"I suppose it is natural that we should be taken for granted, but I don't like to see women ignoring the privileges for which we fought so hard." This week the Suffragettes are celebrating the birthday of the late Emmeline Pankhurst, the militant mother who got women the vote in Britain 35 years ago. Beside a bronze statue of Mrs. Pankhurst in London's Victoria Gardens hundreds of fresh bouquets from men and women all over England are today honoring the memory of the woman who started the agitation for women's suffrage in Manchester in 1905.

LONDON, (Reuters)—The Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Thursday began a campaign to protect 5,000,000 British hens. It alleges that the hens are forced to work a 14-hour day and that poultry farmers henpeck them. Nonsensical, said the ministry of agriculture, "the hens live sheltered, comfortable, healthy lives." And furthermore, a ban on battery laying would be cruel to 50,000,000 British people, who would have 150,000,000 less eggs a year.

Big Program For Air Show Here Next Week

Mr. Bill Sweet, America's number one aviation sporting events announcer arrives in Charlottetown today with his National Air Shows from Columbus, Ohio. Mr. Sweet, the famed "Sill Sweet" of Zack Mosley's comic strip "Smilin' Jack" will have with him his entire cast of professional flyers who will be in the air over Charlottetown on days before the big show.

After playing in all the leading American cities before huge crowds, National Air Shows began a tour of five Maritime centres before working back to Cleveland for the annual Cleveland Air Races which will be held in August of this year. National Air Shows act as the "Flying Circus" of this great annual air classic.

Officials of 201 (Confederation) Wing, R.C.A.F., Association feel confident that these flying acrobats will leave nothing to be desired in an airshow. All the thrills of the power dives, inside and outside loops, sky writing, barrel rolls, parachute jumping, etc., are guaranteed to leave chills, even to the most experienced flyer.

Large Increase Noted In Unemployment Claimants

The National Employment Office is paying benefits to upwards of four hundred claimants at the present time, which is at least one hundred and fifty more than at the same time last year.

The total was increased during the past week, when more than thirty girls were laid off by the Telephone Company following the inception of the dial service in Charlottetown. Helping to swell the figures also are the considerable number of men who lost their employment when ship repair work terminated at Bruce Stewart's some weeks ago. A proportion of these men were county residents, who moved to the city and whose term of work at Bruce Stewart's gave them enough contributions to the Unemployment Insurance fund, to entitle them to benefits.

Some of the men released by Bruce Stewart's have found other employment either locally or in mainland towns, but many still remain idle.

Very much a factor in the none too buoyant employment situation is the let-down in the private building of homes and commercial buildings.

The number of residences under construction is much smaller than in any of the past few years, and there is little renovation or extension work being done to business houses.

The extensive paving program carried out year ago by the city of Charlottetown had much to do with making the summer of 1952 a bright one from the employment standpoint. The City Council's program this year is on a far more modest scale.

Further aggravating the work shortage has been the laying off of men at Maritime Central Maintenance, and it is said that further cut-backs in employment may develop at this plant later, although no official confirmation of this report has been made.

The approximately four hundred benefit claimants listed at the local National Employment Office hall from all parts of Kings and Queens Counties as well as Charlottetown, and the increase over last year is shared by the rural districts to some extent.

Without the approach of the haying season a small number of farmers are looking for temporary help, but the demand is not as great as in other years.

Some farmers who have been awaiting the arrival of immigrant farm labor were helped out this week by the arrival of six German farm workers and several from Holland.

It is very difficult to obtain native Islanders for farm jobs. Many men formerly employed in agriculture, are working in Labrador or further north, and still more have located in the industrial towns of Ontario.

Without the immigrant farm labor which arrives in the Province every year, the National Employment office believes it is doubtful if some of our largest farmers could continue in business. Most of the newcomers leave the Province in six months or a year, but they usually remain long enough to see their farmer-employers through the farming season.

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In Air Show Here Canadian Showgirl Murdered In N.Y.

NEW YORK, (AP)—A pretty Canadian-born Broadway showgirl was stabbed and beaten to death Thursday, apparently by a drink-frenzied suitor who then killed himself.

Dead are blonde singer Florence Forsberg, 25, of Fort Frances, Ont., being groomed for possible stardom in the hit musical, "Wonderful Town," and Lester Johnson, 25, a handsome candy salesman and Korea war veteran.

At the Winter Garden theatre, where Rosalind Russell is starring in "Wonderful Town," cast members described Miss Forsberg as a "sweet, quiet kid, not at all the usual Broadway type."

Johnson was recently discharged from the United States army after serving 16 months in Korea, was described as "a quiet, well-behaved fellow with a good outlook on life," by the bartender in a cafe near his home.

In Fort Frances, Miss Forsberg's father, Bert Forsberg, a partner in a clothing firm, said he could fly here to claim her body.
