PWC Residence Plans Prepared

A Halifax architect has been engaged by the provincial department of public works to prepare plans for a students' residence at Prince of Wales College. Hon. J. George MacKay, minister of public works, said yesterday that Charles Fowler after conferring with officials of the department of education and his own department, was instructed to draw plans and make preliminary drawings of the building. Mr. Fowler, it is reported, has drawn plans for several students' residences throughout the Maritime and it was after visits by government officials to a number of other institutions that he was called in for consultation and asked to accept the job. The residence will be erected on property now owned by the P.E.I. Government on the northeast corner of Cumberland and Kent Streets. Mr. MacKay said the tenants of the existing building have been given notice to vacate in preparation for the erection of the new building. The minister said a further announcement concerning the type, size and capacity of the building would be made as soon as preliminary plans are approved by his department.

Interest Is Reported High In Hospital Insurance Plan

Meetings held thus far in regard to the public hospital insurance plan have been exceptionally well attended and the plan itself has been widely acclaimed by all those who turned out to hear the speakers. 2 Cars Damaged; One Driver Held

A rear-end collision on Elm Avenue about 5:30 p.m. yesterday resulted in two cars being extensively damaged, but the occupants escaped relatively unharmed. According to city police, a 1956 Ford sedan bearing a temporary Nova Scotia permit, and driven by Paul Milton Saunders of Toronto struck the rear of a 1956 Pontiac station wagon as the station wagon's driver, Douglas Pierce, Charlottetown, attempted to make a left turn into the Experimental Farm road. The front end of the Ford was badly smashed and the car slewed around until it faced in the direction from which it was coming. Both cars had been proceeding towards the city. The station wagon rolled over several times and finally came to rest on its top in a field. It was extensively damaged. An ambulance was summoned and the driver of the second car, Saunders, was taken to hospital but was released after treatment for a slight cut on his forehead. Pierce was uninjured. Police say Saunders is lodged in the lockup and will face a charge today.

Home Building Slows Down

Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation has recently released the privately initiated starts and completion survey in municipalities of 5,000 population and over in the Atlantic region. The survey shows that Charlottetown had no houses started in May as compared with four a year ago. It had however two completions as compared with one last May. From January to May it had two starts in 1959 and six starts in 1958, with 14 completions in 1959 as compared with 8 completions in 1958. Units under construction totalled 24 in 1959 and 17 last year. In Summerside there were no starts in May and no completions. Last May there were two starts and 3 completions. In the cumulative picture there were 24 starts from January to May 27, 1959, and only two last year. Completions indicated 12 this year and 7 last year. There are 35 units under construction at the present time as compared with only three this time last year.

Militia Groups Converging On Army's Camp Gagetown

MONCTON, N. B. Members of militia groups throughout the Atlantic provinces will converge today on the Canadian Army's big base in New Brunswick, Camp Gagetown, for summer training. The army's installation at Farnham, Que., is also attracting large numbers and at both centres, for the next couple of months, hundreds of trainees, eager to become proficient in their duties, will go through their paces under the guidance and direction of seasoned instructors. As in the past, Canadian National Railways is co-operating with the army in providing transportation for the various groups to and from camp. Two such movements have been arranged for today. Canadian National trains will carry nearly 300 militia members from Sydney, Halifax, Charlottetown, Truro and Moncton to Saint John, where personnel destined for Camp Gagetown will connect with army transport and those for Farnham will make further train connection. In the opposite direction Canadian National will move more than 200 soldiers from Saint John to points as far east as Sydney. These men have just completed summer training at Camp Gagetown.
