BRITISH ELECTIONS YESTERDAY

Gains by The Conservatives

INCREASED UNIONIST MAJORITIES

Liberal Conservatives Leading in the Mother Country.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER]

LONDON, Oct. 2.—In the following boroughs, polled yesterday, all the sitting members were re-elected: Devonport, Durham, Exeter, King's Lynn, Peterborough, Preston, Reading, Rockdale, Wigan and north and south divisions of Westham. In Durham the Unionist candidate secured a majority of 781 as against one of 65 at the last election.

The results in other boroughs show little change with the exception of the very significant increase in the Unionist majorities in Westham where, in the north division the Unionist secured a lead of 2,460 against 704 at the last election, and in the south division the Unionist secured a lead of 1,196, against 755 in the last election. Westham is densely populated. It is the working class district at the east end of London, and the result there seems to show that the Liberals have little to hope from the metropolis.

On the other hand, Matthew White Ridley, son of Sir Matthew White Ridley, the Home Secretary, was elected at Slaty bridge in the Unionist interest by a majority of only 81 as against a Unionist majority of 632, secured by T. H. Siddbottom at the election of 1895.

At Hartlepool, Sir Christopher Furness, the Liberal candidate, received 6,491 votes, as against 4,612 cast for Sir Thomas Richardson, the Liberal Unionist, who represented that constituency in the late parliament.

Both Conservative candidates were elected at Plymouth.

At Oldham one Liberal and one Conservative candidate were elected, the latter being Winston Churchill, Conservative.

The returns received up to midnight show that the total number elected is: 132 Conservatives, 93 Unionists, 18 Liberals, 18 Nationalists.

The Conservatives also have gained two seats and the Liberals one.

TRIBUTE TO CANADIANS.

Extract From Orders of the 19th Brigade.

OTTAWA, Oct. 2.—The following extract from the orders of the 19th brigade in South Africa, of which the first Canadian contingent formed part, will be of public interest.

"The 19th brigade has achieved a record of which any infantry might be proud. Since the date of which it was formed it has marched 620 miles, often on halfrations, seldom on full; it has taken part in the capture of ten towns fought in ten general actions, and on 27 other days. In one period of 30 days it fought on 21 of them and marched 327 miles. Casualties between 400 and 500; defeats nil.
