MONDAY

The death-bed conferring of a degree of Doctor of Laws by St. Francis Xavier University ended the long-time co-operative movement activities of Professor Angus Bernard (A. B.) MacDonald who died in Ottawa early Saturday morning. He was fifty-nine years of age.

Dr. MacDonald, was widely known in Prince Edward Island where he appeared frequently on the platform at many meetings in his efforts to build up the co-operative movement in Canada.

The degree was to have been conferred on him at the Centenary celebration of St. Francis Xavier next year, but when his illness indicated that he would not survive until then Mr. Daniel Gaspar, president of the Ottawa Branch, was given authority by the University to confer the degree. He acted for the University's president, Right Rev. F. L. Nicholson.

A native of Antigonish, N. S., he was a pioneer in extension work at the university which honored him, and had also done a service to his country through the introduction into Canada of CARE and his work as National Chairman of the United Nations International Childrens Emergency Fund.

Fire which broke out yesterday morning in the attic of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Cyrus Arsenault, 810 Duke Street, did extensive damage to the roof of the house before being brought under control by the Summerside Fire Department.

The fire was first noticed by Mrs. Arsenault, who, being unable to get at the location of the fire, took her two children and rushed next door to phone for assistance. The firemen were obliged to cut two holes in the roof to get at the fire, because it was burning under the shingles in many sections of the roof, was most difficult to extinguish.

The large home of Mr. Thomas Boyles, Coleman, was completely destroyed by fire yesterday morning about eleven thirty. A smaller building near the main house was moved to safety by neighbors who had quickly gathered and who managed to save some of the contents of the ground floor. Nothing was saved from the upper story of the house.

A call was put in for the O'Leary fire brigade but they were unable to attend as the fire truck was un-serviceable.

Mr. Raymond Player, M. A. Mus. Bac., organist and choirmaster at Trinity United Church, returned last week from Austin, Texas, after a special course of studies at the University of Texas, which lasted a month.

The course was given by the Organ Institute and was conducted by Power Biggs, internationally known concert organist of the Harvard Institute. He was assisted by Ernest White, organist of the Church of the Virgin Mary in New York, who also goes by air once each week to teach at the University of Western Ontario. Mr. Player was the only Canadian attending the course, which dealt with details regarded as the vanguard of modern thought in organ playing and organ building.

The United States was the drawing card which called the advanced students, numbering 25, to Texas, who were given daily demonstrations on this most modern production of the organ builders art.

Mr. Player also visited New Orleans, Chicago and Memphis on his trip back to the Island.

The death of Mrs. John Hammond Pierce occurred on Saturday at the home of her sister, Mrs. D. A. MacKinnon, 3 Kent Street, after a brief illness. Mrs. Pierce, who was preceded by her husband some years ago, was born at Milton, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David C. Hooper and after graduating from Prince of Wales College taught at Prince Street School for a number of years.

As a member of St. Paul's Anglican Church, Mrs. Pierce devoted a major part of her adult life to the building work of the Women's Auxiliary, of which she was a past president. She also was honoured by being elected secretary of the De-

Dominion Board of the W. A. for a term. Surviving are Mrs. D. A. MacKinnon, with whom she lived; Mrs. Corlet, in Vancouver; and Mrs. Ambrose Coles, Regina, Sask., also two brothers, Pope Hooper at Milton and Benjamin Ray Hooper, London, Ont.

Secretaries of Maritime Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce will gather in Charlottetown on Monday, October 6th for their second annual Secretarial Conference. The conference will precede the annual meeting of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade to be held on October 7-8 in Charlottetown. This was announced today by A. T. Parkes, Executive Secretary of the M. P. B. T. and General Chairman of the Conference.

TUESDAY

The personal congratulations of President Harry Truman of the United States, followed Mr. Cyrus Ching, a native of this Province on his retirement as Director of the Federal Mediation Service. His resignation was accepted by the President yesterday.

Mr. Ching, 74, is one of the biggest Islanders abroad, being six feet, seven inches tall and weighs well over 240 pounds.

He was born at Red Point and grew up on an Island farm. Mr. Ching went to the United States at an early age and served as a motorman on the street railway in Boston before completing his study of law.

In later years he was Director of Industrial and Public Relations for the U. S. Rubber Company and has one solid formula for the settlement of industrial disputes. It is based on his belief that "Conflict between management and labor is unnecessary," and that in fighting they have everything to lose and nothing to gain. He always has advised all warring parties to work on the new dam being constructed at Ellerslie under instructions from the Biological Board of Canada, Fisheries Research Branch, is being pushed ahead rapidly with a view to having the job completed by Sept. 25. Construction on this project was started on July 29 and the dam, when completed, will be the first of its kind to be erected in the Island.

When completed there will be a 10-foot head of water easily controlled in the usual way but with an emergency spill at one end of the approach similar to a by-pass in reverse, to carry off any load during spring freshets.

The Rotary Club at its regular luncheon meeting yesterday at the Charlottetown Hotel, strongly endorsed a resolution moved by T. Roy Cudmore, seconded by Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, calling upon the board of directors to look fully into the matter of the establishment here of a branch of the Victorian Order of Nurses.

President Gordon Award announced that the American Ambassador to Canada, Hon. Stanley Woodward, would be the speaker at Rotary next Monday in the main dining room of the Charlottetown, with Government officials and business men in attendance.

The annual membership drive for the Charlottetown Little Theatre Guild was launched last night at an enthusiastic meeting of workers. Names of prospective members were divided among them and contacts will be made this week in an endeavor to have the list completed by next Monday night. Two types of members are being sought, active and associate, both adult and student.

More active members are needed to take part in the different steps of producing and staging plays in order to obtain the full value of an enterprise of this kind.

Miss Iphigene Arsenault is chairman of the membership committee.

WEDNESDAY

The possibility of replacing the bridge at Montague with a causeway dam is receiving serious consideration by the Department of Public Works and Highways, according to information received yesterday from Hon. Douglas MacKinnon, Minister of the De-

"We have had Mr. O. J. McCulloch, consulting engineer from Montreal whose firm planned the Canso Bridge, look over the situation recently, and until we hear from him further, no decision will be reached," Mr. MacKinnon stated.

The death occurred at the Prince Edward Island Hospital yesterday afternoon of Lieut. Col. Charles John Cecil Stewart, M.C. after a brief illness.

The late Lieut. Col. Stewart was born at Southport, the son of the late John Stewart and Beatrice Hazen Stewart. He was educated at Prince of Wales College and served for some years with the Canadian Bank of Commerce and other banking institutions and enlisted for overseas service at the outbreak of the First World War. He is survived by his wife, Margaret Rogers Stewart, and by two brothers, Guy and Edwin, who still reside on the old homestead at Bellevue Southport. A nephew, Mr. Clive Stewart is employed in the engineering department of the Civil Service and resides in Charlottetown.

One of the driest summers experienced here in several years started yesterday when a mild rain started early in the morning. Prior to that there had been only 6.55 inches of rain during the period from the first of July. Last year in the same time there were 14.25 inches of rain.

July was really dry with only 2.48 inches of rain, and August was not much better with just 3.34 inches. The same months last year produced 5.82 and 7.00 inches respectively. The first half of this month brought forth only .73 inches compared to the 1.32 inches of the first two weeks of September last year.

"Thank God, our people are going early enough to the doctor, to save their own lives in the majority of cases of suspected cancer," said Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, O.B.E., President of the P. E. I. Dr. MacMillan was speaking to the workers in the city cancer campaign last night in the Legion Hall who at the first "turn-in" reported about 50% of their objective.

Campaign chairman W. H. Beaton thanked the workers for what he considered one of the most successful city cancer campaigns ever held. Mr. Beaton announced the next turn-in for next Tuesday evening at the Legion Hall.

Mr. Allister Stewart, Georgetown, was elected president of the Progressive Conservative Association, Fifth District of King's at the annual meeting held in the Council chambers at Georgetown last night. Other officers are vice president, John MacGuigan, Sturgeon; and secretary, Cameron Reid, Murray Harbour North. Elected to represent the district on the county association were Dan MacLean, De Gros Mars and Reid Underhay, Bay Fortune. Mr. MacLean will also represent the district on the provincial executive.

THURSDAY

One of the largest crowds ever to attend a Queen's County Plowing Match yesterday watched some of the best plowing seen to date. The Match was held on the Pownall farm of Layton Jones and Son and was witnessed by a throng estimated at upwards of 2,000 people.

The largest entry list of the day came towards the close of the show when the delayed Open, two-soad, tractor class was called. There were 20 plowmen took to the field for this and some very keen competition resulted.

The West Kent Home and School Association held the opening meeting of the school year last night. The president, Mr. F. A. Large presided. Mr. Bert Larkin was appointed secretary. Mr. C. F. Hine, principal of the school, introduced

the teachers and spoke on the value of the Home and School Association.

The 2nd annual Kensington rodeo was held yesterday afternoon and evening with large crowds attending both afternoon and evening competitions and entertainment. This yearly event is sponsored jointly by the Junior Chamber of Commerce, and Athletic Association and the Community Club.

Tractor driving and pulling competitions, farm equipment displays, a baseball game, and a big street parade were the highlights of the afternoon, followed by a chicken and ham supper, served by the ladies of the Community Club. Army manoeuvres by a light tank and armoured vehicles opened the evening's entertainment immediately after supper, and at this time a group of delighted youngsters were thrilled when taken for a drive in the army vehicles. The evening's entertainment, even more largely attended than the afternoon, was continued inside the rink, with band music, tractor and horse pulling competitions and a stage show, followed by a big street dance on Commercial Street, which ended a very successful rodeo.

The Summerside recreation grounds were officially opened yesterday afternoon with W. Chester MacDonald, president of the Summerside Athletic Association, as master of ceremonies. Loud speakers were placed out by home plate and the officials taking part were seated on either side of the speaker's desk. Mr. MacDonald first introduced George Olskamp who on behalf of the Kinsmen Club presented the wading pool to the children's playground in the town. Mrs. Elmer Murphy made a presentation of the play equipment on behalf of the Kinettes.

Baseball games, track and field events, and ladies' softball were all run off in the afternoon and street dancing was the order of the evening.

The program was under the supervision of James Hogan.

The sudden death occurred at his home on Convent Street last evening of Mr. Jesse Huestis, a highly respected citizen of the town for many years. Mr. Huestis had been in his usual good health all day and had been at work all morning and during the Wednesday half holiday had been doing work around the house all afternoon. At supper time, he came in and was stricken with a heart attack from which he died shortly after.

He leaves to mourn his widow, the former Minnie Leard, of Augustine Cove, two sons, Albert and Harold in Summerside, two daughters Rita (Mrs. Lovell Hancock), Summerside, Hattie (Mrs. T. E. Steel), Mainville, Conn. Funeral arrangements were not completed last evening.—S.

FRIDAY

The residents of Tignish voted yesterday in a plebiscite to become incorporated under the Village Services Act. Results indicated 123 voted for incorporation, 67 opposed and there were 40 spoiled ballots.

Mr. J. Hubert Hall, sheriff of Prince County was in charge of the polls, assisted by Miss Josephine Gaudet, his secretary, and J. T. Arsenault and Urbain Gaudet. It is understood that now three commissioners will be appointed by the Provincial Government to administer the affairs of the village until elections are held in February.

Mr. Aeneas MacDonald, 43, of Charlottetown, was fatally injured in a highway accident near Brookfield at an early hour yesterday morning. Mr. MacDonald and his son Gerald, Malpeque Road, were travelling in a truck and just previous to the accident had assisted a stalled car by pushing.

As the stalled car gained momentum, the two passengers looked

back and noticed the headlights of the truck pointing the wrong way. They at once got out and ran back when they were met by Gerald MacDonald who had released himself from the overturned car. Another car proceeding towards Charlottetown took all four including the injured man, to the city. Mr. MacDonald died shortly after being admitted to the Charlottetown Hospital. His son suffered only minor facial injuries.

Potato Board Order 9 "has not been amended as yet in any way," Mr. Donald A. MacDonald, chairman of the P. E. I. Potato Marketing Board stated to a Guardian representative last night.

He was questioned following a meeting of a group of representative potato dealers at which they stated their refusal to act as agents for the collection of license fees from potato growers as outlined in Clause 12 of the Potato Board order.

Mr. MacDonald stated that Clause 12 which specifically deals with the manner of licensing producers is again "under consideration" and will not go into effect until October 1. "In the meantime," he said, "the licensing of dealers, assemblers and export truckers is being carried on with a favorable response."

Mr. Wilfred Saunders, wild life biologist with the Fisheries Research Board at Ellerslie, was the guest speaker at a special meeting of Queen's County Branch of the P. E. I. Fish and Game Protection Association held at the recreation hall at Cavendish on Wednesday evening.

Mr. Saunders gave a summary of the work being conducted by his group throughout the Island. They are concerned with trout rearing, experiments in which population, productivity and growth are carefully studied. Mr. Saunders indicated that the future of trout fishing in this province is very promising.
