THE CELEBRATION, TODAY.

We have not seen a finer or more pleasing display in Charlottetown than the long procession of members of our Irish Societies, as they marched in their distinctive regalia, with banners aloft and flags flying, to St. Dunstan's Cathedral, today. The deportment, dress and behavior of the men, contrasted with these of their fathers when they landed here from Ireland sixty or seventy years ago, spoke louder than words of the substantial prosperity and steady advancement resulting from industry, economy, and temperance, fostered by freedom and peace. It really seemed that sons of Ireland here have almost realized the aspiration of the Irish poet when he wrote: "Oh! had we some bright little isle of our own."

The celebration to-day was unusual, general and hearty. This was due in part to the brightness and cheeriness of the early spring weather, but most of all to the unusual feeling of pride in the valour of the brave Irishmen who led the van when the soldiers of the Queen were battling for the relief of Ladysmith.

NO FEAR.

As concerning the relations of Premier Farquharson and his colleagues in the Government, the statements of our correspondent "Democrat" are no doubt true. The Premier has evidently refused to be governed by his Attorney General; and the Attorney General has, as certainly, declined to follow his leader in respect to the conclusion of an agreement with the Dominion Government concerning the Hillsborough Bridge. So much the worse for the Government. A Government divided against itself cannot stand. But we feel sure that the public interests will not in any degree suffer because Premier Farquharson went to meet the Chief Engineer of Government Railways, for the Engineer, without doubt, have heard what Premier Farquharson has to say and will, without doubt, do that which he believes to be right. We only hope that Mr. McKenzie, even though a Dominion official, will regard this matter from the Provincial as well as from the Dominion point of view, remembering that the Province will contribute \$400,000 of the amount which the bridge will cost in order that the bridge may be used for traffic purposes instead of the ferry.

THOMAS ALLEY, ESQUIRE.

We are again called upon to record the death of another of Charlottetown's oldest and most respected citizens, Thomas Alley, Esquire. At an early hour this morning he passed peacefully away, in the eightieth year of his age. Mr. Alley was a native of Charlottetown, and for many years he carried on large building operations here. Several of our public buildings and many of our private residences in this city were designed and erected by him. During several years he occupied the important position of Superintendent of Public Works for Prince Edward Island. He was pre-eminently a self-made man, possessing rare natural ability and found time in a busy life to read and appreciate a great number of good books. For several years he lived in comparative retirement, having lost his eyesight. His familiar form will be missed on the streets of Charlottetown.

LORD SALISBURY'S REPLY

To the Presidents, Request for Terms of Peace.

The Marquis of Salisbury to the Presidents of the South African Republic and Orange Free State:—

"Foreign Office, March 11.—I have the honor to acknowledge Your Honors' telegram, dated March 5th, from Bloemfontein, of which the purport is principally to demand that Her Majesty's Government shall recognize the 'incontestable independence' of the South African Republic and Free States as 'sovereign international states,' and to offer on those terms to bring the war to a conclusion.

"In the beginning of October last peace existed between Her Majesty and the two Republics, under conventions which then were in existence. A discussion had been proceeding for some months between Her Majesty's Government and the South African Republic, of which the object was to obtain redress for certain very serious grievances under which the British residents in that Republic suffered. Pending these negotiations, the South African Republic had, to the knowledge of Her Majesty's Government, made considerable armaments, and the latter had consequently taken steps to provide corresponding reinforcements of the British garrisons at Cape Town and in Natal.

"No infringements of the rights guaranteed by the conventions had up to that point taken place on the British side. Suddenly, at two days' notice, the South African Republic, after issuing an insulting ultimatum, declared war upon Her Majesty, and the Orange Free State, with whom there had not been any discussion, took a similar step. Her Majesty's dominions were immediately invaded by the two republics. Siege was laid to three towns within the British frontier, a large portion of two colonies was overrun with great destruction of property and life, and the Republics claimed to treat the inhabitants of extensive proportions of Her Majesty's dominions as if those dominions had been annexed to one or the other of them. In anticipation of these operations the South African Republic had been accumulating for many years past military stores on an enormous scale, which, by their character, could only have been intended for use against Great Britain.

"Your honors make some observations of a negative character upon the object with which these preparations were made. I do not think it necessary to discuss the questions you have raised. But the result of these preparations, carried on with great secrecy, has been that the British empire has been compelled to confront an invasion which has entailed upon the empire a costly war and the loss of thousands of precious lives. This great calamity has been the penalty Great Britain has suffered for having, of recent years acquiesced in the existence of the two republics. In view of the use to which the two republics have put the position which was given them and the calamities which their non-provoked attack has inflicted on Her Majesty's dominions, Her Majesty's Government can only answer your honors' telegram by saying they are not prepared to assent to the independence either of the South African Republic or the Orange Free State.

DEATH AT TRYON.—Mrs. Angus McDonald, of Tryon, died at that place yesterday evening, aged 34 years. She was a daughter of Mr. W. W. Lord. One boy and three girls are left at home. The funeral takes place tomorrow at 10 o'clock.

Mr. Jas. Mason returned to the Island last night. He has been in the Philippines, and has also witnessed some of the South African war.

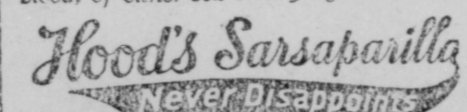
