



## Evenly-Balanced Division Seen For PC Leadership

OTTAWA (CP)—Early indications were for an almost evenly-balanced split on the party leadership issue between delegates to today's annual meeting of the Progressive Conservative national association.

The first of an expected 1,150 delegates began arriving Saturday.

Among early arrivals was Arthur Maloney, Toronto lawyer and former MP, a candidate for the party presidency seeking to oust Dalton Camp, Toronto advertising executive and party organizer, who called six weeks ago for a reassessment of the party leadership under John Diefenbaker.

## Air Canada Shutdown Scheduled For Today

MONTREAL (CP) — About 8,000 members of the International Association of Machinists employed by Air Canada are scheduled to go on strike at 4 p.m. today after the union's negotiating team Sunday rejected the company's offer of pay increases amounting to more than 18 per cent.

The strike is definitely on, said the president of the IAM. The company's offer is far short of what the negotiating committee feels the membership would accept as a settlement.

Earlier, the union dismissed Richard G. Geddes of Toronto, chairman of the three-man mediation board hired by the two parties in an effort to head off the strike.

A union statement said Mr. Geddes was fired after he sent a letter Saturday to union members outlining contract proposals that he had presented to the negotiators.

The statement said the head mediator had been dismissed because "he exceeded his authority as a mediator" in sending the letter to IAM members without the authorization of the union.

ACCEPT PROPOSALS  
The proposals outlined in the letter were later accepted by Air Canada and presented to the union's negotiating committee as the airline's offer.

Mr. Geddes proposed a wage increase of 12 per cent and an additional 12 cents an hour for skilled workers in the first year of a two-year contract extending to Oct. 31, 1966, and a six per cent boost in the second year.

The IAM has demanded a 20 per cent wage increase with fringe benefits amounting to a further 22 per cent. Union members employed by Air Canada

## Religious Feelings Temper Outlook In Five Killings

MESA, ARIZ. (AP)—Deep religious feelings have tempered bitterness against a high school boy who laughed as he shot five women and two children Saturday and later thumbed his nose at an anger-dotted crowd.

Feeling raw high for a time after Robert Benjamin Smith, 18, made patrons and workers in a beauty shop lie on the floor while he coldly pumped bullet after bullet into them, killing four women and a small girl.

Angry words rose from some in the crowd that gathered at the police station after Smith's arrest, and Police Chief Gail Brimhall ordered the boy taken to the Maricopa County Jail in Phoenix, 20 miles away.

But grief and sorrow, rather than violence, prevailed in this predominantly-Mormon city of 50,000 Sunday.

"We feel that he will suffer more than anybody can inflict on him," said Shirley Olsen, mother of Mary Margaret Olsen, 18, killed as she cried and prayed. "We have no feelings except that our families feel sorry for his family."

Olsen is a Sunday school superintendent of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints in Mesa, centre of the Mormon faith in Arizona.

Mr. Camp, who has maintained throughout a six-week cross-Canada tour that he is not set on "getting Dief" personally, called for "a reassessment of policy, a reform of party organization and the reconfirmation — or otherwise — of leadership."

## Clouds Spoil Observance Of Eclipse

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — The moon blotted out the sun in a total eclipse across the southern half of South America Saturday but heavy clouds obscured it from hundreds of scientists at key posts in southern Brazil.

It was observed clearly, however, by hundreds of other scientists posted in Peru's Andes and in U.S. Air Force planes that raced the eclipse as it moved over the South Atlantic from Brazil, Uruguay and Argentina.

The planes carried tons of electronic gear for measuring, among other things, the effects of a total eclipse on radio communications.

U.S. astronauts James A. Lovell and Edwin E. (Buzz) Aldrin in Gemini 12 photographed the eclipse from their spacecraft high above the earth. It was the first time this has been done from space.

The eclipse began at 6:58 a.m. EST and it was total over Peru at 8:03 a.m. Scientists stationed in the Andes above cloudy Lima said it lasted one minute and five seconds there.

## Bridge Collapse Leaves Two Dead

ANTWERP (AP)—A 150-yard four-lane bridge on the highway between the Belgian cities of Antwerp and Liege collapsed Sunday, plunging seven automobiles into the Nethe river and killing two persons. Sixteen other persons were injured.

## New Records For Space-Walker Are Set By Astronaut Aldrin

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — The American astronaut deftly explored the world of the space peace on earth, the newest of walker for more than two hours

Sunday, hurding the boldest goal of Gemini 12.

Calm and talkative, Edwin E. (Buzz) Aldrin Jr. played the role of window-wiper and simple mechanic while more than doubling the record for time spent by any human exposed to the boundless, hostile arena, outside his Gemini spacecraft.

## Major Cabinet Re-Shift Is Announced From India

NEW DELHI (Reuters) — Prime Minister Indira Gandhi announced a major cabinet reshuffle Sunday night and broke all precedent in predominantly-Hindu India by appointing a Moslem as external affairs minister.

The man chosen to handle India's foreign affairs is Mohammed Curram Chagla, 68, who has served as education minister since November, 1963.

Mrs. Gandhi named former defence minister Yashwantrao Chavan, 53, to head the key post of home affairs. Swaran Singh, former external affairs minister, will succeed Chavan at the defence ministry.

Chavan is known as a strong man and good administrator—a background expected to provide much needed qualities at the home ministry in the present widespread unrest resulting

from the country's host of religious, economic and hunger problems.

Chavan took over the post left by Gulzarilal Nanda, who resigned after being accused of weakness in dealing with massive demonstrations last week against the slaughter of cows, which Hindus regard as sacred.

Chagla is a man with wide experience in foreign affairs. An Oxford-educated lawyer and former chief justice of Bombay, he served as Indian ambassador in Washington and high commissioner to Britain.

His post in the education ministry will be filled by Fakhruddin Ali Ahmed, former power minister.

Swaran Singh, 59, the new defence minister, is a mild-mannered, bearded and turbaned Sikh who was external affairs minister since 1964.

## Mighty Falls Left Silent

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y. (AP) — Man diverted 75 per cent of the water that flows over the American Falls and virtually silenced the mighty roar of the famed cataract Saturday for several hours.

The step, which involved opening a series of gates, was part of a program to prevent erosion and possible long-range destruction of the falls.

The action cut the normal flow of 60,000 gallons a second to 15,000 gallons. Much of the water was sent over the larger Horseshoe Falls on the Canadian side.

U.S. and Canadian power officials joined with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to slow the flow for inspection work before returning the water to normal.

The cataract is 182 feet high and 1,650 feet wide.

While the water poured at a reduced rate over part of the brink, other sections adjacent to Luna and Goat Islands were bare. The rockbed just above the brink was visible and water in the upper rapids so low and so slow-moving that workmen waded into the stream to remove debris accumulated over the years.

## UN Observers Get Ceasefire

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Tank-led Israeli forces swept more than two miles into Jordan Sunday, attacking three towns and engaged in heavy fighting with the veteran Jordanian Arab Legion. Both sides claimed they inflicted heavy losses.

troops, backed by 20 tanks and 20 armored personnel carriers, killed 25 Jordanians—13 soldiers and 13 civilians—wounded 94 and captured three Jordanian troops.

After more than three hours of combat, United Nations observers obtained a ceasefire and Israeli troops withdrew.

In Amman, a Jordanian military spokesman claimed that more than 50 Israelis were killed or wounded, three Israeli tanks destroyed inside Jordan and at least seven more destroyed near the armistice line inside Israel.

A few hours later, a Syrian army spokesman in Damascus said shooting broke out on the Syrian-Israeli border and was still going on at 6:30 p.m. (11:30 a.m. EST).

FOUGHT HARD  
An Israel spokesman acknowledged stiff resistance from the Arab Legion in the town of Samu, one of three objectives in the attack, but claimed the legion was beaten back. He gave Israel's losses as one killed and 10 wounded.

During the Israeli strike in Jordan, planes of both countries clashed in dogfights. The Israelis said one Jordanian plane was shot down. Jordan claimed it destroyed two Israeli jets and damaged a third.

Israel announced that the raid, said to have been in brigade strength, was in retaliation for sabotage forays. Three Israeli troops and an army commander were killed Saturday. (Continued on page 5 col. 7)

## Prince Charles Is 18 Today

LONDON (AP) — Prince Charles celebrates his 18th birthday Nov. 14 and thus becomes eligible to be King in his own right should the necessity arise through the death or abdication of the Queen.

the royal source, "English boys of just 18 don't usually have girlfriends. They know girls, yes, and plenty of them, but they don't usually settle down to one."

And with his birthday comes renewed speculation on his higher education and the mention of McGill University in Montreal in this context.

"Charles goes out a lot socially, especially when he's in London, at Windsor Castle, or up at Balmoral (in Scotland) during the holidays."

Sources who are to be trusted say that after attending a British university, not yet announced, Charles will probably go to McGill. And the famous Canadian university has also been mentioned in recent newspaper speculation.

"He and Princess Anne (Charles' 16-year-old sister) are good friends, and they often go out together to parties and dances, but if there's a girlfriend I've never heard of it and I should have."

Now that he is constitutionally mature he also could become prince regent—king in all but name—should Queen Elizabeth temporarily become unable to fill her duties.

Charles is a senior at Gordonstoun, a spartan Scottish school with 300 students.

Under Britain's Regency Act of 1953, Prince Philip had been empowered to act for his son as regent. Now Charles replaces his father as potential prince regent.

IS GOOD STUDENT  
He is studying hard to pass his A-level examinations, necessary to enter university.

When Charles graduates, as expected, next summer he will be more than 18½-old for a British schoolboy.

One reason for his being behind most boys of his age "is the two terms he spent at the Geelong school in Australia."

As a friend of the family put it: "He had a good time there, was extremely popular, spent a lot of time outdoors, but I don't think he did much studying."

Nearly every adult who regularly comes in contact with his heir-to-the-throne remarks on his good manners and his thoughtfulness for others.

An officer at Buckingham Palace put it this way: "He never passes you by. If he sees you in the hall, or if he's passing your office, he'll stop and have something to say. He doesn't just make polite conversation. He talks."
