MONDAY

A warm tribute to the newly formed band of the Prince Street School Cadet Corps was paid Friday when the Corps was being inducted by Brigadier G. G. Keake, D.S.O., E.D. The Brigadier said he was "very impressed" with the band.

He also congratulated the cadets for their steadiness on parade and for their individual neatness, and expressed his liking for the way the boys worked in the small groups during the various demonstrations. The inspection was held Friday afternoon at Memorial Field.

The body of a man was found Friday morning, May 23rd about 7:30 on a sandbar at Black Banks by James MacDonald of Summerside, who was searching for their lobster traps following Thursday's storm. The head and right leg were missing and the only article of clothing was a leather top gum boot. A seaman's hat was found nearby believed to have belonged to the corpse.

Approximately 250 members, relatives and friends of Alcoholics Anonymous sat down to dinner at Sandy's Restaurant on Saturday at 6:30 p.m. The occasion being the Maritime Central Regiment meeting, which was presided over by the President of the Charlottetown unit.

The President briefly outlined the A.A. programme in the Central Region, which calls for four meetings a year, this being Charlottetown's turn. More than 60 members were present from other units in the Region, including Saint John, Springhill, Moncton, Sussex, Amherst and Summerside. He said that he was greatly pleased to welcome the members from the mainland, and urged them to get acquainted with the local members and have a get-together of real fellowship.

Mr. Arthur Gormley, warehouse foreman for the Newfoundland Shipping Co., returned from Picton on Friday after having completed the supervision of the removal of the cargo of the "Blue Prince", prior to the ship undergoing any repairs necessary in the dry dock.

Mr. Gormley, who is an accomplished stevedore, reports that there were no casualties among the livestock and that all were removed to the Exhibition Grounds in Picton where they are being cared for by three eight hour shifts of local Picton men.

The butter and eggs in the cargo of the stranded vessel were taken by truck to Halifax, and loaded on a steamer which left immediately for St. John's.

Fire, which is believed to have originated in the pit, completely destroyed the garage and service station owned and operated by Mr. Melvin Marchbank, Tyne Valley, on Thursday afternoon. Situated in the centre of the village and near the school and several other buildings, the fire, for a time, threatened to spread and cause untold damage.

The Tyne Valley Fire Brigade, assisted by the villagers, who formed a bucket brigade, were unable however, to confine the blaze to the garage which burned to the ground within a half hour. No cars or trucks were in the building at the time although a motorcycle owned by Rev. A. W. Williamson, was lost, along with all the equipment owned by the proprietor.

TUESDAY

A large crowd was in attendance at Parkdale Hall last evening as the seventh annual P. E. I. Drama Festival got underway with the three-act comedy, "Shea's Wedding", by the St. Mary's Dramatic Club of Souris, directed by P. A. McLellan, assisted by J. B. St. John.

In his adjudication, Mr. Donald Wetmore commended the group very highly on the entertainment value of their production, and on the competent performance they had given of a long and difficult play.

Greater protection for the consuming public is the aim of regulations under the Marketing Act wherein all vegetables exposed for retail sale must be properly graded. The regulations apply to all such sales in any city or incorporated town in the Province.

Mr. Chester E. Shaw, of the Dominion Fruit and Vegetable Inspection Service, said yesterday that these regulations will make the work of inspecting vegetables in stores easier and provide the buying public with a measure of protection which was lacking before.

Brigadier W. W. Reid, City Chairman for the Sunnet Lodge and Red Shield drive of the Salvation Army, gave the "go ahead" signal at a supper meeting over which he presided in the Salvation Army last evening.

There were no vacant chairs when the workers were all seated and the business of the evening was advanced rapidly after Grace had been said by Capt. Titcombe. Special Names, reported donations of \$100 from Mrs. W. Chummers and Central Charities while "A Friend" contributed \$150. The Chairman left the "pep" talk to T. Roy Gudmore, of the Advisory Board, who made it clear that in addition to the annual maintenance requirements, the funds needed to build the badly needed extension must be forthcoming at this time.

"There are twenty elderly ladies in the Home, and there is a waiting list of thirty," said Mr. Chummers. "Staff quarters and other facilities are inadequate. The improvements can be made for \$55,000, of which \$41,000 has been willed to the Home by two ladies not long deceased. "It is therefore necessary," concluded Mr. Gudmore, "that \$14,000 be raised for this purpose, in addition to the maintenance fund."

WEDNESDAY

Dr. Robert G.D. Steel, son of Dr. and Mrs. G. Douglas Steel, 303 Easton Street and a graduate of Prince of Wales College has recently been appointed Associate Professor of Biological Statistics at Cornell University, Ithaca, N.Y. Dr. Steel, during the last two years has been a member of the staff of the University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wisconsin.

Definite changes in the seed potato plantings in both Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island this season are noted in weekly potato bulletin issued by the Laboratory of Plant Pathology.

The Prince Edward Island seed growers are increasing their plantings of the varieties Sebago, Pontiac, Canso, Keswick, and Kennebec. The acreage under Katsuhin, Irish Cobbler, and Green Mountain is expected to be lower than last year.

"There will be no necessity for the City building an incinerator for at least three years", stated City Clerk, James Fullerton yesterday. He said that the naming by the Provincial Government as "open ground" of the section extending between the old butts and the Falconwood Point gave the city enough dumping area for several years to come.

In former years there had been many complaints from citizens about the city dump at the foot of Grafton street, and about six years ago an effort was made to have the city install an incinerator.

One-act plays by Kinkora. Convent pupils and children from Glenaladale School tied for first place in the class for rural junior productions at the second evening of the Provincial Drama Festival at Parkdale Hall last evening.

Grades 1 to 5 of Kinkora. Convent presented a third junior play the only entry in the class for these grades, and received high praise from adjudicator Mr. Donald Wetmore.

The only adult performance of the evening, which was the only entry in adult one-act plays by rural groups, was presented by the Irishtown Women's Institute, and received the highest praise offered by Mr. Wetmore to date.

The 22nd annual meeting of the Fur Breeders' Association of Prince Edward Island was held in the Vocational School, Prince of Wales College, yesterday afternoon. There was a good representation of fox and mink breeders from various parts of the Province.

The president, Lt.-Col. D. A. MacKinnon, D.S.O., occupied the chair and called on the secretary-treasurer, Walter R. Shaw, to read the financial statement which showed expenditures of \$3,078.47 the past season with prizes for the live fox and mink show totalling \$1,958. The expenditures exceeded the receipts by over \$500 but this was made up by money taken from the reserve account of the Association. It is still in a good financial condition.

A wedding pool for young children will definitely be built in Victoria Park this summer, according to information received from Lieut. Col. A. W. Rogers, of the Kiwanis Club, yesterday.

The Kiwanis have long considered the building of such a pool as one of their projects for the betterment of the community. It has been decided to go ahead with it regardless of the success of various fund raising ideas now under consideration. Building of the pool was under discussion briefly yesterday by Col. Rogers and Mr. B. J. Goodwin, of the Francis Hankin and Company, Toronto, manufacturers of various types of equipment needed in its construction. When the project gets underway a local contractor will be obtained to do the actual building.

THURSDAY

"Eyes of Love," a difficult and entertaining drama, was presented last night in the Provincial Drama Festival at Parkdale Hall by the Indian River Dramatic Club and the three-act play drew warm compliments from the adjudicator, Mr. Donald Wetmore.

The Indian River players competed against "Shea's Wedding", a comedy by the Souris Dramatic Club for Provincial honors. The result will be announced tonight at the concluding play of the Festival.

In his remarks Mr. Wetmore referred to the Indian River players as being a very talented cast. "You had a very difficult play and one of the biggest difficulties was to make the play convincing. I liked your play as I thought it was a very adult attempt and I am glad that you are attempting plays that demand more than comedy," he stated.

"A nurse who has the natural virtues only, will see in her patient a 'case', but the Christian nurse will see Christ suffering in her patients," declared His Excellency Bishop Boyle in an eloquent address to the nursing graduates of the Charlottetown Hospital at the graduation exercises held in the Community Centre last night. There were nineteen of the girls receiving their diplomas from His Excellency in the presence of a large crowd which packed the Centre to capacity. Included in the audience were many of the doctors of the city, as well as a large number of members of the religious orders.

Representing the Premier was Hon. A. W. Matheson, Minister of Health and Welfare, who said that there were not enough nurses remaining in the profession long enough to staff the hospitals of the Province. It was because of this that the Government at the last session of the Legislature had put on the statute books legislation which

permits the status of trained attendants. He offered his sincere congratulations to the graduates and especially to Miss Alicia Marie Mulhally who was the valedictorian of the class.

The annual Prince of Wales College Alumni dinner in honour of the graduating class was given by the Executive of the Alumni Association at the Charlottetown Hotel last evening. Members of the Alumni executive, the graduating class and their partners, and several members of the faculty of the college attended the dinner.

Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy, chairman of the Alumni program committee, presided at the dinner. At the head table were Dr. Frank MacKinnon, Principal of Prince of Wales, and Mrs. MacKinnon. Mr. James Abbott, vice-president of the graduating class and Miss Carolyn Nelson, Judge J. G. Lewis, vice-president, Summerside, and Mr. George Leard, Souris.

The Kinsmen's annual carnival was officially opened last evening at the Summerside Curling Rink. Despite inclement weather there was an unusually large attendance.

The carnival was officially opened by Mayor Henry Wedge who said that he was particularly pleased to be present this year because \$1,000 of the receipts are to be given to the mayor's rink fund. He said "While all Kinsmen projects have been very much worthwhile, the rink matter is of vital interest to all citizens." He said he hoped that the citizens would patronize the carnival during the next three nights, and show their support of the rink project.

Club president Harry Dickie welcomed the people, and said that in addition to the \$1,000 for rink project, the club is sponsoring a little league baseball team and providing play-ground equipment.

Mrs. J. Elmer Murphy, president of the Ninette Club spoke briefly stating that the Ninettes were pleased to be associated with the Kinsmen in this carnival, and that their part of the proceeds will be used for the play-ground project.

M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd. have been awarded the contract for a large standard armament building at the R.C.A.F. station at Chatham at an approximate cost of a quarter of a million dollars.

This large island construction firm with its headquarters in Summerside now holds major building contracts in the three Maritime Provinces. Two of these are in Nova Scotia where they are building a large regional high school at Sutherland River, just outside of New Glasgow, and at the R.C.A.F. station in Greenwood, where work has been underway for many months, reconstructing wartime barracks into permanent buildings.—S.
