



BARE TREE TRUNKS DISFIGURE ONCE BEAUTIFUL MEMORIAL SQUARE

Stripped of the boughs whose thick green foliage made Memorial Square one of the most scenic and sheltered places in Summer, the bare tree trunks are about the only remaining visible evidence of the January ice storm which was the worst experienced by this area in living memory.

About a dozen trees have been removed from the square because they were completely destroyed, and pruning and repairs are being made on the remaining trees. This work has been conducted by park employees under foreman of parks, Anthony Arsenault, and under the supervision of Councillor Donald E. Lidstone, chairman of the Parks and Property Committee. Although the broken branches have been trimmed and improved as much as possible, the planting of new trees may be necessary to restore the square to its previous beauty.

Most of the trees were birch or maple, with the birch suffering the greatest amount of damage. The services of Mr. Frank Gaudet, Provincial Forester, were obtained by the Town to supervise the pruning and restoration of trees bordering the streets, so that their appearance will be made as attractive as possible.

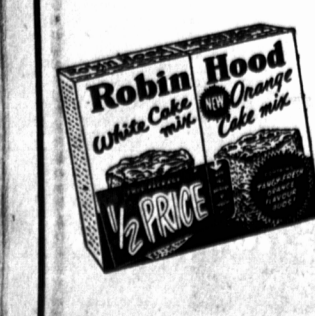

Crusty, Crunchy DINNER ROLLS

CRUSTY DINNER ROLLS

● Measure into a large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water, 1 tsp. granulated sugar; stir until sugar is dissolved. Sprinkle with 1 envelope Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, THEN stir well.

Add 3/4 c. lukewarm water and 1 tsp salt. Add, all at once, 3 1/2 c. once-sifted bread flour and work in with the hands; work in 3 lbs. soft shortening. Knead on lightly-floured board until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl. Cover with a damp cloth and set in warm place, free from draught. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough in bowl, fold over, cover and again let rise until doubled in bulk. Turn out on lightly-floured board and divide into 2 equal portions; shape each piece into a long roll about 1 1/2" in diameter. Cover with a damp cloth and let rest 15 mins. Using a floured sharp knife, cut dough into 2" lengths and place, well apart, on ungreased cookie sheets. Sprinkle rolls with cornmeal and let rise, uncovered, for 1/2 hour. Brush with cold water and let rise another 1/2 hour. Meanwhile, stand a broad shallow pan of hot water in the oven and preheat oven to hot, 425°. Remove pan of water from oven and bake the rolls in steam-filled oven for 1/2 hour, brushing them with cold water and sprinkling lightly with cornmeal after the first 15 mins., and again brushing them with cold water 2 minutes before removing baked buns from the oven. Yield — 18 rolls.
