## Parkdale Man Is Fined \$125, Remanded On 2nd Count

Arrested on two charges, Willard M. Kennedy, Parkdale, was fined on one and remanded on the second by Magistrate A. J. Haslam in city police court yesterday. Kennedy pleaded not guilty to driving while intoxicated, but admitted a plea of guilty to the lesser count of driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol. This plea was accepted by the prosecutor, Chief of Police C. W. MacArthur, a fine of \$125 and costs or 40 days in jail was imposed.

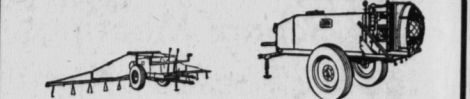
## Summons Issued

## Augustine Cove Camp's Early Days Are Recalled In Letter

An island native who today occupies the highest position held by a layman in the World Council of Churches has written a recent letter recalling his earliest experiences in youth and Christian education work in this province. Brian C. Young, executive secretary of the Department of the Laity of the World Council of Churches in Geneva, Switzerland, in corresponding with David W. Murphy, chairman of the Augustine Cove Camp Committee, recalled the current move, sponsored by United Church Men's Clubs to improve the youth camp at Augustine Cove. In 1946, Mr. Young was then chairman of boys' work at the Maritime Province around the interest of a number of people who earnestly campaigned toward the establishment of a camp located on a 10-acre site of land at Augustine Cove. Both the Baptist and United Church gave material support in the past years but played an important part in the lives of hundreds of boys and girls who have graduated. In his letter, Mr. Young stated: "I was certainly pleased to have about your plans to improve the camp and I am sure you will get a good response from the people of the island. Your present efforts resulted in the good work first established some 15 years ago."
