Sell Little To Russia

By DON PEACOCK Canadian Press Staff Writer. OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian companies appear to be selling a little more machinery and other equipment to Russia this year than previously, officials here report. But they add that Canadian-Soviet trade in these items is still only peanuts.

In recent months the Great Northern Woods Company, Limited, of North Bay, Ont., has sold the Soviet Union a new wood-working method and is helping the Russians build and equip a mill at Archangel with mostly Canadian equipment.

Some six or eight months ago the John Inglis Company of Toronto supplied Russia with a fish stick plant. Trade officials here said Wednesday other sales have been limited to smaller orders for equipment.

BEFORE REVOLT Most of the sales were under negotiation or contracted for before the Hungarian uprising last October. Officials said that, without ruling out coincidence, there appear to have been fewer big projects undertaken by Canadians trading with the Soviets since the Hungarian trouble.

The Canadian government keeps a close watch on trade with Russia. No strategic materials

Expect Freight Rate Boost

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian railways will get the green light shortly to boost certain freight rates in line with increases authorized this week in the United States.

Informants said Thursday the higher rates could cost Canadian shippers about \$20,000,000 a year. The authorization for the raise is understood to be under preparation by the board of transport commissioners following the order by the U.S. interstate commerce commission. The U.S. increases, on a specified list of traffic, are seven per cent in the east and west and four per cent in the south.

Canada for some years has followed a semi-automatic practice of matching U.S. rate changes on types of traffic common to the two countries.

Chiefly affected by the Canadian increases will be the heavy flow of goods between Canada and the United States, which now brings Canadian carriers about \$250,000,000 a year almost equally divided between the CNR and CPR.

It is understood the transport board's order will permit the increases to take effect Aug. 26—same day the U.S. rates will be raised.

GODLESS FACE DARK DEATH Our newspapers present us daily with a grainy commentary on the various forms, and tragic suddenness of death. Death may indeed be staved off for a time—even a long time; but at length the moment comes when that mysterious partnership of spirit and matter is broken once for all.

To the materially-minded, death appears to be the brutal extinguishing of the human personality, a deplorable yet inescapable catastrophe.

On this tremendous fact one of the distinguished prophets of modern agnosticism, Bertrand Russell has this to say: "The life of

a man is a long march through the night toward a goal that few can hope to reach and where none may tarry long. . . Brief and powerless in man's life; on him and all his race the slow, sure doom falls pitiless and dark."

Dark indeed is the prospect that yawns before those who are "without God in this world." (Ephesians 2, 12) one of the noblest of all pre-Christians, the poet Virgil, has put in the mouth of the "defiled" sister of Turnus lines that betray the deep hopelessness of paganism: "Why gave I love to last for aye

by-election in Yamaska, being beaten by 83 votes. He first was elected to the Commons last June 10, winning Nicolet-Yamaska by 513 votes. For the last 10 years, he has been mayor of Pierreville. In 1956 he was warden of Yamaska County, from 1934 to 1935 he was chief appraiser of the Canadian Farm Credit Bureau. Since 1946 he has been general manager of the bureau, whose current loans to Quebec farmers aggregate some \$165,000,000. He is married and has five children. Douglas Harkness—Agriculture minister and minister of northern affairs, he has been a high school teacher, soldier, farmer and livestock breeder. Born 54 years ago in Toronto, he was educated at Central College in Calgary and the University of Alberta. During the Second World War he served overseas from 1940 to 1945, seeing action in Sicily, Italy and northwest Europe. He ended his war service with the rank of lieutenant-colonel. A member of the Commons since 1945 for Calgary North, Mr. Harkness was appointed northern affairs minister June 21. He will continue to discharge the responsibilities of this office for a short time.
