FOR HALIFAX.—The steamer Princess Beatrice sailed on return to Halifax at half-past four last afternoon, with a cargo of lobsters, pork and potatoes. Mr. A. H. Macpherson, Miss Katie Campbell, Miss Blanche Benoit, Mr. A. D. McArthur and two Sisters of Charity went as passengers.

FOR BOSTON.—The steamer Carroll, Captain Brown, sailed for Boston at six o'clock last evening, with a cargo consisting of about 1300 cases eggs, 122 brls. mackerel, and a quantity of general merchandize. The passengers were: Annie McInnes, D. C. Stewart, Mr. Foster, W. J. Hayes, Mrs. Harris, J. F. Harris, J. P. SUPREME COURT.—At the adjourned meeting of the Court on Monday next the only business entertained will be the hearing of applications for rules nisi for new trials arising out of causes heard in Trinity term at Georgetown. Arguments will stand over until a future day, to which the court will then adjourn—probably the 22nd September. During the month of August there will be only one day—Tuesday of each week—for business at Judges Chambers, viz: on the 5th, 12th, 19th, and 26th of August.

ASSISTING AN AMERICAN.—Application has been made to the Minister of Customs by the collector at Pictou for permission to allow the wrecked American fishing schooner Caroline Vought, which has not a modus vivendi license, now undergoing repairs at that port, to ship a crew and take in stone ballast and provisions for the homeward voyage. Permission was granted with the caution that the vessel is not to be allowed to take enough supplies for a fishing voyage instead of a homeward trip, the case, moreover, not to be considered a precedent.

I. O. O. F. NOTES.—Halifax Canton of Waterville, Maine, will, it is expected, make a pilgrimage to St. John early in September.

A Chicago despatch says work has been commenced on the enormous amphitheatre that is to be used during the celebration of Patriarchs Militant and Oddfellows, August 3 to 10. The structure occupies three blocks in Lake Front park, and will seat 25,000 people. Fifty thousand Oddfellows are expected, 15,000 of whom will be uniformed Patriarchs Militant.

SHIPPERS ATTENTION.—The special attention of shippers is directed to the advertisement of the Halifax and West India Steamship Line, which appears elsewhere in to-day's issue. One of the steamships of this line, the Alpha, will sail from Halifax on the 15th of each month, calling at Bermuda, Turk's Island and Kingston, Jamaica. The Alpha has excellent freight and passenger accommodation and the rates are low. The Beta will sail from the same port for Havana on the 15th of each month. She also has excellent freight and passenger accommodation. Through bills of lading from Charlottetown will be issued by Mr. W. W. Clarke, the agent here.

A BIG RACE.—The great professional four-cared race at Duluth, Michigan, on the 22nd, was won by the Hamm-Ten Eyck crew, composed of Albert Hamm, J. G. Gaudaur, John McKay, and J. Ten Eyck. Hanlan's crew, consisting of George Hosmer, Hugh Wise, John Toemer and Edward Hanlan, was second. The course was three miles with a turn. The time was: Hamm's crew, 18 06; Hanlan's, 18 08; Erie, 18 31. If the water had been smoother after the turn, all the world's rowing oarsmen say the race was the most exciting ever rowed, the difference between the leaders at the finish being about three-quarters of a length.

KENSINGTON HALL.—A service of song was held in this hall last evening. Several choruses were well rendered by the choir. Solos, duets, and a quartette were sung by Misses Minnie Moore, Amy Moore, Carrie P. Moore and Masara. J. R. Davison, Frank Beer and Colin Moore, all of whom acquitted themselves in first rate style, and to the entire satisfaction of the large audience assembled. During the interval, Mr. Sutcliffe delivered an address taking for his subject the Ivy plant. We understand that a similar service will be held in the same hall in the course of a few days.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

STEAMER ASHORE.

Valuable Cargo Imperilled.

GASPE, Que., July 24. The steamer Idaho went ashore on the southwest point of Anticosti yesterday, and is now awaiting tugs and lighters which have been sent from Quebec. The last reports were to the effect that the rocks had pierced some of the plates, and that her fore compartments are full of water. It is proposed to land her cargo of live stock, consisting of 268 head of cattle and 85 sheep, and then discharge her cargo, consisting of 40,000 boxes of cheese. The Idaho is a new steamship of 4,000 tons capacity, launched last fall, and was making her second trip under the flag of the Dominion Line when she ran ashore. She belongs to Pinky & Sons of Liverpool. She sailed from Montreal for Bristol on Monday morning, and was in charge of a pilot at the time of the accident. Her cargo is valued at one million dollars, mostly insured, and the ship is valued at \$250,000.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, July 24.

Application has been received at the Militia Department from a number of young men in Toronto, asking permission to organize a naval volunteer company in that city. As the Minister is away from the capital at present, nothing will be done in the matter until his return.

Fifty tenders have been received for the work of enlarging the St. Lawrence Canal. The Dominion Bridge Co., of Montreal, has a misunderstanding with the Department of Customs, arising out of entries of iron for bridge construction, afterwards devoted to building purposes.

Public Opinion in Newfoundland.

HALIFAX, July 24.

Newfoundland papers received here to-night contain some spicy references to Governor O'Brien's failure to work up a bill in honor of the visit of Admiral Watson, General Sir John Ross and officers of the fleet. This is regarded as a triumph for the people, and an expression of their feelings at the action of the Imperial Government in forcing the modus vivendi with France upon the colony.

Movements of the Military.

HALIFAX, July 24.

The First Battalion of the Leicestershire Regiment now at Bermuda, which has been ordered to relieve the West Riding Regiment on this garrison, did garrison duty here in 1758 and again in 1783. It is reported that the 88th Royal Regiment will also be ordered here from Aldershot in the fall. The Grenadier Guards will likely only remain at Bermuda one year when they will be ordered to Halifax.

Another Explorer Married.

NEW YORK, July 24.

Colonel Chaille Long, an African explorer, was married at Crown Point on the 16th inst., to Marie E. Hammond, daughter of the late General John Hammond. Colonel Chaille Long and his bride sailed for Europe yesterday on the Western Land.

Strike Ended.

NEW YORK, July 24.

The cloak operator's strike is settled. The manufacturers have agreed to everything demanded by the strikers, who will probably go to work in the morning.

Bank Discounts.

FREDERICTON, N. B., July 24.

After August 1st the city banks give notice that a discount of one-half of one per cent. will be charged on American silver.

Arch-Bishopal Conference.

BOSTON, July 24.

The Archbishops of the United States are at present in Boston holding their annual meeting and the conference.

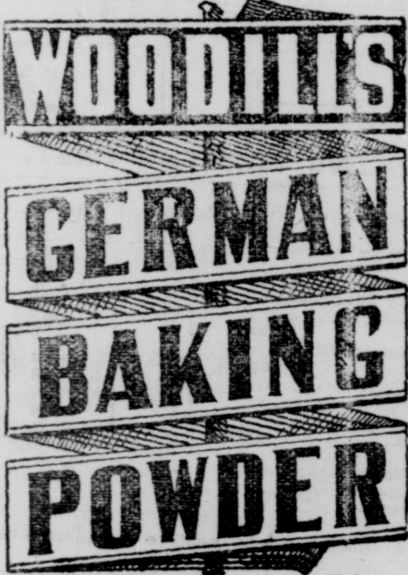
