

Fire Causes Heavy Damage At Alberton So. Apt. And Store

Fire caused heavy damage to an apartment and general store owned by Keir Fraser at Alberton South yesterday afternoon. Originating in the apartment over the store, the flames had been burning for some time before the alarm was turned in by a neighbor. Mr and Mrs. Fraser and two children were not at home. The Alberton fire department responded promptly, and extinguished the fire by pouring water through the upstairs windows and a hole chopped in the roof of the 2-storey building. The second floor was gutted and a large stock of merchandise on the ground floor was damaged by smoke and water. The origin of the blaze appeared to be in the kitchen of the apartment. The loss is partly covered by insurance.

Alberton Student Awarded Scholarship In Chemistry

Edward McAlduff, a graduate of Alberton High school, has received notification that he has been awarded the Shawinigan Chemical scholarship available at St. Francis Xavier University. This annual scholarship has been established by Shawinigan Chemicals Limited and is available at each of the five Maritime universities. Its purpose is to encourage promising students to prepare themselves for a career in chemical research and the recipient is chosen by the committee of scholarships at the university to which he makes application. The Scholarship is awarded to the candidate each year for four years, or the time necessary to complete an honors course in chemistry, provided he continues to make satisfactory progress. It covers various university fees and includes the sum of four hundred dollars toward living expenses. It does not include the costs of board and residence. Edward is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles McAlduff of Alberton and all through his years in Alberton School has been considered an outstanding student. Prince M. P. To Attend Caucus; Contract Let

Dr. Orville H. Phillips, Member of Parliament for Prince County, left yesterday for Ottawa to attend a party caucus. Dr. Phillips expects to be in Ottawa for several days attending meetings in connection with projects for the county which will be announced later. Before leaving, Dr. Phillips announced that a contract had been let to Lynk Electric Company of Glace Bay, N.S. for installation at R.C.A.F. Station Summerside, of approach landing lights, crossbar lights on lights on the east runway, the installation of high intensity runway lights, and medium intensity lights for aircraft taxiing. The amount of the contract is \$44,821.60. The work will commence immediately, and under the terms of the contract must be completed within 90 days.

Award Of Merit Presented To Long River Agriculturist

The "Award of Merit" to proprietor William E. Johnstone was the feature of the illustration Field day held at Long River last week. The presentation was made by R.C. Parent, Superintendent of the Experimental Farm here. The award is in recognition of co-operation and services rendered to the Experimental Farms. The illustration Station at Long River is on Mr. Johnstone's farm. In making this presentation, Mr. Parent pointed out that Mr. Johnstone had taken a keen interest in soil conservation work, also pasture and potato investigations. Field Days have always been well attended. This was further proof of the high regard in which Mr. Johnstone, as the illustration Station operator, was held by his neighbours, Mr. Parent noted. Mr. Johnstone is extremely interested in soil conservation and has so arranged his farm planning that all hillsides and waterways are permanently down to grass.

Recognized as one of the outstanding farmers of the province, his interest in community and provincial enterprises is widely known. He has rendered distinct service to agriculture not only through his affiliation with the Experimental Farm Service, but as a breeder of some of the finest registered silver and black foxes and Yorkshire hogs produced in Canada. Mr. Parent also gave an illustrated lecture on a trip to the West Indies and discussed some of the things he saw on a trip to Western Canada in July of this year. He said, however, that he could see no place on his travels that offered greater opportunities for successful farming than Prince Edward Island. Miss Audrey MacMillan, Provincial Department of Agriculture, gave an informative talk on 4-H Club work. The club members must conduct their own meetings, and have a club project. Calf club members for example, are asked to raise a calf of the club breed, care for it and exhibit it at the club achievement day. The judging and the prize money, however, is based on the member's work in the club as a whole, not merely on where the calf places in the class. The club must raise one-third of its prize money. The remainder is contributed equally by the provincial and federal departments of agriculture. Mr. George Ayers discussed the control of common plant diseases. He emphasized that there are two main approaches to the problem. One is breeding for resistance to disease, and the other is chemical control. He discussed a number of more common plant diseases and explained how best they could be remedied. Mr. Johnstone's farm was cited as an outstanding example of up-to-date methods of disease control both from the standpoint of resistant plants and application of control practices. George A. LaBelle, Extension Department of St. Dunstan's College and Frank Myers, M.L.A. also spoke briefly.
