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Growers Keeping Fingers Crossed

Potato growers in Prince Edward Island are looking forward to a bumper crop this season, but they are 'keeping their fingers crossed.'

The weather the last few months has been exceptionally good for growing and with the harvest little more than a month away presents signs point to the largest crop grown on the island in some years. There is a steady demand for seed potatoes and farmers have 28,346 acres of seed potatoes planted. This is reported 5,200 acres more than last year.

The island consumers have been sending seed potatoes to the southern United States and South America and already the Argentine government has shown an interest in buying seed spuds this year. For the farmers, the next two weeks will tell the tale. The blight season is here and every precaution is being taken to prevent this fungus type killer from causing destruction.

The Science Service Laboratory operated by the Dominion Government at Charlottetown, assists farmers in their war against the disease. Officials said the only sure way to kill the blight is to spray crops twice weekly. The blight attacks vines, killing them and when rain falls it seeps down into the plant roots, stunting growth or decaying the potato. It has been several years since the blight has caused ruinous damage to island crops.

As for marketing, Islanders are looking to boats, even more than in past years, as a means of beating the high cost involved in shipping. Already vessels are planning trips from Prince Edward Island ports to central Canadian markets by way of the St. Lawrence River. Potatoes are the big cash crop on this island. A good growing year would see the farmers take in \$12,000,000 to \$14,000,000.

Soviet-Iranian Differences Aired
TEHRAN, Iran, (AP)—The Iranian foreign ministry announced Monday that Russia and Iran will set up a joint commission to tackle outstanding differences between the two nations. Major issues include border disputes, debts incurred by Russian forces in Iran during the Second World War and revision of the 1921 Soviet-Iranian treaty, which authorizes Russia to send troops into Iran if any other power moves in.

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Judging Of Sheep Classes Completed At Exhibition

The judging of sheep at the Provincial Exhibition was concluded yesterday with the placing of the Shropshire Downs, North Country Cheviot, Oxford Downs, Leicester and Cheviots by Judge Garrett Chapman of Waterloo, Quebec.

The leading honors were won by S. C. Stewart and Sons of Dunstaffnage; Almon Boswell, Marshfield; H. L. Boswell, Marshfield; Irving Haslam, Emerald; and Rowell Boswell of Frenchfort.

S. C. Stewart and Sons took all the championships and placings in the Shropshire Downs and the majority of the honors in the Leicesters. They had seven first placings in the Shropshires and six in the Leicesters.

Almon Boswell took practically all the placings and all the championships in the Cheviots and North Country Cheviots. He had seven firsts in the Cheviots and six in the North Country's.

The Oxford Down honors went to H. L. Boswell. He took all the seven first placings, three seconds and three thirds as well as the championships.

Irving Haslam had two seconds and three thirds in the North Country Cheviots; Rowell Boswell won two firsts, four seconds and two thirds in the Leicesters while John Thompson of Frenchfort had two seconds, a third and two fourths in the Oxford Downs.
