Montreal Needs Up To 30 Million More Revenue

MONTREAL, (CP)—A city council committee reported Thursday after an 11-month study that Montreal needs from \$20,000,000 to \$30,000,000 additional revenue annually and logical sources for the money are the Quebec and federal governments.

The 32-page report was prepared by nine councillors, headed by Marcel Lafaille, who studied apportionment of taxes and responsibilities among the city, provincial and federal administrations. It will be presented to the city's executive committee and may be used in preparation of a brief by the city to the Quebec royal commission on constitutional problems.

Montreal has enough revenue to meet administrative costs but it must have more to allow it to pay debt-carrying charges on money which will have to be borrowed to finance planned projects, the report said. Without the help of the federal and provincial governments such projects as a subway or the expressway could not be realized.

Measures cited as possible sources of additional revenues were: Lifting or easing of certain costs now borne by the city; sharing of revenues collected here by the higher governments; subsidies to compensate for non-payment of taxes on properties now tax-exempt; new taxes; taking over cer- tain commercial services, such as electricity distribution; subsidies on the basis of population, as now is done in Ontario; and direct federal and provincial help in important municipal projects.

Taxed To Limit

Montrealers now were taxed to the limit of their capacity. The report said no additional municipal tax levy should be imposed until a proper division of powers and obligations has been reached among the three governments, "even if to arrive at a satisfactory result it is necessary to modify the Canadian constitution."

Elaborating on potential sources of revenue, the report said that the city's present tax base is being eroded by the provincial government and should be undertaken by the province, at a saving to the city of \$4,000,000 annually.

Stating the city's right to a fair share of federal health grants, the report also noted that Montreal taxpayers paid \$17,000,000 in 1952 for school taxes and declared that the province should be responsible for pre-university and university costs. Grants to universities and hospitals now made by the city should be undertaken by the provincial government, it added.

Compensation to the city for the loss of the power to tax personal income was urged. The report setting the figure at about \$10,000,000 annually.

Noting that the province collected \$16,800,000 in Montreal from taxes on motor vehicle licenses and gasoline in 1952, the council- lours recommended that the province follow the example set in the United States of sharing 50 per cent in this revenue with the city.

Toronto, (CP) — Canada's major rubber companies Monday admitted in court that for 15 years they engaged in a conspiracy to prevent or lessen competition in the sale of automobile tires and tubes.

The eight companies and the Rubber Association of Canada pleaded guilty to the combines charge. Argument and evidence on sentence is expected to take two days.

Publisher Sued For Five Million

LOS ANGELES, (AP)—The pub- lisher of the Los Angeles Daily News has been sued for \$5,604,000 damages on the allegation that he made a contract for sale of the controlling interest in the news- paper.

Sheldon F. Sackett, California and Oregon newspaper publisher and radio station operator, brought the action against Robert L. Smith, charging that Smith repudiated an agreement made with Sackett last Oct. 24.

Sackett placed a value of \$5,000,000 on the assets he expected to acquire from Smith. A copy of the alleged agreement between Sackett and Smith provided that Smith was to be employed by The News in an advisory capacity for seven years at \$25,000 a year.

Smith said he had no comment on the suit beyond a statement: he made last Thursday in announc- ing cancellation of the proposed deal. At that time he said Sackett's proposal to purchase an interest in The News was conditional upon financial and collateral considera- tions "which were not complied with by Sackett."

U. S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND, (AP)—More than 10 per cent of U. S. steelmaking capacity is idle for lack of business but the production decline thus far is not considered alarming, Steel Magazine reported today.

"Almost everyone expected the drop," the metalworking weekly said, "and long-range predictions for the steel industry radiate an optimism."

Steel attributed much of the decline to a downward reduction in inventories and said that "it's thought in some instances, inven- tories have been reduced so far that their owners would scurry forth to order steel" if it appeared demand were rising.

During last week, the steel pro- duction rate dropped two points to 90.5 per cent of rated capacity. At last week's rate, the industry turned out 2,040,000 net tons of steel. It was only three years ago that the industry became capable of producing more than 2,000,000 a week.

Russians In Red For Taxes

EAST NORWICH, N.Y., (AP) — The Russians are in the red on taxes for two mansions they own on Long Island—one of them oc- cupied by Andrei Vishinsky.

A notice here, "Norwich House" has been put on notice for public sale Dec. 7 unless a Nassau county tax bill of \$2,918, five months in arrears, is paid.

The other estate, "Killenworth," at Glen Cove, has been put on notice for public sale for a \$-396 tax delinquency.

The Soviet first deputy foreign minister and permanent delegate to the United Nations occupies Killenworth with his wife, daughter and staff. Various Russian staff members and children live at Nor- wich House.

The Russians have had tax delinquencies previously on Killenworth. They contended they were entitled to a diplomatic tax exemp- tion, but eventually paid the taxes.

Bidault Appears Near Collapse

PARIS, (AP)—Foreign Minister Georges Bidault appeared on the verge of collapse when he ap- peared before the National Assem- bly today in a foreign policy de- bate. Bidault was helped from the platform after he had read only a third of his prepared address.

The 54-year-old Foreign Minis- ter is scheduled to depart for Ber- muda in 10 days with Premier Joseph Laniel for the three-power conference.

The Foreign Minister, who has been under an extreme pressure of work, was reported to have been up all night preparing his ad- dress. As one cabinet minister put it: "He has been on the bridge throughout this debate."
