Malan Measure Passes First Reading In House

CAPETOWN, April 23 (AP) - The South African Assembly voted 70-57 today for the first parliamentary reading of Prime Minister Daniel Malan's bill to create a high court of parliament that would outrank the country's existing court.

Malan thus won a major tactical victory in his fight to keep the courts from blocking a white supremacy program advocated by his Nationalist Party. The vote opened the way for a full debate on the measure, bitterly opposed by the United and Labour Parties.

The immediate purpose of the bill is to bypass a ruling of the Appeals (Supreme) Court last month that one of Malan's most important laws was unconstitutional because it was passed by a bare majority rather than a two-thirds majority.

That law aimed at cutting the historic voting rights of about 50,000 colored persons (mixed blood) in Cape Province, Natal, and the Orange Free State. Malan's regime has organized protests. The first violence came last night at Alberton. In Transvaal Province, Nationalists broke up a United Party meeting in disorder. They threw stones and eggs, started fights in the meeting hall, set fire to United Party banners and tried to burn a car. Protest meetings in other parts of South Africa were heckled.

Street Repair Problem

In discussing the street work to be done this summer Coun. F. J. Storey, chairman of the Street Committee, informed the Council that Mr. Hewitt had arrived Monday and had made a quick tour of inspection. He asked Mr. Hewitt who had 20 years experience to give the Council an outline of his findings. Mr. Hewitt stated that his inspection showed that in lots of cases where repairs were necessary the sub-base was useless and that others required resurfacing. Defends Role Of U. S. Capital In Quebec

MONTREAL, April 23 (CP) - Stanley Woodward, United States ambassador to Canada today defended investment of United States capital in Quebec and said "denunciation of foreign capital, trusts and unions have become a commonplace tactic" in this province only in recent years.

Addressing a service club luncheon, Mr. Woodward suggested "more moderate groups recognize the contribution American business has made to the economic development of Quebec." Natural resources must be exploited if they are to be resources instead of buried treasure, he said. "To do so requires large amounts of capital, technical knowledge, and a willingness to gamble on the outcome of often unprofitable explorations.

"I think you will agree that my fellow countrymen have helped Quebec in these respects, and have contributed to the notable rise in the French-Canadian standard of living. Mr. Woodward said Canada and

Planes Leave On Sunday For Arctic Exercises

On Sunday afternoon three Lancaster aircraft will take off from the R.C.A.F. station at Summerside on Operation Navar 52. This will consist of about ten days of flying in the Arctic by members of the specialist navigation course and will mark the end of their post-graduate six months training.

The purpose of the operation is "to carry out a series of flights over the Canadian Arctic in order to practice various techniques that have been developed for high altitude navigation, and to test navigation equipment." Squadron Leader G.C. Peck will be in command of the operation and S-L C. L. Heide will be the deputy commander. S-L H. Peterson, D.F.C., who commands the flying wing of the station will be the chief pilot.

This operation will mark the last of many long distance flights that have been made by this course to points all over the North American continent and to the United Kingdom. Similar flights are made by all such courses but there is only one held every year. In addition to the Canadians on the course there is one officer of the United States Air Force. The base for the operations will be at Resolution Bay in the North West Territories.

U.S. Gov't Orders Boost In Steel Price Ceiling

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP) - The United States Government ordered an increase of about \$8 a ton in steel price ceilings today. At the same time Economic Stabilizer Roger L. Putnam said he sees no justification for any further price increases to pay for wage raises.

The move came only a few hours after the Truman administration had taken the next-to-last step toward a pay raise order for the seized industry by putting up to Putnam the question, "How much?" Putnam said it will be next week before he can make the pay recommendation. Commerce Secretary Charles Sawyer, operator of the mills for the government, referred the pay issue to the Stabilization Office and said that when he gets the answer he will take it to President Truman for final action.

Putnam then announced at a press conference that he had directed Price Stabilizer Ellis Arnall to get out an order under which the mills may, if they choose, boost prices by the amount allowed under the Capehart amendment to the Defense Production Act. That provision allows price adjustments to reflect cost changes up to last July 26.
