Inflation Threat Marked Year 1950

OTTAWA, Dec. 22 — (CP) The threat of inflation swept through the Canadian price scene in 1950 as the western defence machine opened its momentous rearmament drive.

Prices climbed everywhere. But the Government declared it would not again enter the price field unless Parliament pronounced a "national emergency."

Instead, it would seek to kill inflation at its roots — by cutting into spending power through increased taxation and restrictions on credit buying.

Canada's four major labor bodies — about 1,000,000 strong — showed their dissatisfaction by preparing a concerted campaign for the return of general price controls and rationing particularly at the government's rental controls, slated to complete withdrawal in May, 1951.

But while the labour unions called for price and rent controls, they made no clear-cut request for wage freezes and government officials emphasized there could be no effective control on prices without controls on wages.

Wages Meanwhile, prices swept up. The cost-of-living index, a barometer of consumer prices, climbed from 161.6 in January to an all-time high of 170.7 in September and October. This index is based on 1933-39 prices equalling 100.

Steady Increases Food, rent, fuel, clothing, home-furnishings and other budget items were at or near all-time levels. In the index, the food subgroup which stood at 201.3 in January, climbed to 218.6 in October.

Rents, partially decontrolled, advanced to 136.4 from 128.0; fuel and lighting to 140.6 from 135.9; clothing to 184.5 from 183.0; home furnishings and services to 174.8 from 166.4, and the miscellaneous group from 132.1 to 133.4.

Another upward sweep occurred in a segment of the wholesale price range. The Bureau of Statistics index of 30 industrial materials, which include such essentials as raw wool, tin, rubber and cotton, climbed almost 41 points in 12 months. Based on 1926 prices equalling 100, the index climbed to 191.8 in November, from 150.9 in November, 1949.

The general cross-country climb in prices was reflected in price advances in selected regional cities. The regional cost-of-living index nosed upward, gaining ten points in a year at Saint John, N. B.; Montreal and Winnipeg, making smaller but nonetheless upward strides at Toronto, Halifax, Saskatoon, Edmonton and Vancouver.

EASTERN TRUST EXTENDS SERVICE COAST TO COAST



With the opening of a new branch office at Vancouver, B.C., under the management of Mr. E. E. Table of CNR Figures showing Big Decrease in Tuber Shipments, including weekly subscription rates to be raised.

Reflecting the slump in the movement of potatoes this year, figures released by the office of the divisional superintendent of the C.N.R. for the month of November show a total of only 683 carloads of Island potatoes shipped via the Borden-Tormentine ferry as against 1,293 carloads exported by rail in November, 1949.

Turnips also have taken a drop, from 230 carloads in November, 1949, to 124 carloads last month. Livestock, however, has been moving better and has increased the November total of 108 carloads last year to 143 carloads this year. Christmas trees also appeared on the export list for November and 10 carloads were shipped while last year's report shows none at all.

Greatest change in the import trade for the same period is shown in shipments of coal, which jumped from 264 carloads last year to 303 this year. Gas and oil also show an increase with 175 carloads against last year's total for the month of 157. Greatest decrease in imports was shown in flour and feed which dropped from 162 to 110 cars.

Other shipments by carloads with the corresponding figures for 1949 in brackets, included: From Tormentine to Borden: autos 48 (39), bags, empty 4 (7), barrels, empty 6 (-), fruits, 18 (9), fertilizer 4 (33), hardware 4 (3), lime, 50 (65), lumber, 23 (40), livestock, 22 (19), less carloads, 211 (272), meats, 5 (17), machinery, 8 (19), sugar, 13 (18), salt, 7 (9), liquors, (liquor, etc.) 11 (13), misc. 108 (149), molasses, 3 (-), railway coal, 1 (29), railway material, 30 (18), trucks, 3 (-), cement, 24 (20), canned goods, 15 (18), sand and gravel, 1 (9), asphalt shingles and rig. 3 (-), and vegetables, 3 (-).
