MURDER OF A NEW BRUNSWICK WOMAN IN NEW YORK.—On Saturday Rev. Dr. Maclise received an official notice from the District Attorney, at Albany, seeking information about the marriage of a young woman named Rosalie Hilton, who was murdered at Albany a short time ago.

William McNeill, the young woman's husband is the alleged murderer, and is in custody awaiting the action of the court in the matter. Dr. Maclise sent a telegram in reply, stating that he had married two persons of the names given, and that the marriage was solemnized about the 19th of last November at his residence. The man, he said, appeared with the woman at his house in the afternoon of that day, and from what he could learn from O'Neill he believed he was a captain and had come from the United States to marry this woman. As near as can be learned the victim of the sad affair belongs to the North Shore. After the marriage ceremony the couple proceeded to New York, since which time no knowledge of their doings had been made known to Dr. Maclise until Saturday, when he was apprised of the rash act of the husband.—*St. John Telegraph.*

COUNTERFEITERS GETTING STRUNG UP.—Of course, our readers remember that Lefurgey was sent to the Penitentiary for the term of his natural life for counterfeiting Merchants' Bank and Union Bank of P. E. Island notes. In Boston, about a fortnight ago, one Oliver Herd was found guilty of passing a ten dollar note of the Merchants' Bank and sent to States Prison. He was a native of Truro, having left there only last fall. On Saturday, at Truro, a man named Angus Chisholm was found guilty of passing bogus ten dollar bills of the same Bank. He has not yet been sentenced. Richardson, a party living in North Abingdon, a short distance out of Boston, is under arrest, charged with printing the counterfeiters, and will have his trial shortly. The whole of these men belong to the same gang, which may now be regarded as thoroughly broken up.—*St. John Sun.*

DEATHS FROM STARVATION.
The wife of a man named John Boylan, of Treenerery, near Boyle, is alleged to have died of starvation. The police have been informed of the circumstance, and an inquest will be held. The death of a man named Patrick Fryars, Coahall, from want of food, is also reported.

FIGHT WITH THE POLICE.
A desperate land quarrel took place on Tuesday morning at Agabeg, near Tralee. The landlord, Mr. Hussey, dispatched four sheriff's bailiff and a body of police to turn out a man named Kelly for non-payment of rent, but on arriving at the farm they were met by about 200 men armed with pikes, shovels, and sticks. After repeated attempts to evict the defaulting tenant, the police and bailiff's were forced to beat a retreat. Mr. William Hamitt, the sub-sheriff, received a blow from a stone on the head, which rendered him senseless, and from the effects of which he is dangerously ill. Three bailiff's were badly hurt, and one of them is in a very precarious state.

ENORMOUS INCREASE IN EMIGRATION.
Much attention is attracted by the steady tide of emigration to America from all parts of Ireland. The population in the counties of Mayo, Roscommon, Sligo, Leitrim, and parts of Galway, is decreasing considerably, and even in those midland and southern districts, where the pressure of the distress has not been so much felt, many homes have been broken up. From returns made up on Wednesday at the Liverpool Emigration Office it appears that during the month of April no fewer than 29,419 persons sailed from the Mersey, as compared with 12,363 in the previous month, and 10,917 in April, 1879. These figures are the largest ever known, and indicate how great is the wave of emigration to America, to which destination nearly all the emigrants have gone. The emigrants are of all nationalities, 13,830 being foreigners, 9,310 English, 151 Scotch, and 6,027 Irish. Emigration to America from the Clyde continues to increase. The Anchor Line steamer leaving on Thursday night had 500 steerage passengers, many of whom were foreigners, and a large proportion were women and children. The great emigration has given quite an impetus to the steamship trade between Glasgow and America.

"VE UNWISSE REPORTERS."
The reporters of the daily press in London are proverbial for their inaccuracy of ecclesiastical subjects. In pursuing their reports, one may gain enough ignorance in ten minutes to last a twelvemonth. The latest is: A reporter writing up the account of the consecration of Bishop Ryle, of Liverpool, spoke of the ceremony as taking place on the Feast *St. Barabas*. This reminds me of hearing of a learned gentleman having reported the fact that a clergyman walked into church with a *vestibule* on his back. Yet another, a few years ago the wise readers of the *Times* were shocked at reading that in the chancel of a certain London Church, there suspended *seven Thurfifers*; now, a Thurfifer is an ecclesiastical functionary; and the reporter made quite a tragic affair of his account. But this, my last one, is the climax: A South of England paper stated a short time ago, that the clergy of the parish were progressing so rapidly in their views that they were actually *practising celibacy* in the open streets.

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
