Her name is J. G. Garland, Capt. Keens, of Gloucester, Mass. She is now in Souris, but will require to go on the marine slip before proceeding on her seining trip.

Were the anathemas which our citizens utter daily while passing this sink of pollution published, we think our city father would be awakened from their lethargy.

HALIFAX EN FETE!

The Tournament a Success.

HALIFAX, N. S. Aug. 10. The Charlottetown detachments of artillery and firemen arrived here all right last evening. The city is crowded with visitors and the weather is fine. The tournament promises to be a grand success, the greatest interest being taken in the hose reel race to-morrow.

LATER. HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 10.

The special train bringing the New Brunswickers arrived at 3 o'clock this morning and woke the slumbering city up as they marched through the streets to the lively strains of their band. The steamer City of St. John with the Lunenburg contingent and a great many from Yarmouth, arrived at 8 o'clock. The morning broke in gloriously and the day has been exceedingly hot. Old Halifax has donned its holiday attire and several streets are handsomely decorated with flags, etc. The streets have been crowded with the youth and beauty of the city all morning, and windows and doorways all along the line of march are crowded with sight-seers. The procession started at about 11 o'clock and a presented novel scene such as was never before witnessed in Canada. During the march the firemen were enthusiastically cheered at various points where great masses of people had congregated. The decorations were of the most gorgeous description, and while Halifax and Dartmouth, of course, carried off the palm, the Charlottetown and Yarmouth boys showed up splendidly. The route of the procession covered about eight miles, and will terminate at the exhibition building, where one thousand firemen will dine. Thousands of visitors are constantly arriving by excursion trains.

THE RIOTING IN BELFAST.

A GRAPHIC DESCRIPTION

Painful Scenes and Incidents.

BELFAST, AUG. 10.

This city, owing to the wreck and ruin of many of its houses, presents a deplorable aspect similar to that of Paris after the reign of the commune.

It is feared that numerous deaths, resulting from the riots, have taken place which will never be reported or heard of. The hospitals are taxed to their utmost to accommodate the wounded in need of prompt medical attendance.

A painful feature of the riots is the number of children wounded on Sunday. One boy was shot whilst returning from Sunday school. Yesterday a little girl was shot on the streets and is thought to be fatally wounded.

Train loads of troops are constantly arriving. The military, early yesterday morning, dispersed several mobs at the point of the bayonet. The prospect of affairs was so threatening at noon yesterday that the authorities ordered all taverns in the city to be closed. Last evening groups of men were assembled everywhere excitedly discussing the situation.

The heaviest fighting was done at Springfield, from which place a regular guerilla battle is reported, in which sixty of the rioters were shot down dead.

Hanlan to the Front Again.

BOSTON, Aug. 10.

In the 3 mile scull race at Nantasket yesterday, between Hanlan, Mackay, Ten Eyck and Hosmer, Hanlan won; Mackay second, Een Eyck third, and Hosmer fourth. Hosmer met with an accident to his shell. The time of the race was 21 minutes 5 seconds.

A cablegram received here announces that the Canadian Artillery Team have again won first prize in the 64 pounder gun shooting competition, beating 92 teams and winning Sir Richard Wallace's prize of nine silver cups and £42 in money.
