(Continued from Page 1) 6,000 men were mobilized in Catalonia, semi-autonomous province in the northeast, and moved westward into Zaragoza province. Loyal troops, aided by planes, sent a strong barrage on the city of Zaragoza which was said to have caused heavy losses in the Fascist forces. The rebel General Cabanellas was reported to have sent for help which was not available. The capital was quieter as food supplies neared normal and strict measures were ordered to prevent price-raising and hoarding. Under the supervision of a "red committee" of defence, doctors and nurses were organized for emergency treatment of wounded and hospitals were prepared to receive war victims. Twenty-five members of the American colony in Madrid spent last night in the United States Embassy. The British Embassy housed 30 British women and children.

(Continued from Page 1) working class and the unemployed. When the uproar showed no sign of subsiding, the Deputy Speaker suspended the sitting. It had then been in progress for more than 27 hours without a break. Stephen Suspended

The motion for Buchanan's suspension was carried by 248 votes to 53. A motion for the suspension of Stephen also was put and carried, 256 to 51. Both members stalked out. When the House resumed after the 15-minute interval the uproar began again. Booming from the Labor benches greeted Sir John as he resumed his interrupted speech. F. Seymour Coombs, Labor, Brookton, explained, "we all know Simon is a liar." When Sir John referred to the responsibility of children in supporting their parents, McGovern broke in by saying: "Why doesn't the King support his mother? He must be a despicable individual." Subsequently McGovern, another of the L.L.P. members, referred to the Home Secretary as a "damned liar." When he, like Buchanan, refused to withdraw, Sir John moved his suspension, which was carried. Refuses to Leave McGovern declined to leave when the Speaker requested him to do so. At the Speaker's request, the Sergeant-at-Arms asked McGovern to withdraw. Eventually with a pal on the back from James Maxton, leader of the left-wing Labor group, the fiery McGovern was escorted by the sergeant-at-arms, who held his elbow, across the bar of the House. Government members jeered and laughed at the tame conclusion to the stormy scenes. Today's suspensions were the first since the present Parliament began its sittings late last year. The three members will be suspended five days only as first offenders for the present sittings. They will not lose their parliamentary salaries. Pending their return, Maxton will be the only member of the L.L.P. in the House. Coombs avoided suspension by acknowledging that he had broken the rules in calling Sir John a liar and withdrawing his remark.

Auto Sales High In June

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, July 23.—Automobile sales ran high in June compared with the same month a year ago, as revealed by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Vehicles financed in June totalled 18,653 with a value of \$7,343,729, a gain of 45 per cent in number and 48 per cent in value over June, 1935. June figures show a seasonal decline from May, the peak month, when 20,839 vehicles were financed for \$8,586,445. Sales of vehicles by provinces for June follow: Maritime, 1,345; Quebec, 3,057; Ontario, 9,005; Manitoba and Saskatchewan, 2,122; Alberta, 1,696; British Columbia, 1,423.

"Twenty-one years ago we came here to help you with armed force; next Saturday representatives of the survivors of those armed forces will return; but this time as an army of peace and goodwill," he said. The years had passed, but time had not obliterated the memories of those other days. The 6,000 Canadian pilgrims were returning impelled by these memories. In this connection, we may say that our visit today is tinged with sadness in that your great and noble King, who led your forces in the war, is no longer there. We have not forgotten, nor will we ever forget, how throughout the darkest days he clung so resolutely to that little strip of territory which was all his country—how he lived with his troops, inspired and encouraged not only them but all the rest of the allied forces by his wonderful example. Not only to you, but to all of us who knew him as a comrade of the line his untimely death was a cause of real sorrow. To his successor and through him to his people of Belgium we desire to express this heartfelt tribute. The Belgian people had repaired the ravages of war; but the memory of former desolation still lived. It was expressed by the figure of "the brooding soldier," the Canadian memorial erected over those one-time battlefields.
