## Deputy Chief Scout Arrives Here Today

Canada's new Deputy Chief Scout, Air Vice-Marshal James B. Harvey, A.F.C., C.D., will arrive in the province this afternoon and will meet with scouts and members of the Provincial Council, Boy Scouts of Canada, at a reception and banquet in Charlottetown this evening.

Air Vice-Marshal Harvey had a distinguished career in the Royal Canadian Air Force. He served as Director of Training at Air Force Headquarters in Canada, Senior Personnel Staff Officer at Training Command Headquarters in Trenton, was a member of the Canadian Joint Staff in London, England, Chief Staff Officer at Training Command Headquarters and in 1959 a similar post at Air Defence Command at St. Hubert. In 1962 he was given the post of Commander Northern NORAD Region Headquarters. In September 1965 he retired from that position and returned to civilian life.

He was awarded the Air Force Cross in 1945 for his contribution to air crew training under the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan. Air Vice-Marshal Harvey will leave the Province Wednesday morning to complete his tour of the Atlantic Provinces.

## Council Approves Application

GEORGETOWN — The town council of Georgetown met in an emergency meeting in council chambers last night and gave approval to an application for a building permit for a \$500,000 shopping complex and 20 unit motel.

The applicants were Bathurst Marine Limited and Gulf Gardens Foods Limited, acting as agents for the developers, who at this stage of proceedings, were not named.

The complex will be located at the entrance to Georgetown at the intersection of Kent Street and Monture Avenue with a frontage of 1,400 feet on both Kent Street and Monture Avenue, and a depth of 500 feet. The area involved includes 203,800 square feet. The complex includes a supermarket, hardware store, drug store, a bank, a 20-unit motel and an auto service and gas station.

A parking area for 200 automobiles is provided for. The ground floor area will be 31,400 square feet with a basement area of the same.

Construction will be of wood and steel, with a concrete foundation. Roof material of metal and asphalt. Exterior finish of wood and brick, with interior finish done in drywall. There will be hot water heating and the developers will pay the cost of the installation of the water and sewer lines to connect with existing and planned systems.

The land on which the complex will be erected was former common land and given by the town to the P.E.I. Industrial Corporation about two years ago.

## Escaped Prisoner Arrested

Andrew Alphonse Arsenaux, 20, who escaped the confines of Riverside Hospital late Sunday night, was apprehended by two members of the Borden detachment of the RCMP west of Bonshaw last night at 6:50.

Arsenaux, formerly of Abram's Village, was accused of the shooting murder of Joseph Tilman Gallant, Abram's Village, on July 31, 1960, and was acquitted by reason of insanity November 11 of that year. Through a Lieutenant-Governor's warrant he was committed to mental hospital and has since moved between various penal and mental institutions.

Arsenaux, apprehended without resistance by Cpl. C. M. Clark and Cst. J.F. McGuire, was reported to have been found in open country near the Trans Canada highway.

The Charlottetown detachment of the RCMP last night said Arsenaux is being held in Queens County jail. His escape from Riverside between 10 o'clock and 10:40 Sunday night was followed by an intense search conducted by Island detachments of the RCMP aided by a German Shepherd dog from Moncton which was handled by Dog Master Cst. Kenneth Hucker. Also assisting in the search was the Charlottetown Police Force as well as other police in the Maritimes, who were advised of the escape.

Arsenaux, who just completed a two-year term in Dorchester Penitentiary, was brought back to the Island to be held at Riverside, said Sgt. Elliott of the Charlottetown detachment.

The Charlottetown detachment wish to thank all persons who assisted police in their capture of Arsenaux, who they termed "could be dangerous."

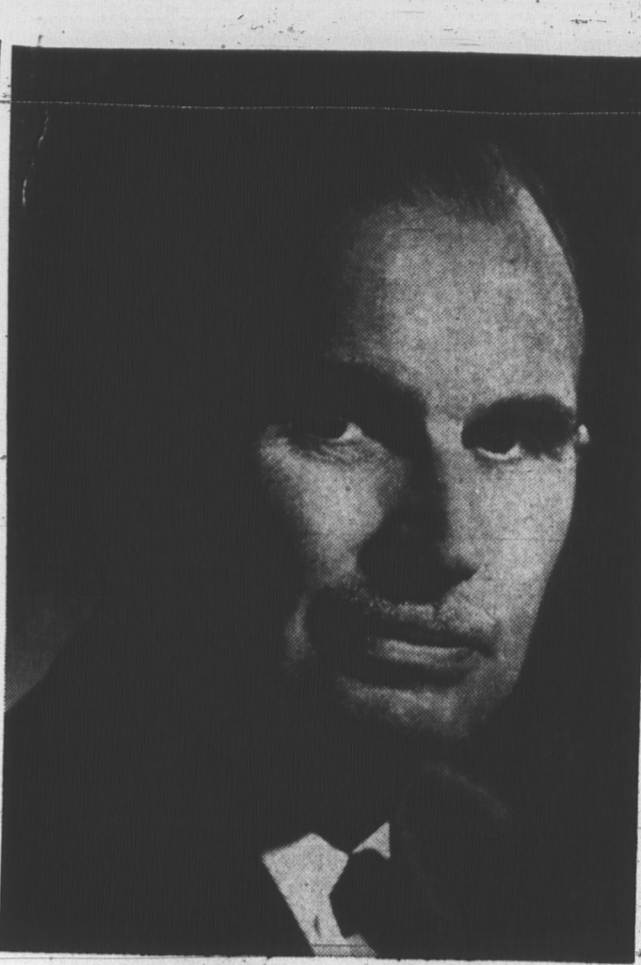

Speaking on the subject of business and professional conduct, Dr. Herbert Johnson of the University of Notre Dame last night told an audience of about 250 persons at St. Dunstan's University that the increasing professionalization of business requires strictly professional behaviour from businessmen and from those with whom they deal.

Dr. Johnson was delivering the first of two talks in the annual lecture series sponsored by

Indicating the growing feeling of professionalism among businessmen, Dr. Johnson stated, "The jungle that was once North American business is becoming civilized, the members of the business community are increasingly seeing themselves as professionals with professional responsibilities, and are coming to act accordingly."

He said that it was difficult to define "profession," but suggested that one of its generally recognized characteristics was the involvement of a set of practices based on established sciences rather than on rules-of-thumb.

As examples, he stated that medicine is based on biology and accounting on mathematics. He said, "If business management has not yet reached professional standing on this count, then it is rapidly approaching that point."

He mentioned that another characteristic generally seen in professions is that their members are devoted first to performance of their jobs, and only secondarily to personal reward.

"It is on this point," he said, "that rightly or wrongly, the general public hesitates to accord full professional recognition to the business community."

**MORE ACCEPTABLE**  
One of the ways the businessman can make himself more acceptable to the general public, Dr. Johnson suggested, was to improve his image, not by claiming he is being shown in an unfavourable light or by distorting facts to make himself more presentable, but "by making the corporation or person concerned such that an accurate reflection will also be a flattering one."

"The corporate image will be enduringly brightened or tarnished on the basis of performance rather than on the basis of manipulations called public relations," he said.

On the subject of employment, the speaker emphasized that service is the primary goal and the primary reason for the existence of a business.
