Arcaro Pilots Four Winners

NEW YORK (CP)—Eddie Arcaro rode four winners for the second straight day at Jamaica Saturday to run his total for the meeting to 19.

Arcaro piloted the Eltkam Stable's Atoll to the wire for first place in the day's feature, the \$28,000 Gotham Stakes. Atoll's time for the 1 1/16 miles was 1:48.

Both Atoll and second-placed International are strong contenders for next Saturday's Wood Memorial at Jamaica, the final eastern test for the May 2 running of the Kentucky Derby. The two colts battled all the way from start to finish on a "ppy track. Atoll won by three-quarters of a length.

At Laurel, Mrs. Ada L. Rice's Talent Show found the mud to his liking in winning his first race this year, the inaugural of the \$68,920 Laurel Maturity.

The four-year-old gelding was named the winner after six starts didn't fuddle Jim, the runner-up, in the stretch. Jockey Jack Leonard brought Talent Show in 1 1/4 lengths ahead of Piano Jim for a time of 1:50 3/5 for the 1 1/2-mile journey.

Provost Used Change-Up Shot On Bower In Third

MONTREAL (CP) — Claude Provost, who scored two third-period goals Saturday night in Montreal Canadiens' 3-1 win over Toronto Maple Leafs, said he pulled a "change-up" shot on Leaf goalie Johnny Bower in the third period.

Provost had lifted a shot past a Leaf defenceman to beat Bower with his first goal. His second came on a breakaway. He said when he saw Bower didn't make a move he didn't blast his shot but cut down on the speed, with more attention to aim.

Provost and Doug Harvey, also a star for Montreal, came in for plaudits from their mates in Canadiens' dressing room. For Provost's first goal, Harvey said he pulled the Toronto defence over before feeding Provost.

TOUGH GAME

Coach Toe Blake, whose team now holds a 2-0 lead in the best-of-seven Stanley Cup final, called it a "very tough" game and said Bower played an outstanding game in the Toronto nets.

Blake was asked about his use of Henri Richard on two liens. He

said: "The Little Rocket likes to play a lot and he sure got his chance tonight."

Blake said Bernie Geoffrion was skating well Saturday night so he let the Boomer alternate with Maurice Richard on one line.

Coach Punch Imlach of the Leafs said Canadiens "haven't won it yet—they've taken two hockey games, not the cup."

"The Leafs weren't much better tonight but the Leafs have been behind the eight ball during the season and in the cup semi-final and have come from behind to win."

MAHOVLICH INJURY

Imlach said Frank Mahovlich suffered a slight charleyhorse but should be okay for Tuesday's game in Toronto. He also said he

expects to play Larry Regan, who has missed the first two games because of a fra u-d hand, instead of Dave Creighton.

Veteran Bert Olmstead, formerly with Canadiens, said the Leafs worked hard but couldn't seem to get results, and there were times when mental lapses hurt.

Manchester United lost a chance of going to the top when it, too, was held to a scoreless deadlock by Cup finalist Luton. Manchester and Wolverhampton were both weakened by the loss of players to the English team that defeated Scotland 1-0 in an international match.

Wolves and United were both left with 53 points at the head of the league, but Wolves lead on goal average. Their chances of staying on top look bright since they have four more games to play while Manchester has only

two to go in the 42-game schedule.

Three other tie games cropped up in the First Division. Arsenal and Chelsea deadlocked 1-1, Leicester City and West Ham 1-1 and Newcastle United and West Bromwich 2-2.

Aston Villa dropped into the relegation zone by losing 4-2 to Preston North End. Two teams from the First Division go down to the Second Division at the end of each season.

Portsmouth is certain to be one of the relegated teams. Leicester City pulled into the third-last spot through its tie with West Ham and now leads Aston Villa by one point.
