

Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin Reported Ill

MOSCOW (AP)—Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin is ill, the Soviet news agency Tass reported Thursday.

He was too ill to meet a Finnish delegation headed by President Juho K. Paasikivi and Prime Minister Urho Kekkonen when it arrived in Moscow Thursday. He may be unable to participate in negotiations with East German Prime Minister Otto Grotewohl to begin today.

It is extremely unusual for the illness of any Soviet official to be made public. The last time such an announcement was made was when Josef Stalin suffered a stroke in March, 1953. Diplomatic sources, however, saw nothing ominous in the revelation of Bulganin's illness.

Bulganin recently returned from a vacation in the Caucasus, but despite a suntan he looked tired during the conference with West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

Since he became premier last Feb. 8, Bulganin has had an unusually full schedule of interna-

tional conferences and negotiations, as well as a heavy program of entertainment for visiting foreign statesmen.

He has been to Warsaw for establishment of the Eastern Europe Defence Organization to counter NATO, to Belgrade for a "reconciliation" meeting with Yugoslav President Tito and to Geneva for the Big Four "summit" conference.

Austrian government leaders came to Moscow for negotiation of a peace treaty ending the Big Four occupation of that country and Adenauer came to negotiate establishment of diplomatic relations with the Soviet Union.

Two conferences are to begin today. One is with the Finnish delegation which hopes the talks will lead to the return to Finland of the Porkkala military base, 12 miles west of Helsinki, held by Russia since the Second World War. The second, with Grotewohl, is expected to deal with the thorny questions of German unification and return of German war prisoners.

Britain To Resume Tests Of Atomic Bombs In April

LONDON (AP)—Britain will resume atomic testing in the desolate Monte Bello islands off the Australian coast.

A terse government announcement ruled out the possibility Britain would set off her first H-bomb. The explosions will not exceed a few tens of kilotons in yield, it said. An H-bomb would touch off a blast of at least one thousand kilotons.

Britain announced earlier this year she has the know-how to make an H-bomb, but so far there has been no indication when one would be tested.

The ministry of supply said there would be two separate series of tests next year.

The first, at Monte Bello in April, would set off explosions of a similar magnitude to Britain's first atom bomb test on the same site in 1952.

Other ships will be used in the new explosions, the admiralty said. The second tests in 1956 will be carried out at Maralinga, Britain's new proving ground in the central Australian desert.

The tests will be master-minded by British scientists, but top-ranking Australian physicists will approve the fall-out pattern of the explosions and give the final approval on weather conditions.

In Australia, Professor Marcus Oliphant, one of that nation's top scientists, speculated the new tests might be of atomic triggerheads for later H-bomb explosions.

The tests at the new Maralinga grounds, will be conducted by Sir William Penney, Britain's top atomic scientist knighted for his work in building the 1952 A-bomb.

Diplomat's Informality Pays Off In Popularity

LONDON (AP)—Britain's new high commissioner to India is a diplomat who has a way with means standing on his head and Malcolm Macdonald came home this week for consultations after nine years as roving ambassador in Southeast Asia.

Macdonald's job has been—and will be in India—to counter communism and make friends in a region where British diplomats in the past had somewhat of a reputation for haughtiness and stuffiness.

MOST SUCCESSFUL

Conservative and socialist political leaders in London regard him as one of the most successful diplomats Britain has had in Asia in modern times.

Macdonald has preached a doctrine that has won him Asian trust: "Colonialism is a bad system of government," he has said over and over again. "The attack on it is right in principle. . . . Western rule can never have been permanent. It could not have been a passing phase in a country's history."

son of Britain's first Labor premier, Ramsay Macdonald, also grew up in politics. Yet he regards himself as a non-partisan.

OLD GRADUATE

On graduating from Oxford he won a seat in Parliament at the age of 28 as a socialist. Later he served in the national government in two cabinet posts—colonial secretary and minister of health.

During the Second World War he was Britain's high commissioner in Canada and he is married to a Canadian. In 1946 he was sent to Malaya as governor-general. The Communists were waging a struggle to gain control of the colony.

Macdonald helped check the Red inroads by what he calls "shirt-

sleeve" diplomacy, and by letting the Malaysians themselves take a prominent part in stamping out the Communists.

Elevated to commissioner-general for all Southeast Asia, he carried on this policy. During nine years, he says, he witnessed a revolution in that region—the consequences of which, he feels, will be as great as the French revolution.

It was a new way of fighting the Communists. The Asians themselves embraced it; the Reds found themselves baffled on how to cope with it.

STIRS TEMPEST

He discarded the traditional striped pants and tailcoat of the diplomat for what he likes to describe as "bush-shirt, tie-off" diplomacy. He stirred up a tempest in London when he posed for a photograph with two bare-chested maiden daughters of a Dyak chief in Borneo. But Macdonald, now 54 and a short handsome man with greying brown hair, believes in doing what comes naturally. He stood on his head to amuse the king of Thailand. He entertained at an official reception by building a pyramid of glasses. At the dedication of a water ski club in Singapore he said:
