### Trout And Kraut Relish Deftly Catching Flavor

Comes the trout season, and every fisherman within casting distance of a trout stream catches the "fever". You might just as well relax and enjoy the bounty, for trout is truly a delicious little fish—mild, delicately flavored and easy to clean and cook. You can sauté trout in butter 7 or 8 min., on each side with or without a seasoned-flour coating.

**Sesame Seed Trout**  
For something deliciously different, grill trout with a sesame seed coating. To do: brush the cleaned fish with oil and dust with salt, pepper and enough sesame seed to make a coating. Grill the fish over hot coals or on an indoor grill, until browned on one side; turn carefully with a broad spatula and brown the reverse side.

Complement this mild-flavored fish with a piquant green olive sauce; or with a whipped butter sauce; or with a sour cream sauce. Or serve a different sauce. If your fisherman returns with enough to feed a crowd, or omit the sauce and serve the trout accompanied with a piquant kraut relish. The crisp, crunchy texture and tart flavor of kraut is a tasty foil for trout.

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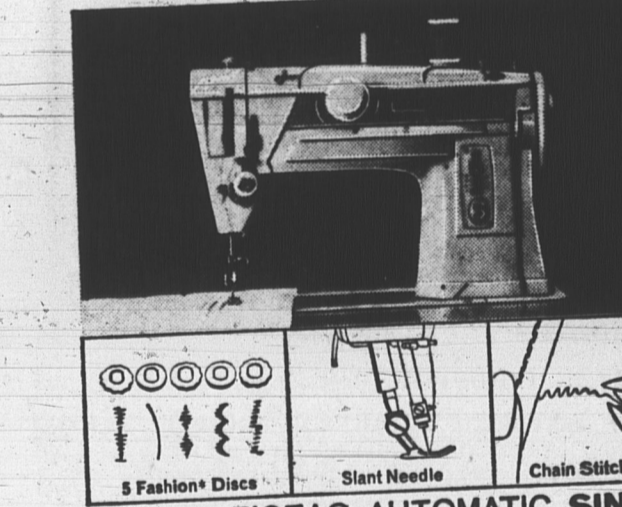
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
