

Local Trade Board Asks Revision In Potato Tariff

A resolution urging upon the Federal authorities the necessity of correcting the unfair situation immediately whereby United States potatoes enter Canada duty free, was passed at a general dinner meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade held at the Charlottetown Hotel last night.

The resolution followed the submission of a report of their attendance at a meeting in Summerside on Tuesday, with representatives from each Board of Trade in the province, by E.D. Reid and Robert Eorden.

Neil A. Matheson, M.P. referring to an informal tariff discussion at Ottawa last February by officials of various departments, said "the people there have been impressed by various representations made on the potato tariff. It must be understood that the question of tariffs is a complicated one and all resolutions on the potato situation should be approximately the same."

Ben E. Rogers, reporting on his attendance at the Maritime Board of Trade meeting recently held at Moncton commended Lincoln Dewar and C.M. MacLean for the splendid impression they made on the delegates as they took part in the panel discussions.

Quoting from a report submitted by the President of the Maritime Board, Mr. Rogers said: "The whole structure of American economy is based on the ability of the nation to produce surplus quantities of quality foods at low cost. Canada must recognize our deficiencies and take action to stem the rapidly rising flow of consumer dollars to American producers. New Brunswick, P.E.I. and Western Nova Scotia producers of these areas will be valuable Canadian resources as we demonstrate our willingness to be a quantity and quality supplier of products."

W.R. Brennan spoke of his attendance at the recent meeting of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce held in Quebec and stressed the value of contact with Chamber of Commerce matters at the national level.

L. Storey reviewed the activities of the metropolitan area committee to date and touched briefly on the tentative program for the immediate future.

Other matters discussed at the meeting included the appointment in mail distribution at the new Post Office as compared with the old. It was claimed that the air mail arriving at 7:40 a.m. at Charlottetown airport is not sorted or placed in the boxes until 10:15 a.m. On making enquiries, Mr. Frank Curtis was told by clerks that (a) they are not yet familiar with the position of the various boxes and (b) lack of necessary help—evidently two or three more men could be employed.

Mr. C.F. Bentley spoke of the unavailability of spare keys and A.B. Cutcliffe brought up the question of an outside mail chute. The conflicting use of doors at the main entrance was also mentioned.

The bureau said harvesting of all but a small proportion of Canada's field crops now has been completed, helped by good weather during most of October.

The fine weather was credited with increases from the mid-September forecast in all crops except corn, soybeans, sunflower seed and sugar beets.

Revised estimates of all-Canada production of other major grains, with bracketed figures on mid-September forecasts and last year's production, respectively:

Oats, 535,394,000 bushels (512,744,000 and 407,783,000); barley, 277,782,000 (275,511,000 and 255, and 14,764,000); mixed grains 69,014,000 (65,118,000 and 65,950,000); flaxseed 34,993,000 (34,057,000 and 19,748,000).

The prairie wheat crop was estimated at 516,000,000 bushels, up from the previous forecast of 490,000,000 and a bigger gain over the 472,000,000 bushels produced last year.

Wednesday's figures are based on reports from the field received on or about Oct. 15.
