yet conscience has certainly a great deal of swing, and is a very different thing in different men,—a very different thing in the same person at different times of his life. As in men, so in society, conscience has less or more influence at one time than at another. A few years ago, as Mr. McCreedy pointed out when moving the vote of thanks, the conscience of society approved of a minister and his elders sitting down together and partaking of the cup which cheers and inebriates; now it utterly condemns such an "irreligious proceeding." On the other hand, a few years ago the conscience of society would not permit skating, fishing, shooting, driving for pleasure, etc. on the Lord's Day; now the conscience of both individuals and society permits such breaches of the Lord's Day sanc-

tity with the utmost equanimity. The people of this Province not long ago would have stood horrified at a case of Pineauism, and they would not have tolerated for a day longer than they were compelled to the services of politicians guilty of deliberately breaking their pre-election promises. Now there are hundreds of persons who predict that a majority will on the 12th of December, instant, justify both Pineauism and breaches of promise. But—we cannot believe this. We cannot believe that the public conscience has become so defiled and politically degraded as such a result of the election would prove. A correspondent at present residing in an adjoining Province writes: "If you don't win I shall be much disappointed. It would mean that the people of P. E. Island have not the stuff in them that they used to have. It would mean that they have learned to condone political misdoings of the worst kind, and that against their better judgment they are slaves at the feet of corruption and power. May our beautiful Island not thus be disgraced is the fervent wish of at least this humble well-wisher of hers."

We hope and trust that this good wish will be fulfilled; for if not the fact will prove such a devolution of conscience in Prince Edward Island as must give rise to alarm for its future.

But however this may be, our thanks, as well as those of the audience assembled in the basement of Zion Church last evening, are due to the Rev. W. H. Smith for his excellent and timely lecture.

JUSTICE HONORED.

CANUTE the Great in his letter to "all the nations of the English" has one passage which may make us believe that power and prosperity are not always corrupting:—

"And now be it known unto you all that I have dedicated my life to God, to govern my kingdoms with justice, and to observe the right in all things. If in the time that is past, and in the violence and carelessness of my youth, I have violated justice, it is my intention by the help of God to make full compensation. Therefore I beg and command those to whom I have entrusted the Government, as they wish to preserve my good will and save their own souls, to do no injustice either to poor or rich. Let those who are noble, and those who are not, equally obtain their rights, according to the laws, from which no deviation shall be allowed, either from fear of me, or through favor to the powerful, or for the purpose of supplying my treasury. I want no money raised by injustice."

We commend the foregoing extract, read by Dr. McNeill at the Lyceum meeting of Wednesday evening, to the Hon. D. Farquharson. We commend it also to Sir Louis Davies, and ask him to ponder over it when our delegates, whether Liberal or Conservative, go to Ottawa to press our claims.

We are strongly of the opinion that the principles expressed by the great Canute still govern the British throne, and that a Liberal-Conservative Government would have equally as good, if not a better, opportunity when pressing our claims upon the Laurier government. Has it come to this that only favorites and partisans are to receive justice?

Bye Elections.

HALIFAX, N. S., Dec. 6.—Yesterday was nomination day in three counties in Nova Scotia to fill vacancies in the local legislature caused by the resignation of liberals running in the federal election in Halifax. A. B. Crosby, commission merchant, is the conservative nominee, and ex-Mayor Keefe, the liberal.

In Pictou county the liberals surrendered a seat to avoid a contest so that the conservative opposition in the house has gained at least one in C. E. Tanner. E. M. McDonald is the liberal member elected.

In Cape Breton county, McKinnon and Harry Macdonald, conservatives, D. D. McKenzie and Neil J. Gillies, liberals, were nominated in the interest of the respective parties.

Murder and Suicide.

BLACKWELL, Mo., Dec. 5.—Two men, one about 50 and the other 20 years of age, supposed to have been tramps, appeared here during the night and were permitted to sleep in a boiler room. Today the younger man was found dead on a railroad track. He apparently had been murdered and robbed. A posse of men scoured the country and soon captured the dead man's companion of the night. He was taken to the room where the dead man lay and accused of murder. With a quick movement the old man drew a knife, stabbed himself through the heart and fell dead before his horror-stricken captors. The names of the dead men cannot be learned.

Sad Suicide.

LEWISTON, Me., Dec. 5.—The body of Isaac Parker, who resided near the line between Lewiston and Greene, and who committed suicide Tuesday afternoon by drowning, was not been discovered, although search was made Wednesday by Wm. Harris and his son Edward. Mr. Parker's coat was found containing a letter to his wife, in which he said he should go over the dam in a boat, tie a stone to his neck and jump into the water.
