### F. Blachford Adjudicator At Musical Festival Dies

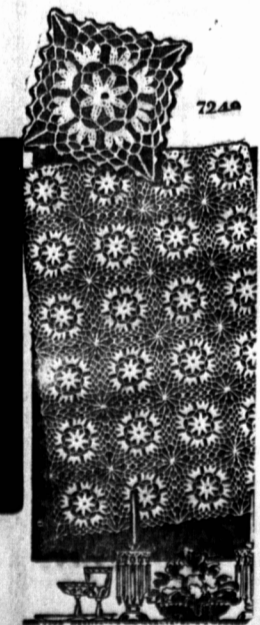
A pioneer of Canadian radio, Frank Blachford, one of Canada's Senior musicians and teachers, died suddenly in Calgary Monday. A faculty member of the Royal Conservatory of Music of Toronto since 1901, Mr. Blachford, 78, was remembered by thousands as the leader of one of Canada's first radio orchestras. Titles of many of his compositions were placed in the "Musical Lakes" district where he had a summer home. Born in Toronto, Mr. Blachford went to Leipzig after graduating from high school and winning the gold medal at Toronto Conservatory.

#### Old Rule Still Holds By Being Clean And Neat

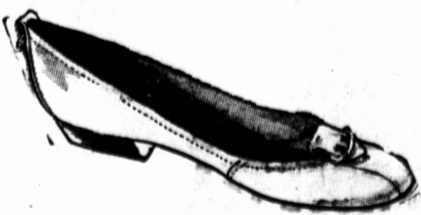

### Shoes Fit Foot Not Pocketbook

NEW YORK (CP) — Alan E. Murray's own aching feet led him to invent shoes that are really foot-shaped. The 62-year-old, white-haired Murray has sold 100,000 pairs of his "space shoes," which look like something out of science fiction. The inventor calls his chunky, thick-soled foot coverings "space shoes" because there is space for every corn and bunion, for every contour of the foot. Arthur Godfrey is one of the most enthusiastic rosters for the shoes, moulded from rubberized leather on casts of the wearer's feet. Dany Kaye, Beatrice Lillie and Joe DiMaggio also wear them.

The standard model covers the entire foot and has a wedge heel, a blunt front and side lacing. The inner sole is literally a foot-print. The hand-made shoes are expensive — up to \$70 a pair.

"You can make standard tires for a car, but you can't treat man like a car," Murray said. The inventor's wife, a former dancer, whipped off her emerald green space sandals to show feet as strong and flexible as hands. She said 60 per cent of their customers are women, "because woman are less conservative than men."

Murray became a shoemaker after foot trouble ended his 20-year career as a skating instructor. He said dental plates gave him the idea of a moulded shoe. He set up shop 20 years ago in a \$3-a-week shack in Wilmington, Del. Today, he has 150 employees, a Connecticut factory, two studios in New York and one in Wilmington. He has taken out 38 patents.

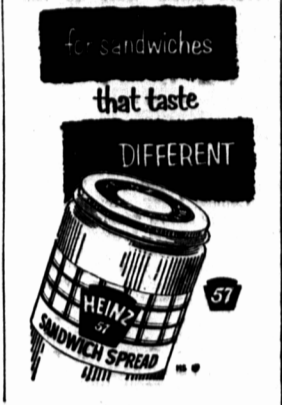
