

# Large Crowd Sees Keen Races At St. Peter's Yesterday

Patched Volo 2nd paced the fastest mile at the St. Peter's Bay raceway yesterday afternoon but Billy McVey took the top honors in the event as Len O'Meara drove the little bay gelding to a double heat win before a large crowd of sun-baked spectators.

O'Meara, who drove four winners under the wire, reined Billy to victory in the first heat. Patched Volo 2nd took the second heat and the redoubtable Billy McVey came back to win the third heat and the race.

A smooth pacing Miss Donna Mae, showing her best form of the season, won the second and third heats to take top honors in the No. 2 Classified Race. The first heat was won by Judy Budlong.

Four heats were required in order to determine a winner for the Classified Trot and the No. 4 Classified event. Anyway won the race-off to take the Classified Trot while Sister Verna won the second and fourth heats of the last race.

The races, which got underway at two o'clock under the guidance of Dr. F. C. Dougan, featured a number of hard driving finishes which thrilled the spectators. The best finish came in the second heat of the No. 4 Classified event as four horses came to the wire abreast.

The four were You'll See, Lindy H., Propane, and Sister Verna and they finished in that order. You'll See led from the starting wire followed by Lindy H., Roma Budlong and Propane. Sister Verna moved up from sixth position on the back stretch to make it a four horse race to the wire.

Holly Harvester, driven by Cyril Smith of Hunter River, won the first heat of this event when she came up from second place to beat out You'll See. The third heat was won by Sister Verna who moved up from fourth position.

In the race-off between the three heat winners Holly Harvester and You'll See, the latter won by a margin of one length.

# Five Track And Field Records Fall At Olympic Competition Yesterday

HELSINKI, July 23 (CP)—Five track and field records, including two world marks, were wiped out in bewildering succession today and when the slaughter was over the United States had two more Olympic championships and New Zealand and Brazil one each.

American sprinters scored a brilliant one-two-three in the 200-metre dash and two husky javeliners from the United States summed 70,000 fans by placing one-two in Finland's national sport.

The Olympic record was broken in the javelin throw and equalled in the sprint.

Yvette Williams, tall, slender girl from Dunedin New Zealand, broke the Olympic record in winning the women's broad jump.

Ademar Ferreira Da Silva, a slim Brazilian, cracked the world record four times in winning the hop, step and jump.

Another world record took almost as savage a beating from Shirley Strickland de la Hunty of Australia. The 26-year-old matron first equalled the record in winning a heat in the 80-metre hurdles and then tore the record apart in a semi-final.

The Olympic record for the 5,000-metre steeplechase was erased in a heat and another Olympic mark was tied in a heat in the 110-metre high hurdles.

Despite brilliant prowess at track and field, the United States tonight surrendered to Russia the lead in the unofficial point-standings.

Completion late tonight gave Russia 253 1/2 points and the United States 202. The Russians outscored the United States 34-26 in free-style wrestling and rolled up 60 1/2 points in women's gymnastics against not a single point for the United States.

Canada is still without a point after four days of competition.

Dawn Josephs of Victoria reached the final round of the broad jump today and tied for 15th. Rosella Thorne of Montreal fouled out on three tries in the qualification round.

Luella Law of Vancouver stumbled at the fifth barrier in the 80-metre hurdles and failed to qualify. Gordon Crosby, Toronto traffic cop, failed by a step to qualify in the 110-metre high hurdles.

The Highlights  
Here are the highlights of today's record carnage:  
Hop, step and jump—Da Silva, 16.22 metres (53 feet, 2.59 inches) on his best effort to exceed his own world record of 16.00 metres (52 feet, 6.30 inches) and the Olympic record of 16.00 metres (52 feet, 5.93 inches).  
Women's 80-metre hurdles—Shirley Strickland de la Hunty equalled the world record of 11 seconds flat in a preliminary heat and broke it with a mark of 10.8 in the semi-final. The old world record was held by Fanny Blankers-Koen of Holland, who posted both it and the Olympic record of 11.2 in 1948.  
Javelin throw—Cyril Young of the United States hurled the spear 73.78 metres (242 feet, 7.9 inches) beating the old Olympic mark of 73.78 metres (242 feet, 7.9 inches) and the world record of 73.78 metres (242 feet, 7.9 inches) established in 1948 by Volmar Iso-Hollo of Finland.  
Women's broad jump—Yvette Williams eclipsed the Olympic record of 5.69 metres (18 feet, 8.02 inches) made in 1948 by Olga Gyarmati of Hungary. Miss Williams leaping 6.24 metres (20 feet, 5.66 inches).  
110-metre hurdles—Harrison Dillard of the United States won a heat-winner in 13.9 seconds, equalling the Olympic record made in 1948 by Bill Porter of the United States.  
200-metre dash—Andy Stanfield, winner, tied the Olympic record of 20.7 seconds made in 1936 by Jesse Owens, United States.  
Up to now, half-way mark in track and field competition, three world records and 12 Olympic records have been broken, and the end doesn't appear in sight.  
The United States has won 10 of 13 finals, with 11 more to be decided. In 1948 at London the Americans won 11 gold medals in track and field.

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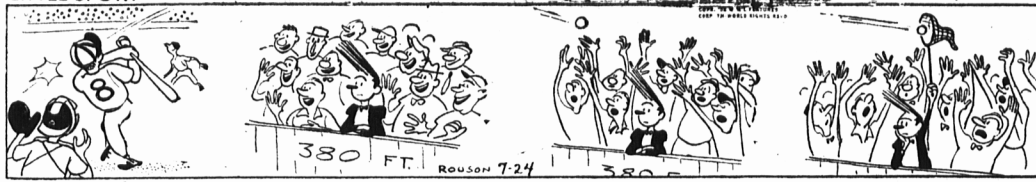

## Pete Kelly Comes From Behind To Win Golf Ch'ship Of NB-PEI

EDMUNDSTON, N.B., July 23 (CP)—The New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island amateur and open golf championships were won tonight by Pete Kelly, Fredericton, a former Maritime title-holder.

Kelly's score for four rounds in three days of competition was 307. He did the first 36 holes in 159 and required only a two-above-par 148 to cover the course twice today.

Archie Skinner, St. Andrews, retained the professional crown with a total of 317.

Kelly had a par 73 for his third 18 holes and carded a 75 in the final round.

A former two-province champion, Walter Reed Jr., of Fort Fairfield, Me., and John Steele, of Saint John Riverside, tied for second place behind Kelly with 314.

Two Moncton players were next. Roy Morrison, who led the entire field in the first two rounds, finished with 317, equalling the best professional score. He slipped to 84 today and did the final 18 in 79. Ben Isner, with a good 77 in the last round, had a 319 total.

# Russia Loses, Regains Team Lead At Olympics

HELSINKI, July 23 (CP)—Russia regained the lead over the United States in the unofficial point totals in the Olympic games tonight on the strength of a run-away performance in women's gymnastics.

The total stood at 266 1/2 for Russia and 202 for the United States.

Earlier in the day the U. S. had taken the lead after another day of brilliant track and field performances. Tonight's totals included the free-style wrestling where the Russians outscored the U. S. 34 points to 26, and the women's gymnastics, where the Soviets picked up 60 1/2 points while the U. S. was shut out.

## Merry England Wins Winnipeg Stake At Toronto

TORONTO, July 23 (CP)—Merry England, the honest bay mare owned by Dr. J. S. Ferguson of Chatham, Ont., won both divisions of the Winnipeg Stake at Thorncliffe Raceway today. The Winnipeg Stake was named for the famous Canadian-bred harness horse which still is ranked as the world's greatest pacing gelding.

Merry England, well handled by Wilbur Athorpe, came from well off the pace to whip 11 rivals in the first heat. She won under mild restraint in 2:08 3/5 with the veteran Norval G in second position and Jean Dillon third.

In the second heat, Merry England took the lead in the field in open competition against the men. Obviously picking her way around the strange track, the little Miss from Rhode Island finished behind her seven rivals in both heats with her horse, Sweet Prince. However, she was right in contention in the second heat and showed driving skill when between horses on the turns.

HALIFAX, July 23 (CP)—Dr. and Mrs. Miklos Nemethy, married three months ago, met as husband and wife for the first time yesterday. Dr. Nemethy arrived aboard the liner Homeland. His wife met him at the gangplank. Both natives of Yugoslavia, they were married April 5 by proxy.

The second-place Boston Red Sox in the American League scored seven runs in the ninth to whip Chicago 10-4. The Red Sox chased starter Hal Brown with three runs in the first inning but were shut out by their old teammate, Joe Dobson, until the ninth. After Chicago chased Sid Hudson to take the lead in the fifth Ralph Brinkley retired 11 men in succession. He bowed for a pinch hitter in the big ninth inning and Ray Scarborough finished. Washington came up with three in the 16th to top Detroit, 5-2. A walk and three singles won the game after Cliff Mape's ninth inning homer sent the game into overtime.

Sandy Costanza, who replaced Spec Shea in the 15th, was the winner over Dick Littlefield who pitched from the ninth to the 16th.

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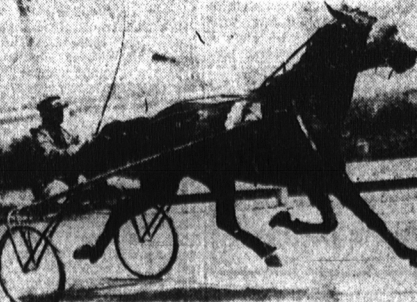
