THE CITY OF GHENT. - On and after Wednesday, the 21st inst., the City of Ghent will sail from Halifax via Eastern Shore ports and Saults for Charlottetown, arriving at this port between noon and 3 p. m. on Saturdays. The City of Ghent will leave Charlottetown on return to Halifax as early as possible on Saturday evenings.

THE FASTNET. - The steamer Fastnet, Captain Hopkins, left here for Halifax last evening about half past five o'clock with a cargo which included 2000 cases lobsters, 1500 bags oats, 500 bags potatoes, 3 0 cases eggs, 200 lbs mackerel, 50 1/2 pkgs, 100 cases canned mutton and a quantity of sundries. The passengers were John Kelly, Artie Clark and A. Gase.

Causes of deaths - Cholera infantum, 8; influenza, 3; consumption, 2; paralysis, 1; jaundice, 1; droupy, 1; Cancer, 1; other ill-defined, 5; Age at death - Under 5 years, 11; from 5 to 24, 9; from 24 to 71, 4; at 78, 2. Average age at death, 23 1/2 years. Religion - Protestants, 13; Catholics, 7. Nationality - English, 7; Scotch, 5; Irish, 7; French, 1. Sex - Males, 12; females, 8.

POLICE COURT. - James Egan, pump maker, appeared before His Honor this morning to answer to a charge of assault and battery preferred against him by his wife. Mrs. Egan testified that on the evening of the 14th inst., when her husband came home, she was working at a table in the kitchen. Egan said he wanted to use the table, and ordered her to leave it at once. She did not leave the table soon enough to suit Egan, and an altercation ensued. Egan struck her with his fist, seized her by the shoulders and pounded her against the wall, bruising her shoulders and arms. Egan admitted the facts as stated by his wife; and when asked what defence he had to make, said that he wanted to use the table. CANADA AND CHOLERA.

Dr. Sawlett's Opinion.

Canada is All Right: Let it Keep Right.

Prompt Action of the Dominion Government.

QUEBEC, Sept. 16.

Dr. Sawlett, representative of the Washington Government, in an interview on Canada's position in regard to the Cholera, says: "Canada is all right. The only question you have to consider is to keep so. You have a vast advantage in having your quarantine at Grosse Island far from the nearest city, and, therefore, ought to be able to keep it out more effectively than we can in Boston or New York where ships come right into the harbor, as I may say."

OTTAWA, Sept. 16.

An emergency meeting of the Dominion Cabinet was held last evening to consider the cholera question. Minister Carling received a despatch from the Quebec Government stating that as cholera had appeared in New York city Quebec authorities would quarantine all passengers arriving on trains from the south. To-day two steamship agents arrived from Montreal to urge the Federal Government to overrule the Local Government order prohibiting the landing of emigrants. At last night's meeting the Cabinet decided to appoint over Customs officers a quarantine inspector with power to go aboard trains and vessels and examine passengers. It was also decided not to interfere in the conflict between steamship owners and the Quebec Government over the question of landing emigrants.

General Telegraphic News.

MONTEAL, Sept. 14. - The Star's London cable says the Board of Trade returns show that the exports to Canada increased 19 per cent. in August and decreased 2 per cent. in the past eight months, compared with the last year. There has been a heavy decline in horses, railroad iron and tin plates, and an increase in wearing apparel. In woolens there has been a marked growth. The imports from Canada increased 34 per cent. during the month, and 23 per cent. during the eight months. The greatest increases were in wheat, cheese and lumber.

GENOA, Sept. 14. - King Humbert, the Prince of Naples, the Duke of Genoa, the Count of Turin and the members of the ministry today visited the foreign Admirals commanding the squadron sent here to take part in Columbus fetes. The shipping was decorated with flags and bunting, and the war ships fired a salute as the royal yacht put off into the harbor. King Humbert witnessed the drill of the crews in the flag-ships, and congratulated the Admirals on the smartness and efficiency of their men.

LICK OBSERVATORY, Cal., Sept. 14. - Prof. Barnard has added a fifth satellite to the four satellites of Jupiter, discovered by Galileo in 1610.

Mount Hamilton Observatory, Sept 12. - Barnard sends greetings to S. W. Barham, with a fifth satellite to Jupiter, of the 13th magnitude; period 17 hours and 36 minutes, distance from centre, 112,400 miles.

"The discovery of this satellite, which was made by Barnard on Saturday," said Mr. Barham, "is the greatest astronomical achievement of the century, and will cause the world of science to ring again. It simply means the addition of another body to the solar system, which is in the days a most stupendous discovery."

CORNWALL, Sept. 14. - An inquest on the body of Constable J. R. Davey was concluded to-night and a verdict of murder returned against Jas. Slavin, alias McMahon, who shot Davey on the 6th September last while the latter was arresting him for shooting at and wounding another man. Slavin is a native of Cornwall, but has been in the Western States for five years, and was here with a circus at the time of the shooting.
