

Royals Overpower Aces In Maritime League Contest

The Charlottetown Royals tightened their hold on first place in the Maritime Senior Amateur Hockey League last night at the Sports Arena by overpowering the Summerside Aces 6-2.

Three of Charlottetown's greatest performers put on a scoring show for their home crowd. Allie Carver, Buck Whitlock and Skip Ready each contributed two goals to account for all but one of the Royals' scoring. FORBIE SCORES
