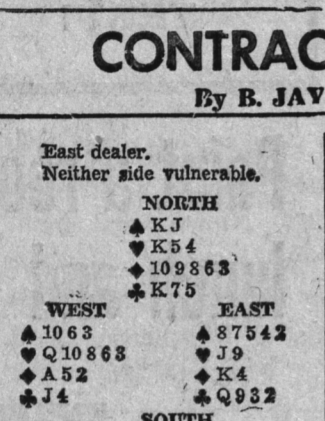

leads another heart, which dummy has to win, and West's hearts are now established. Declarer can get nowhere without building up dummy's diamonds. West wins, cashes his two good hearts, and South is down one, having lost three hearts and two diamonds.

Now let's try out what appears to be more or less the same play, but is not. This time, in an effort to break the heart communication between East and West, we duck the heart on the opening lead.

East wins with the jack and can do no better than return a heart. Let's say we win with the ace and get the diamond suit going. We lead the queen of diamonds.

Either defender may win it, but the contract can no longer be defeated.

Suppose East wins the diamond. He has no heart to return. Whatever he plays back, we force out the ace of diamonds and have ten tricks to show for our efforts.

Or suppose West wins the queen of diamonds. This is equally ineffective, for while he may return a heart and set up his suit, it does him no good because he has no entry card. We just lead another diamond and again make ten tricks.

The contract stands or falls depending on what declarer does on the opening lead. Winning the trick loses the hand.

Opening lead—six of hearts.
One play which has a certain mysterious quality about it occurs from time to time in no-trump contracts. We refer to the hold-up play when declarer has a double stopper in the suit that is led.

The best way to show the effectiveness of this play is to demonstrate what happens when the play is not used.

Suppose a heart is led by West and declarer wins East's jack with the ace. He now enters dummy with a spade in order to lead a low diamond. East, on his toes, steps up with the king, and returns the nine of hearts.

West overtakes with the ten and declarer refuses the trick. West

Two Fugitives Are Added To RCMP Most Wanted List

OTTAWA (CP)—Two fugitives, one wanted on two charges of attempted murder and the other for armed robbery, have been added to the RCMP's list of most-wanted criminals.

They are Ronald Tousignant, 28-year-old laborer, and Theodor Szmaus, 36-year-old jeweler.

The RCMP said both may be armed and both are considered dangerous.

Their addition brings the number in the RCMP's most-wanted list to five. The list was begun in 1952 as an aid to all police agencies. All of the nine on that first list have since been captured or are considered dead.

Tousignant is wanted by Quebec Provincial Police on a charge of attempted murder of a fishing companion. He was arrested last April 30 and on May 19, while awaiting trial at St. Hyacinthe, Que., he broke prison with two

other prisoners, seriously injuring a guard by slugging him with an iron bar.

Szmaus, also known under aliases of Theodore Tadeusz and Stanley Kusko, is wanted by the Metropolitan Toronto Police on a charge of armed robbery.

Of the three others on the RCMP list, one has been a "most-wanted" fugitive since 1952. He is William Adams, alias Waseley Somborski and Joe Lacheau, wanted by police at St. Catharines, Ont., for the murder of his father in the latter's shoe-repair shop in June, 1949.

The others:
Daniel William O'Connor, alias Mike Clancy and Bob Collins, wanted by police at Kereinos, B.C., for attempted murder.
John Frederick Meigher, Toronto salesman, who was first listed Aug. 16, 1957, for escaping custody after his arrest on a charge of robbery with violence.

Decide Effective Control Of Nuclear Weapons Impossible

KITZBUHEL, Austria (AP)—There can be no completely effective international control of nuclear weapons. That is the consensus of the third Pugwash Conference of nuclear scientists from 21 countries on both sides of the Iron Curtain under way here, it was reliably reported Thursday.

After four days of discussion and debate the scientists, some of whom were themselves engaged in development of the atomic and hydrogen bomb, agreed the establishment of mutual trust between world powers is the only possible way to avert the threat of nuclear warfare.

The conference of 72 scientists and economic experts, here at the invitation of industrialist Cyrus

Eaton and an Austrian government foundation, will move to Vienna today where it will make known its deliberations.

HELD IN U.S.
The Pugwash Conferences are named after Pugwash, N.S., where the first ones were held.

According to conference sources the scientists are agreed that no country or bloc of countries can any longer guarantee the safety of its citizens.

But even international agreements banning nuclear weapons and liquidating stocks of bombs were of little value because in time of war such weapons could be replaced.

The scientists urged that treaties on the banning of nuclear warfare, if reached, must be accompanied by a solid basis of mutual trust.

As steps in this direction the scientists proposed exchange programs on experts, the creation of international scientific agencies and programs for the underdeveloped countries which would otherwise always remain a source of tension in the world.

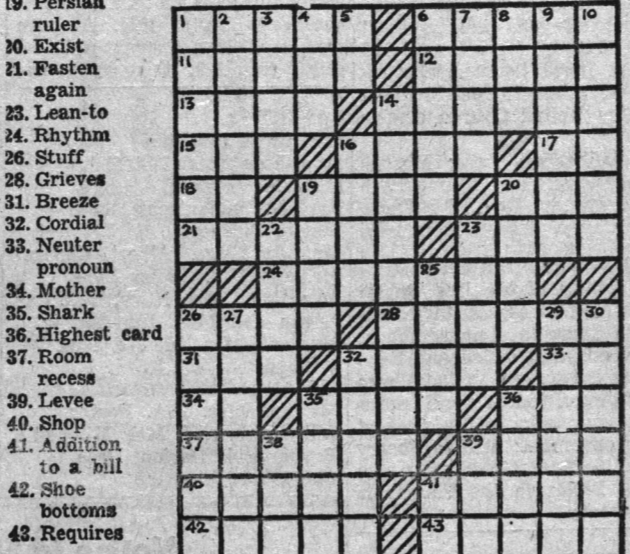

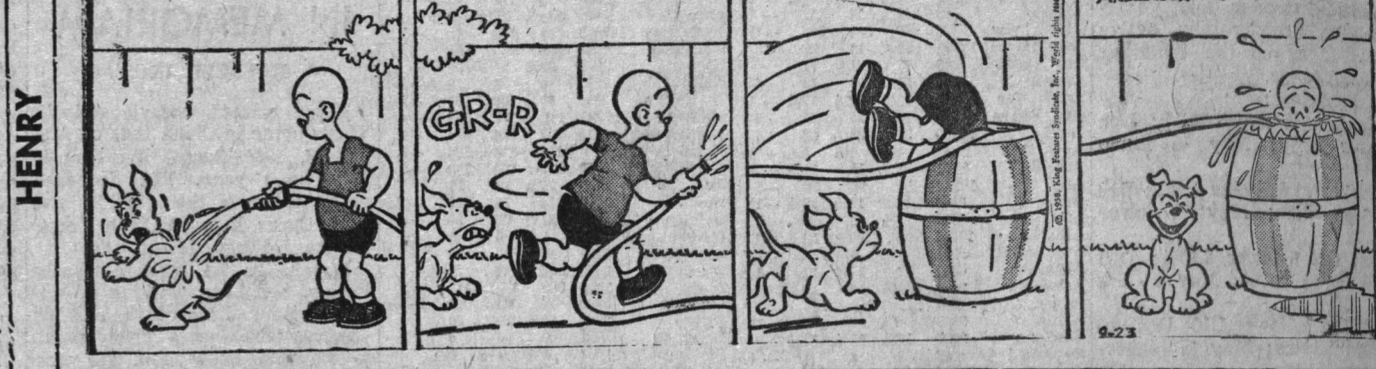
