FIGHTING IN THE PHILIPPINES.

Dewey Opens Fire on the Rebels.

FOR HOISTING THEIR FLAG ON THEIR SHIPS

Losses on Both Sides—The Rebel Ships Captured

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Oct 20.—The Madrid correspondent of the Times says that Captain Aunon, Minister of Marine, has received a despatch from Manila announcing a naval engagement between the Americans and rebels, in consequence of Admiral Dewey forbidding the latter to fly the rebel flag from their ships.

The despatch adds that there were losses on both sides, but that the Americans captured the rebel ships.

Health of Havana.

HAVANA, Oct 19.—Col. Waring of the United States sanitary commission will forward to Washington to day an extensive report, dwelling particularly upon the filthy condition of this city, which is the real cause of all the infectious diseases. Some days have elapsed since even the principal street has been swept, and the rubbish and filth are accumulating rapidly. The local officers take no step to remedy the evil. The trouble seems to be that the work of sweeping the streets is let out by contract, and the contractor claims the city now owes him \$40,000, which, he adds, prevents him from buying carts or mules and from paying wages to continue the service.

American Ultimatum.

HAVANA, Oct. 19.—A conference lasting three hours was held yesterday morning between Gen Wade, Gen Butler and Admiral Sampson as to the contents of the five official notes delivered to the American commissioners yesterday by the Spanish evacuation commission.

The Spaniards claim that it would be practically impossible to effect evacuation in the short period of time fixed by the Americans. They disclaim all authority to treat of any political subjects outside of the strict limits of military evacuation. They insist that the sovereignty of Spain will continue until the final treaty of peace is signed in Paris.

In reply, Admiral Sampson personally dictated a brief, terse note, stating emphatically that December 1st would positively be the date on which Spain's rights, claims and sovereignty in the Island of Cuba would cease to exist.

The American notes were delivered to Gen Parrado of the Spanish evacuation commission this afternoon by Capt Hart

BERLIN, Oct 19.—The morning papers teem with articles eulogizing the Sultan. The semi-official Berliner Post praises the Ottoman sovereign at great length, and in fulsome terms characterizes him as a "great reformer who in many respects resembles the Kaiser."

Trade Returns.

The trade statement for September which appeared in last Saturday's Canada Gazette, shows that the total imports for the month were \$13,016,145, and duty collected \$1,970,605, as compared with \$12,057,115 imports, and duty collected \$1,910,175 during the same month last year. The exports during the same month were \$14,610,112, of which \$11,901,126 was produce of Canada and \$2,708,986 produce of other countries, as compared with \$14,142,294 produce of Canada and \$2,447,794 produce of other countries during same month last year. This makes the total trade for the month \$27,626,257 as compared with \$28,647,263 for same month last year, a falling off of \$1,020,951. For the quarter ending 30th September the imports have been \$44,190,170, and exports \$43,465,085, making a total of \$87,655,255, which is an increase of \$11,199,699 in imports, and a decrease of \$4,141,839 in exports over same period last year. The duty collected during the quarter was \$6,764,944 as compared with \$5,127,700, for same quarter last year, an increase of \$1,637,244.

Spanish Evacuation.

SAN JUAN, Oct 19.—Promptly at noon yesterday the American flag was raised over San Juan. The ceremony was quiet and dignified, unmarred by disorder of any kind. The eleventh regular infantry, with two batteries of the fifth artillery, landed this morning. The latter proceeded to the fort, while the infantry lined up on the docks. It was a holiday for San Juan, and there were many people in the streets.

The work of the United States evacuation commission is now over, and all the reports will be forwarded to Washington on Tuesday next. The labors of both parties have terminated with honor for all concerned. The American commissioners worked without the least delay, and in the most thorough and effective manner.
