



Big Crowd Sees Beavers - Capitals Play 1-1 Draw

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—Fredericton Capitals held the league-leading Saint John Beavers to a 1-1 tie before 2,700 fans Wednesday night in opening a best-of-nine semi-final series in the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League playoffs.

There was no overtime. The series is being played under a points system, with a win counting two points and a tie one.

After a scoreless first frame, Frank Dorrington scored for Caps at 5:10 in the second. More than 13 minutes of the third passed before Frank Kuzma knotted the count.

Dorrington hit the high left corner of the Saint John cage following a combination with Bernie Macdonald and John Leclerc. Assists went to Wimpy Jones and Wally Kullman when Kuzma scored from a scramble around Fredericton goalie John Craig.

It was a fast and tight close-checking contest but Beavers, with an edge in play, aimed 32 shots at Craig. Jim Shirley stopped 18.

Fredericton defenceman Larry Blackburn required six stitches for a cut over an eye. The injury occurred in the first period but he was back for the second.

Wins 3 Straight

S'side Rink Cops Tiro Title

A Summerside Rink skipped by Leo Shields defeated Harold Dobson's Charlottetown rink last night 11-7 at the Charlottetown Curling Club to win the Provincial Tiro Curling Championship and the Perfection Trophy.

The Shields rink went through the round robin series undefeated beating the R.C.A.F. team 16-10 in the morning taking a 15-9 verdict over Montague's foursome in the afternoon.

The Montague rink, skipped by Jim Cudmore, the Summerside R.C.A.F. rink skipped by H. A. Lutes and the Charlottetown rink, skipped by Harold Dobson all finished in a tie for second place all having identical 1-2 won-loss records.

In a playoff to decide the runner-up between the three rinks Charlottetown defeated Montague 9-4 and the R.C.A.F. 13-7 in two games of six ends to take sole possession of second spot.

Montague scored its only victory over the airforce team in the evening's play winning decisively 14-5 in 11 ends. Charlottetown's win came at the expense of Montague in the morning by a 16-8 score and the R.C.A.F. won 11-5 from Charlottetown in the afternoon.

Following the end of the competition Dr. Hillard Clark, President of the P.E.I. Curling Association, presented prizes and called upon Mr. P.M. Simmonds who presented each member of the winning Summerside rink with a beautiful engraved silver tray.
