The Spice Mill of New York says: "It is probable that before long the famous Mocha coffee will disappear from the markets of the world, though doubtless some inferior variety will usurp its name."

The imports have been declining for some time, and a recent Italian consular report makes known that the once flourishing Mocha (or Mokke), as the writer calls it is now reduced to a group of sixty poor huts, with about four hundred inhabitants, who have hard work to keep body and soul together.

The coffee plantations are lying waste and uncultivated, and the once busy harbor is full of sand. All the European merchants have departed save one Italian, and he is engaged, not in exporting coffee but in importing European wares for the Arabians."

It is better not to graze pastures very closely at any season of the year. Pastures when bare are more likely to suffer from either drought or cold than when covered with grass two or three inches deep, and they grow much more slowly.

All plants feed from the leaf as well as the root, and when cropped too closely the power of drawing nourishment and attracting moisture from the air is much lessened. Young turf requires specially careful grazing, yet it should be remembered that if allowed to get ahead in the early summer, it becomes overgrown and coarse, and is rejected by cattle and sheep.

The aftergrowth of sheep is hindered throughout the year by the old dry grass remaining on the land.
