# PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

TUESDAY, May 9.

House met at 11. The bill incorporating the trustees of Springton cemetery was read a second time in committee, with Mr. Forbes in the chair. Third reading to-morrow.

Mr. Prowse resumed the debate on the motion to go into supply. He congratulated the Premier upon his able speech. It was the best he ever heard, and it indicated that the day of deficits is about over. The Tories were responsible for the present deficits, although they had attained power upon the promise to make ends meet. He was glad that the Liberals were in power at Ottawa, and was also to see so many immigrants of the best class coming into Canada. The statement of the Leader of the Government was a business-like one. When the present Government came in the affairs of the province were in a bad way; and they had to put their house in order. The roads were now in excellent condition, and it was the intention to build steel bridges. He believed the Government would spend the money judiciously and act in the best interests of the people. He was glad to see the large amount set down for education, but regretted that the teachers were not better paid. It was pleasing to observe that the Government were about to proceed with the erection of a new wing to the asylum, as the unfortunate people there, were evidently in need of more accommodation.

Mr. Birch, who was the next speaker, said he had listened to the budget speech last year and had heard the Leader at that time state that the era of deficits had gone by and that a newer and better era had arrived. But ends have not yet been made to meet. Now, in 1899, the story is the same. We are told that the young people will not stay at home, and that some of them even go to the Yukon. It was said in 1896 that the exodus would cease. But it is now greater than ever. This would indicate that the country is not in the prosperous condition the Liberals led us to suppose it would be placed in when they obtained power. The Leader said we were a slow-going people, that we had made no progress, and that we were without manufactures. But in the next breath he spoke in glowing terms of the progress in cheese and butter-making and lobstering. The Leader then told us that the delegation to England had resulted beneficially. But after reading the delegate's report in the Patriot and hearing Professor Robertson he (Mr. Birch) was led to believe that this delegation was an expensive luxury. Professor Robertson had gone to England on a similar mission. Mr. Dillon had also gone to England in the interests of the darling industry and did everything that mortal man could do to promote this work. Regarding eggs he thought that Auld Bro's and J. A. Farquharson would look after these prices, and that Carvel Bros and the Messrs. Matheson would look after the oat market. He felt that if Mr. Wise had not "kicked" he would not have been sent to England.

Mr. Birch did not think the people were under any obligation to the Minister of Agriculture for sending Professors Robertson and Macoun here. They are servants of the people and are fulfilling the duties of their office. The offices which these men fill were created by the Conservatives years ago.

A good deal is heard regarding the prosperity of Canada and the great ability of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his Government. The same was said regarding the Government of Hon. Alex. McKeuzie. But what are the facts? Canada hardly knew she was living until Sir John A. Macdonald took hold and since then she has gone ahead by leaps and bounds. Canada is today reaping the benefit of Sir John's labor.

To bring the Doukhobors into Canada cost from \$150 to \$200 each. The young men of the provinces should receive some such encouragement to stay at home and build up their own country instead of flocking to the United States. But the Government evidently prefers to encourage the Doukhobors. There are a class of men who would not raise a hand in the defence of their country, and they are not the class we should like to see enjoying the best parts of our territory.

We are told that it is the intention to establish an experimental station, and that the farmers of the province are to be shown how to grow crops of all kinds. He thought it was time these stations were in operation if they are to be established here.

The Leader showed that the expenditure on ferries next year would be \$20,000 while the Attorney General said it would be only \$17,000. The debt of the province at the present time is \$536,000, yet we found the government adding \$400,000 to it. The Opposition did its duty with regard to this expenditure and refused to sanction it. He (Mr. Birch) was not, opposed to the Belfast railway. He would be glad to see both the railway and bridge, but our people should not be called upon to pay \$400,000 or an annual interest of \$12,000 to build a roadway across the Hillsborough.

The Leader said it was the intention to build the annex to the asylum and to begin the work very soon. He hoped the Government would see their way clear to recoup Mr. Lowe for the property he had placed on the ground. It was a disgrace to the Legislature that any honest, hardworking man should be treated as Mr. Lowe had been.

Mr. Birch trusted that the educational system would be carried out more effectively, and that the \$129,000 to be expended would be well spent. He hoped that the Education Office would be raised (Continued on page 5.)

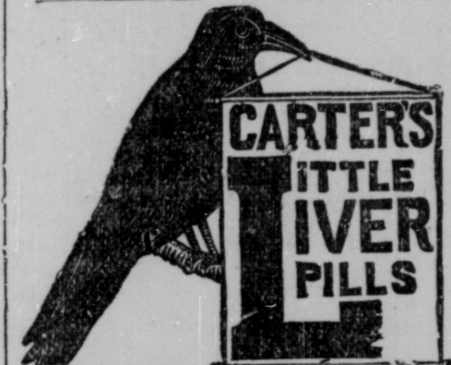

## Antarctic Exploration.

NEW YORK, May 8.—Capt. Thomas of the steamer Coys, which arrived yesterday from the South American ports, reported having talked with Frederick Cook of the Belgica Antarctic expedition at Montevideo. He quoted Dr. Cook of having said: "We have had a most interesting voyage from a scientific standpoint. For several days we were in total darkness, and the climate was intensely cold. We lost two men from our crew of seventeen, one from sickness, and one who fell overboard. We were exploring Alexander Land when we got stuck in the ice.

"When the Belgica was running to the straits," said Captain Thomas, "she went ashore off Beagle channel, south of Terra Del Fuego, but no damage was done. Dr. Cook had not heard a word of any war news or any other news for eighteen months. He was very much surprised to hear about the Spanish war, and I supplied him with all the newspapers I had

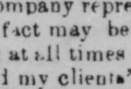

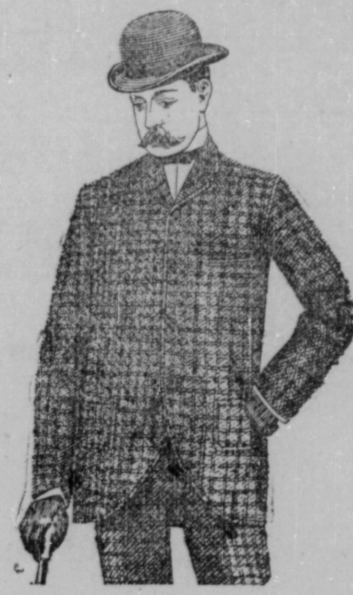
