## Cigarette Case Ends With Fine

Charles Murchison MacEachern of Hampton, pleading guilty in Queens County Magistrate's Court to a charge under the Customs Act, was assessed a minimum fine of \$50 and costs or in default of payment one month in the Queens County Jail by Magistrate James B. Johnson.

MacEachern was charged by the RCMP of unlawfully having in his possession 460 American cigarettes, valued at under \$200 for duty purposes, on which the duty had not been paid. The case of Lorne Robert Rhyne, Bayfield Street, Charlottetown, charged with driving while intoxicated was completed yesterday after having occupied several sessions. After summing up the testimony, the magistrate sentenced the accused to seven days in jail. Along with the sentence goes an automatic suspension of driving licence for one year.

## 'Most University Students' Is Claim By Quebec Premier

QUEBEC — (CP) — Premier Paul Sauve said Tuesday night Quebec's Union Nationale government has carried out such improvements in the fields of elementary and high school education that by last June Quebec had more university students than any other province in Canada.

During the throne speech debate Mr. Sauve said that out of 94,400 university students in Canada in June, 31,000 were in Quebec universities and 27,800 in Ontario universities.

Mr. Sauve said it is true there are educational problems in Quebec but those problems did not arise because of the inertia of the administration under the late Premier Duplessis. Instead they grew out of its program of expansion at the elementary and high school levels.

Since 1944, when the Union Nationale party had come to power, the provincial government had paid out \$23,140,500 in grants to Quebec's universities and \$23,140,500 to Quebec's classical colleges. To help school boards pay salaries to teachers in elementary schools the government had since 1946 made operating grants totaling \$124,434,000 and construction grants of \$200,000,000.

## Sewage Disposal Program Approved By Health Dept.

Charlottetown has been given the green light to proceed with its sewage disposal program in the western part of the City—the Brighton shore area—but not without reservations from health officials.

Councillor J. E. Arsenault, chairman of the sewerage and water committee said yesterday the department of health has approved in principle the proposal to deal with sewage by means of an interceptor pipe and two outfalls emptying into the North River.

The health department states that, while they approve the plan from a technical standpoint, health sanction on the matter is not such an easy decision to reach.

The department is in agreement with the Crandall report that the waters of Charlottetown harbor are capable of handling the additional load of raw sewage that would be dumped as a result of the interceptor pipe and outfall.

At the same time they point out that it has not been their practice to recommend the dumping of raw sewage into a body of water other than those specially provided for the purpose, such as a lagoon.

**COMPLAINTS NOTED**  
The department's letter states that there has been increasing complaint on the part of citizens regarding the dumping of raw sewage resulting in an increase in marine plant life and a stench from the flats at low tide.

The department advises the council that samples of the harbor will be taken twice weekly next summer to determine whether or not a form of treatment is required.

The survey was carried out by A.J. Hiscott of Crandall Engineering Consultants at Moncton and the results have been approved by W. K. Sharpe and D.A. Cullen, sanitary engineers for the Department of National Health and Welfare who act as consultants for the province of Prince Edward Island. Messrs. Sharpe and Cullen are located at Truro, N.S.

All that is left to do is to have a tender package prepared and presented to the City Council for approval. It is believed that the council will want to consider this tender at an early date so that they may obtain Provincial Government approval to have at least a portion of the work completed under the winter works program.

The interceptor pipe will run along the North River between Brighton Road and Kirkwood Drive West. A large outfall emptying into 20 feet of water at low tide will carry the sewage to tide will carry the sewage to the harbor. A smaller outfall with a weir trap will be installed at Kirkwood Drive.

## Full-Scale Debate On Hungary Is Endorsed In United Nations

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP) The United Nations general assembly Wednesday night voted for a full-scale debate on Hungary—but by a smaller majority than last year.

Acting on a recommendation by the 14th assembly's steering committee, Canada and 50 other countries voted for the debate while 10—the Soviet bloc and Yugoslavia—were against.

Fifteen countries abstained, including India, the United Arab Republic, Ghana and other Afro-Asian countries, and most of the Arab states. Last year the vote was 61 to 10 with 10 abstentions. The U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge declared:

"In the shadow of continued trials and executions of Hungarians whose only crime was their bare-handed fight for independence against Soviet tanks in 1956, and in the shadow of the continuing reports of impending executions, it is clear that the end of the reign of terror is not in sight."

Lodge expressed regret that such reports made a Hungarian debate necessary at a time of a relaxation of tensions between East and West and he added:

"But we must set down that to attempt to sweep crimes like these under the rug... will not promote peace."

Sir Pierson Dixon of Britain, in urging a debate, said it is expected that a report on Hungary prepared by New Zealand's Sir Leslie Munro, will be released soon for assembly study. Munro was appointed special UN representative on Hungary last year.

Vasily V. Kuznetsov, Soviet deputy foreign minister, said the West sounded hypocritical in talking about fundamental human rights.

"Where were the representatives of the United States and other Western powers with their 'humaneness' and 'philanthropy' when in 1956 bloody outrages were being committed against the Hungarian working people who came out against the restoration of Fascist order in their country?"

Jamestown in Virginia, the first English settlement in the United States, was founded in 1607.

## Post Office Planning For Rush Of Mail

With Christmas only a month away, the Charlottetown post office is making preparation for the large influx of mail which goes through the office at this time of year.

Postmaster J.J. Connolly said yesterday extra sorting cases are being removed from storage and in the course of a few days will be re-labelled and set up. The first extra help to be taken on will be the railway mail clerks and these will be employed on December 1, Mr. Connolly said.

Extra help within the post office will be called in on or about the 9th of December.

The Post Office will carry out its usual program of putting two additional letter carriers on each walk and a continuous delivery will be maintained as in previous years.

Postmaster Connolly said he was pleased with the public response of the last few years in heeding the "Mail early" advice of the department. "This co-operation by our citizens has greatly assisted the post office staff in their efforts to expedite delivery of Christmas mail," he said.
