

### Trouble Over Salmon Prices

VANCOUVER, Sept. 3 —(CP)—British Columbia's big salmon seiner fleet was heading for port Tuesday amid rumours of trouble over prices.

A United Fishermen and Allied Workers (T. L. C.) spokesman said today that meetings of fishermen in B. C. ports during the holiday week-end voted to tie up the fleet to back up a dispute with canneries on the price of chum salmon.

The spokesman emphasized the tie-up was not a strike and that if negotiations that have been progressing since Wednesday change for the better the men will return to work.

The tie-up affects about 15,000 fishermen and allied workers.

The fleet has been fishing for sockeye and chums. The chum contract which paid fishermen \$1-2 cents a pound expired yesterday.

A union official said the meetings indicated the men want last year's price of eight to 11 cents a pound for chums.

Fisheries association officials say the outlook for the chum market is poor. Many up coast canneries have already closed and canneries in the Vancouver area may close in a week.

### Anglican Leaders Meet At London

LONDON, Ont., Sept. 2 —(CP)—Thirty-one religious leaders of the Church of England in Canada began pre-general synod meetings at Huron College today.

Archbishops from dioceses across Canada are meeting to discuss the agenda for the 10-day general synod to open Thursday.

The House of Bishops Thursday will hold joint meetings with hundreds of Anglican clergy and laymen who make up the lower house of the general synod.

Rt. Rev. Michael Yashiro, Bishop of Kobe, Japan, is attending the House of Bishops' meetings at the invitation of the Most Rev. Walter F. Barfoot, Archbishop of Edmonton and Primate of all Canada.

### Polio Continues To Spread In N. B.

FREDERICTON, Sept. 3 —(CP)—The death from polio of a nine-year-old Moncton district boy was recorded Tuesday as the illness continued to spread in New Brunswick.

Addition of nine other new cases in three counties pushed the year's total to 159. There have been six deaths.

Dr. R. D. Landry, medical officer at Moncton, said the fatally stricken boy was a resident of Chartersville, outside Moncton. The latest count of cases issued in Fredericton by Dr. J. A. Melanson, chief medical officer for the province, listed five other new ones in Westmorland County, three in York and one in Carleton.

Dr. Landry said four of the five in Westmorland are children. The fifth is a 33-year-old man. Two of the five are seriously ill, he said. Death came to the Chartersville boy after an illness of only two days.

Polio is "still on the increase in Westmorland," Dr. Landry commented, "but we hope the situation will become stabilized soon."

This year's count by counties: St. John, 52; Westmorland, 33; Kings, 30; York, 24; Carleton, nine; Charlotte, three; Albert, three; Gloucester, two; Queens, one; Kent, one; Restigouche, one.

Late this week pupils of public schools in the province will learn whether classes will start next Monday or again be delayed. The polio situation is to be reviewed at that time by education and health authorities.

### Commits Suicide Over Returning To School

WELLAND, Ont., Sept. 3 —(CP)—A 13-year-old girl committed suicide Tuesday because she didn't want to go back to school, police said.

Oscar Little said he found his daughter, Mildred, in a shed. She was bleeding from a chest wound and died in hospital. A .22-calibre rifle was found in the shed.

Mr. Little said Mildred had been brooding over having to return to school from her summer holidays.

Mrs. Little said Mildred failed at school last year and was going back to grade six.

"I think there is more to it than we know about," she added. "She had complained several times about other children teasing her at the school."

"She hated school because she wasn't getting along with some of her schoolmates."

### Ilse Koch Turns Poet In Prison



FRANKFURT, Germany, Sept. 3 —(AP)— Ilse Koch, "the Red Witch of Buchenwald," is writing poetry in Aichach Prison while serving her life sentence for barbaric cruelties to concentration camp prisoners.

It's pretty bad poetry, on the basis of a sample published in today's issue of the German Weekly news Magazine, Der Spiegel (The Mirror).

And its theme of "Evening Peace" and "Crickets Singing" sounds odd, coming from the red-haired woman whose previous artistic expression included making lamp shade from the skin of slaughtered prisoners.

Frau Koch recently wrote her mother that she was convinced, after eight years in prison, she is gifted with poetic power, and certain she will reach her goal of becoming a poet.

She was convicted of repeated cruelties at Buchenwald concentration camp where her husband was commander until the Nazis executed him for alleged embezzlement.

PAKISTAN PREMIER — Kwaja Nazimuddin, 58, Prime Minister of Pakistan, will represent his country at the November conference of Commonwealth Prime Ministers in London. Formerly governor-general of Pakistan he succeeded Liaquat Ali Khan, assassinated last October, as president of the Pakistan Moslem League and as Prime Minister.

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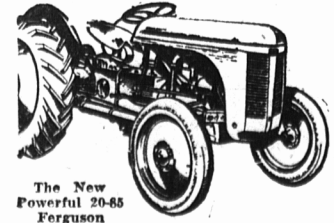
