Will Keep Cars Out Of Town

WINNIPEG CP) — In 10 years few automobiles will be allowed into downtown areas of North American cities, Paul O. Dittmar of Chicago, president of the American Transit Association, said Monday. Speaking at the annual meeting of the Canadian Transit Association, he said one of the answers to problems facing transit commissions must be the provision of exclusive transit streets and lanes to be used by buses and bus-trains. He said there should be: Better transit service which would make buses socially acceptable to people who now drive high-priced automobiles; faster service at least equal to the speed of cars and the wedding of transit riders into an effective political pressure group.

Appointed as U.K. Deputy High Commissioner to New Delhi in June 1951, he served under Sir Archibald Nye and Sir Alexander Clutterbuck until April 1953, when he returned to London and served Office as Deputy Under-Secretary until his appointment as U.K. High Commissioner to Canada, K.C.M.G. He was made a Knight Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George (K.C.M.G.) in 1954. He married (1938) Margaret Beckman of Indiana, U.S.A. There are three children; two boys, both now in England at Highgate School, and a daughter with her parents in Ottawa, where she was born. Lady Garner was a Founder Member of the Delhi Commonwealth Women's Association, and is Chairman of the Highgate Branch of the Victoria League. Both are keen skiers, enjoy music, reading and gardening. Saville is Garner's family name, but he is probably better remembered in Canada as Joe Garner.

Rare Isotope May Bring End Of Explosions

By GEORGE KITCHEN Canadian Press Staff Writer WASHINGTON (CP) — Strontium is a silvery white metal, soft and light like aluminum and not too plentiful in nature, which ordinarily is used to extract sugar from molasses. Outside of scientific circles, little was heard of it until a few months ago when the American public suddenly became aware that a close relative of strontium—a radioactive isotope known as strontium 90—can infect man with cancer of the blood and the bone. Because of this peculiar ability, strontium 90 has become the centre of a public and scientific debate which is mushrooming like the atomic cloud that spawns it and spews it into the atmosphere. SPURS BAN ON BOMB And, because of the public pressure it thus is generating, this little-known isotope may prove to be the factor that will propel the United States into reaching agreement with Britain and Russia, the two other H-bomb powers, on a ban on atomic tests. Some observers here suggest this might develop within the next year. For strontium 90 is a by-product of the atomic age. It is formed during an atomic explosion and blown high into the stratosphere, where it drifts about the globe before slowly drifting down to earth. Much like calcium in chemical composition, it invades plant life and reaches the human body through the vegetables you eat and the milk you drink. It settles in the teeth and the bone structure because the body's digestive tract is unable to differentiate between the needed calcium and the unwanted strontium 90. It is against this backdrop of public and scientific concern—and fear—that a subcommittee of the United States Congress currently is hearing evidence from more than 40 scientists on the hazards of atomic fall out. It wants to determine whether man is imperilling himself and future generations by continued testing of atomic weapons. The debate has divided scientists into two camps. Some maintain that the dangers of test fall-out are great, that man is nearing the limit of the amount of bomb-induced radioactivity he can absorb without ill effect.
