Plans were completed for the Thanksgiving service which is to be held in the church Sunday.

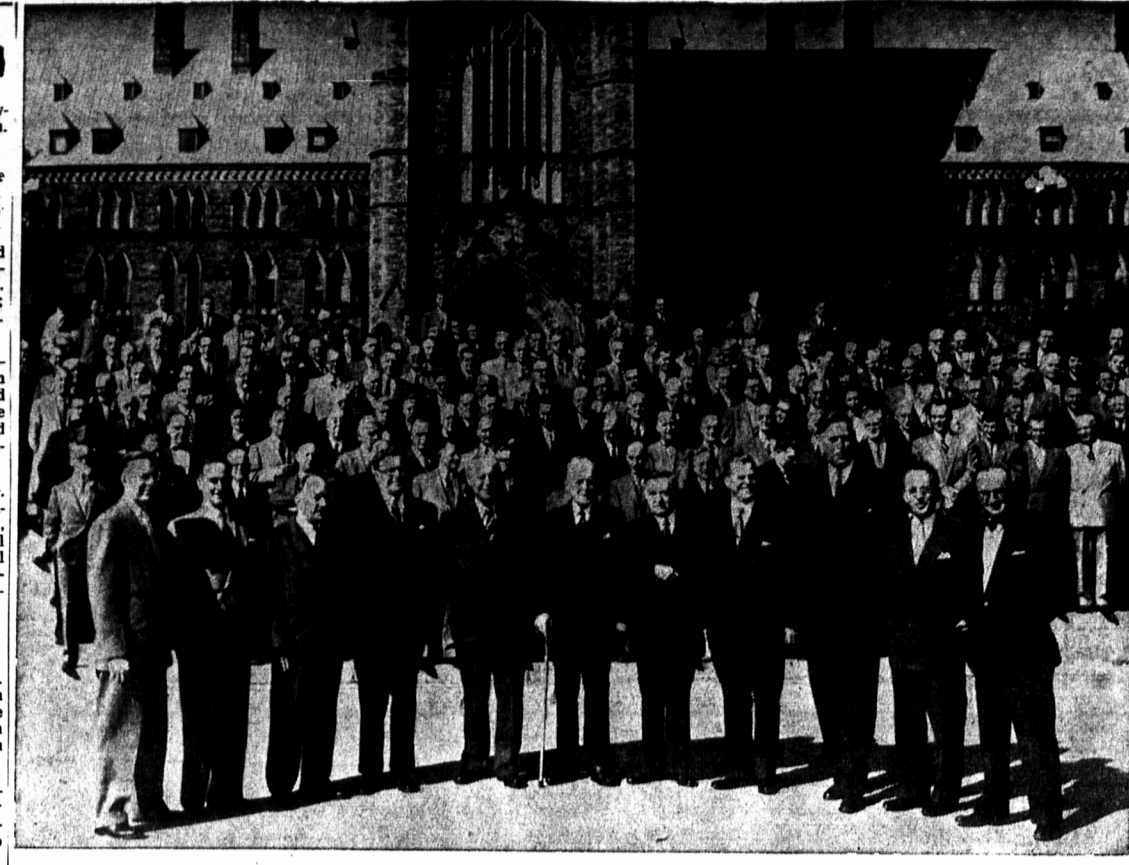

S'side Board Of Trade Discusses Ferry Service

Action to have both the M. V. Abegweit and the S. S. Prince Edward Island continue ferry service between Borden and Cape Tormentine while the potato movement warrants this service was taken by the Summerside Board of Trade at its regular monthly meeting last evening.

The board will also endeavour to have construction of the sea-wall altered that is now being built along the shore front on the east side of the Marine Wharf, so as to provide what they consider to be a more suitable construction and one which will allow for future development in that area and the possible construction of a highway which will traverse the waterfront along the shore line south of the buildings on Water Street.

Discussion on the ferry service resulted from a C. N. R. announcement regarding a change in service which will be effective on October 16th, apparently leaving only one boat in service between Borden and Tormentine.

Concern was expressed by various members that a serious shipping bottleneck would result in the heavy volume of potato shipments out of this Province during the fall if only one boat is left in service during this period.
