Role of Organizations For Teachers Outlined

"Until society gives recognition to the right of teachers to the greater role that teachers' organizations have yet to play in giving leadership for change, experimentation and improvement can never be materialized," declared Thomas Parker, executive secretary of the Nova Scotia Teachers' Association, at a Saturday at the workshop sponsored by the P.E.I. Teachers' Federation in Charlottetown.

The speaker noted that all provincial teacher organizations devote the major part of their time and effort in trying to improve the lot of the individual teacher.

Consequently, he said, a number of reasons have been involved in long and often frustrating struggles to obtain better salaries, pensions, conditions of tenure, and legal protection.

They have also been involved in such activities as pressing for higher teacher standards, improvement in the content and quality of teacher training, and for establishment of model professional behavior. The federation has also shown increasing concern regarding the professional service provided to children in the classroom, his attention was drawn to the meeting in the afternoon, which comprised representatives from all island local except Montague, thoroughly discussed the matter of "special associations" within the federation.

It was stated that these special associations are formed of groups of teachers within the

provincial body, organized on the basis of a special teaching interest or skill.

Their purpose is to provide a means by which the provincial organization can encourage and assist teachers with in-service or professional development activities.

A special association is defined as a group of teachers in a particular subject field, act as a clearing house for ideas and furnish recommendations and advice to the provincial executive and other committees.

Following the discussion a motion was passed that, the meeting present this matter of special associations within the P.E.I. T.F. to the board of government which is scheduled to meet next Saturday.

TORIES KIDNAP LIBERAL "BRAIN CHILD"

Having refused to adopt the Liberal "Brain Child" for upwards of two years the Tories have NOW kidnapped it. For this political misdeed they are accountable before the bar of public opinion. Probably never before has such a bold political about-face been made in this Province. Of course without meaning to the Tory Party has paid a high compliment to Liberal Statesmanship . . . by taking to its heart the Liberal "Brain Child", even if it can make no claim to parenthood. Naturally when the Liberals are returned to office after December 1963, they will continue to cherish their own child . . . Liberals will abolish Hospital Premiums and release payments from September 30th, 1962.
