

Local and Other Items.

The Duke of Manchester and party sailed for England on Saturday.

Horses are being bought up in considerable numbers in Western Ontario for the Winnipeg market.

The Bible Christians at Winsloe Road (South) intend having a Tea in Mr. James Holman's field, on Thursday, July 6th.

The Canada Pacific Railway between Winnipeg and Prince Arthur's Landing will be open for passengers and freight traffic on the 1st of July.

A valuable horse belonging to A. Larkin Esq., of Alberton, was killed by the electric fluid, during the thunder storm on Sunday evening last.

Isabella Seaton, mother of John Seaton, of Strathroy, died in the township of Ekfrid, Ontario, on the 9th instant, at the advanced age of 107 years.

An Ottawa despatch says:—"The Globe has evidently read Mr. Anglin out of the party, as it states boastfully that no Liberal forfeited his deposit in the recent contest."

MONTREAL is in luck. A meat company, with \$100,000 capital, is about to open stores there to retail beef and mutton at cheaper rates than the butchers are selling at.—Toronto Mail.

Active preparations are being made in British Columbia for the visit of the Governor-General and the Princess. An effort is being made to secure return excursion tickets from the east at greatly reduced rates.

The Principal and Teachers of the Queen Square School are indebted to the gentlemen of the firm of Miller Bros., Queen Street, for the handsome organ so kindly placed at their disposal yesterday.

The Dominion post office savings bank account for May shows that the amount with drawn during the month was \$369,129. The deposits during the month amounted to \$569,720, and the balance to the credit of depositors on the 30th May was \$8,933,561.

The hopes of a good crop in England which were encouraged up to May 31st have been destroyed by the recent rains, and a defective yield is now inevitable. Mr. L. H. Davies will, doubtless, say "this is Sir John's luck." So we are not to have the "National Policy prosperity crushed like an egg-shell"—this year at any rate.

A PRIVATE letter conveys the sad intelligence that a young man from Rose Valley, Lot 67, was killed about two weeks ago while working on the Canada Pacific Railroad, by a stick falling on him. He left home some 18 months ago and was a son of Mr. Donald McLeod of the above mentioned place. We sympathize with his parents and friends.—Pioneer.

The Winnipeg Times, of the 20th instant says:—"E. Winstanley and Wm. Cain, of Rapid City, have just returned from an extensive tour through the Qu'Appelle country. They give a most glowing report of that section of the west. They met as many as four hundred settlers in one party moving toward the 'garden country.' They state that Mr. McDonald, ferryman at South Qu'Appelle, ferried across the river at that place, in one day, 164 carts and buckboards at fifty cents each.

OBITUARY NOTICE.—Mr. Wm. Curtis of Wilmot Valley died rather suddenly on Saturday morning last, aged 75 years. Deceased came from Cornwall, England, nearly 40 years ago, and settled in the above locality. He was a sober, honest, hard-working man, and like most of the early settlers, began with little except faith in persevering honest industry, and success crowned his efforts. He was a good member of society, a consistent and active member of the Methodist Church for over 50 years, and died rejoicing in his Saviour.—Pioneer.

This season gives promise so far of being good for fishermen. Lobsters are being caught in great plenty, indeed more than can be put up in many instances. Last week, a trap set off Kildare shore took a considerable catch of large mackerel, with those acquainted with the business take as a good indication of the season's fishing. American fishing vessels are already on the fishing grounds off Tignish. It is now some half a dozen years since we had anything like first-rate fishing round the Island, and it is almost time we were visited with something like the abundance of former times.—Pioneer.

THE BRAZIL LINE.—The French steamer "Desirade," of the Brazilian mail line, from Montreal, via Quebec, bound to the Brazils, arrived this morning at eight o'clock. She came here to finish loading for the Brazils. Her cargo from Montreal and Quebec comprises chiefly spruce and pine deals, flour and a general assortment of goods. Messrs. Henderson & Potts, are shipping a ton of blacking, in boxes, to Rio-de-Janeiro. The steamer will also take one thousand barrels of fish for St. Thomas, and other cargo from this port and will sail to-night. The "Desirade" is a very fine brig-rig steamer, of large carrying capacity, and is a good sailer. She is the first of the outward line from Montreal, and will be followed by the new steamer "Cears," of the same line.—Halifax Herald.

THE death is announced of Mr. Moss, editor of the Winnipeg Free Press. He was brother of the late Chief Justice Moss, of Ontario.

THE Minister of Justice having declined to recommend a reprieve in the case of Van Koughnet the Buck Lake murderer, he was hanged at Kingston on the 23rd inst.

As an illustration of the changes by the Dominion election it is stated that of the 198 elected, 69 are new to Parliament, 12 were not in the last house though they have been before, and only 117 are re-elected.

WE regret to learn that Mr. Haliburton, C. L., Director of Supplies and Transport, has broken his leg, and will be unable to attend to his official duties at the War Office for some weeks.—London Post, June 12.

THE HUB.—Several capitalists are making arrangements for the starting of a New Woolen Factory in Morrisburg. The Ontario car works and the car-wheel works, of London Ont., are to be amalgamated, and a steel factory is to be started in connection at once.

The Convention of the Young Men's Christian Association of the Maritime Provinces is to meet in Truro on Wednesday, August 9th, and continue in session until Thursday August 10th, when a welcome meeting will be held and the Dominion Convention constituted. The Dominion Convention will continue in session during the succeeding days of the week and close on Sunday evening.

In the yacht race yesterday afternoon, the "Carita" led all the way to the bell buoy; after turning the buoy, the "Emma" overhauled her rapidly, and had it not been for an accident to her rudder, which rendered her almost unmanageable, the race would have been a very close one, and it is impossible to say which would have won. As it was, the "Carita" crossed the line thirteen minutes ahead of the "Emma." We understand another match is being arranged for an early date.

THE Rev. Mr. Robertson's meeting in St. James' Church, last evening, was fairly well attended. In the absence of the Rev. Dr. Murray, (at the commencement) the Rev. K. McLennan opened the proceedings with singing and reading the scriptures. Prayer was offered by the Rev. Mr. McLeod of Strathalbyn. The Chairman then introduced Mr. Robertson, referring to his history and experience in the North-west, and the nature of the appointment which he holds from the General Assembly. Mr. Robertson addressed the meeting at length, and evidently awakened a large degree of interest in the object of his mission. Among those present were Rev. Dr. Murray, Rev. J. M. McLeod, Rev. Donald McNeill, Rev. Mr. McLeod, Strathalbyn, Hon. Mr. Laird, and other prominent members of the various Presbyterian congregations of the city. Several contributions were voluntarily tendered at the close of the meeting, for the Robertson Building Fund, for the North-west. These will be mentioned more particularly afterwards, together with arrangements for receiving additional contributions in the future.

Matters in Egypt are assuming a more threatening aspect, and the general feeling in England is that military intervention will be necessary at no distant date in order to protect British interests. The safety of the Suez Canal has caused great anxiety to the Home Government, and special precautions have been taken to protect the works and officials. The Sultan has guaranteed Arabi perfect immunity, and conferred the honour of the Mejidie upon him. It is thought that if a foreign force is landed in Egypt the Khedive will be immediately arrested. The Conference has discussed and confirmed the Sultan's suzerainty.

In the matter of an Act of the Parliament of Canada, passed in the forty-fifth year of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter 23, intitled an Act respecting Insolvent Banks, Insurance Companies, Loan Companies, Building Societies and Trading Corporations, and of the President, Directors and Company of the Bank of Prince Edward Island an Insolvent Banking Company.
