**HERRIDGE OFFERS CHECKE TO KEEP GOVT HAPPY**

OTTAWA (CP)—H. W. Herridge isn't one to put the taxpayers to extra expense just for his benefit.

So he handed his personal cheque for \$1,000 to the government in the Commons Wednesday to cover the cost of digging out nearly 10,000 letters and other documents he wants to peruse.

As it turned out, the government kept the cheque. But Mr. Herridge didn't get a firm commitment that the government would supply the material.

Mr. Herridge (NDP—Kootenay West) asked for letters, telegrams and other documents exchanged between the deputy minister of northern affairs and national resources, and the staff of the government board, since Jan. 1, 1961.

He didn't say why he wanted this. Presumably it is connected with his unflagging interest in the Columbia River power and flood control project.

**THOUGHT IT SETTLED**

Resources Minister Laing said he thought his executive assistant had settled the matter with Mr. Herridge, namely, it would be impossible to pull so much material out of files, but the MP was welcome to a volume of material that surely would satisfy his curiosity.

Mr. Herridge had a different understanding — namely, that it would be too costly.

So he produced the \$1,000 cheque.

A Commons page boy delivered the cheque to Mr. Laing's desk.

While the minister and the MP debated the point, Revenue Minister Garland — the country's revenue collector — reached over and plucked the cheque off Mr. Laing's desk.

Speaker Alan Macnaughton closed the matter by saying he would let it stand for a "few days."

**Ward Committed In Morals Case**

LONDON (CP) — Society osteopath Dr. Stephen Ward, key figure in the Profumo sex-and-security scandal, Wednesday was held for trial on morals charges and freed on bail after a preliminary hearing.

Judge Leo Gradwell ruled that Ward must answer before a jury charges ranging from living off the earnings of prostitutes to procuring an abortion.

The trial will be held in London's famous Old Bailey court, probably in September.

Ward has proclaimed his innocence.

Ward's lawyer applied for

ball, something which had twice been refused while the osteopath was still in custody pending the preliminary hearing, and the bail was granted. The amount of bail was not immediately disclosed.

During the three-day hearing, a Crown prosecutor declared that Ward provided bedrooms for girls in two flats he rented in London and took a cut of the money they "earned" as prostitutes.

**LADIES ONLY**

ROCKLAND, Ont. (CP)—Mrs. Joseph Charon asked council Tuesday to ban the wearing of shorts by women in this town 25 miles east of Ottawa. She contended some of the shorts are indecent. But Mrs. Charon, who said she represented a number of women's organizations in making the request, said in reply to a councillor's question that she saw nothing wrong with men wearing shorts.

**CAR ENTRIES INCREASE**

OTTAWA (CP)—Vehicles entering Canada from the United States rose 4 per cent in April to 1,419,200 from 1,414,200 in the same month last year, the bureau of statistics said Tuesday.

Foreign vehicles entering Canada increased 2.3 per cent in April to 659,300 from 644,600 a year earlier and 9 per cent in the four months to 1,082,300 from 1,065,700.
