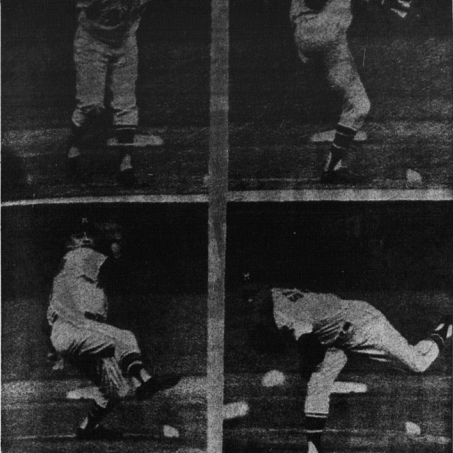


Junior Tennis Action Starts

OTTAWA (CP)—Some 250 tennis players from every province swung into action today at the 15th annual Canadian junior tennis championships.

Ten days and some 600 matches later, 21 titles will have been decided in the four age groups—12 years old and under, 14 and under, 16 and under and 18 and under.

The first four days of the championships at the Rideau Lawn Tennis Club are restricted to Canadian players, as eight closed titles—one for boys and girls in each of the four age groups—are decided. Next week, the Canadian talent will face stiff opposition from two Japanese and 40 or so American stars, as more than 250 young players seek top honors in 15 open events.

More than half the entries in the closed event are from Quebec and Ontario, but some come from British Columbia and Halifax.

Coach Clinic Starts Today

KINGSTON, Ont. (CP)—Canada's first instruction clinic for hockey coaches will start Thursday and run for 10 days at the Royal Military College here.

The clinic, sponsored by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, will feature lectures, demonstrations and panel discussions. About 70 coaches are expected to attend.

Aim of the clinic is to teach instruction techniques, to demonstrate practical coaching, to teach interpretation of rules, to give advice on how to conduct coaching clinics and to engender a wholesome philosophy toward amateur hockey.

The clinic, made possible through a grant of \$50,000 from the federal government, has been approved by the department of national health and welfare under the provisions of the Fitness and Amateur Sport Act.

Four similar clinics will be held this fall at the University of New Brunswick, the University of Saskatchewan, the University of Alberta and the University of Toronto.

TOP SEEDS FROM WEST

TORONTO (CP)—Metro Police on Wednesday arrested James J. Parker, 34, former Canadian heavyweight boxing champion, on a charge of attempting to extort \$60,000 from a Toronto resident by threats.

Police said the arrest followed investigation of a complaint by a construction worker that had been accented on a building site by a man who claimed he belonged to a collection agency.

The man told police he ignored the approach and plumbing installations on the site were damaged.
