THE TROOPS HAVE CROSSED THE VAAL

Official Announcement From London

The Boers Thought to be Preparing for a Fight at Laing's Nek, But There is Little Known of Their Plans or Movements.

SPECIAL DESPATCH TO THE EXAMINER.

NEAR THE VAAL.

LONDON, May 26, 3.30 a. m.—The latest intelligence from Lord Roberts' headquarters at Vredfort station, filed on Thursday at 5.45 p. m., was that the British were rapidly advancing.

General Hamilton had effected a junction with Lord Roberts.

The country in front of them was clear of the Boers to Viljoen's Drift.

The Boers were evacuating all their positions south of the Vaal River and 5,000 had already crossed to the north bank.

General French's cavalry is already reconnoitering the fords of the Vaal.

The War Office observers expect that the next despatch from the field marshal will be dated in sight of the Transvaal frontier.

Bennet Barleigh wiring to the Telegraph from Vredfort on Thursday evening says: "Lord Roberts would doubtless cross the Vaal on Saturday or Sunday."

"While the British, in overwhelming force, are thus rapidly approaching the Transvaal, the movements of the Boers are enveloped in mystery."

The Daily Mail, in a second edition, publishes the following despatch, dated Friday, from New Castle:

"President Steyn is reported to be at Velde, where the Free Staters are concentrating preparatory to moving to join the commandos now at Laing's Nek."

"Little opposition is expected on this side of Velkeestnek."

"Occasional rifle shots are exchanged with Laing's Nek outposts."

ACROSS THE VAAL.

LONDON, May 26.—It is officially announced that the British have crossed the Vaal River.

BRITISH OPINION.

Large Accession to Liberal-Unionist Party.

LONDON, May 26.—The election for a member of the House of Commons to represent South Manchester in the place of the Marquis of Lorne who resigned when he assumed the title Duke of Argyll and who has gone to the House of Lords was fought on a khaki platform and resulted in a very large increase of the Unionist vote, Hon. William Peel, the Unionist candidate being returned. The result of the voting was as follows: Peel, 5,497; Lieut. Jones, Radical and pro-Boer, 3,458; Unionist majority, 2,039. At the previous election the vote stood: Marquis of Lorne, Liberal-Unionist, 4,457; Sir Henry Roscoe, Home ruler, 4,379; Liberal-Unionist majority 78.

IN SOUTH AFRICA.

F. McRae Writes—At One Time Only Nine Islanders Were Fit for Service.

Some letters have arrived from Fred B. McRae, dated from April 1st to April 23rd, in which he states he is in hospital. He left the 19th Brigade Field Hospital, Bloemfontein, for Naauport on April 20th. At that time there were 1800 cases of fever in Bloemfontein.

Describing the hospital arrangements at Naauport he says the tents are large and square, with floors. Each contains eight beds, a table, bench and eight wardrobes. Every bed is provided with plenty clothes and each patient receives a complete new suit for use while in the hospital. It consists of blue pants and coat, underclothing, muffler, socks and shoes. Everything is kept in apple pie order, and the doctors and nurses are most attentive.

When Private McRae was at Naauport there were about 1,000 other cases there. He was very near being sent to Cape Town, and could have easily gone; but wished to rejoin the Canadians, and the doctor did not press him. Private James Walker was in the same tent as he, with an affliction of the lungs. On the 23rd the patients were moved into new quarters. The convalescents on the 22nd had an open air feast—the first in five months for Private McRae. Lady Henry Bentinck was one of the waitresses. Besides her there were a great many of the nobility nursing. While at the table a photo for English papers was taken of the patients in which Private McRae had a good position.

The letters state that on March 31st when the R. C. R. marched out of Bloemfontein for Bushman's Kop, 14 miles, only nine Islanders were equal to the task. The others who were not killed or wounded were either sick or footsore.

Mr. J. Thomas Wright, of West River, brother of Mr. Arthur Wright, has been a resident of South Africa for many years. At the outbreak of the war he enlisted in the Colonial Imperial Light Infantry and has since been with General Buller, taking part in Spion Kop and other engagements previous to the relief of Ladysmith. In a letter to his brother he details some of the experiences of a soldier, the labours, sufferings, privations and hair-breadth escapes. But through all he has been in good health and spirits, untouched except by a few passing bullets which left mere scratches. Concerning the corps in which Mr. Wright has been fighting, we extract the following from Bennet Barleigh's graphic account of the Spion Kop engagement:

"The Colonial Imperial Light Infantry went into action upon Spion Kop at 9 a. m., and remained upon the mountain until 8 p. m. Out of 350 men they had 39 killed and 90 wounded, including among the latter a brother of your correspondent, Mr. Falconer, who was struck with a piece of shell. Most of these volunteers were all Ulstermen, and at least six of them, whose bodies were afterwards discovered, had been clubbed to death by the Boers. Two of those slaughtered in this way—Corporal Weldon and Private Daddon—were ex-Pretoria men. Lieutenant Kudall, of the I. L. I., whilst leading the reliefs towards the right about 11 a. m., was hit and killed by a pom-pom shell."

We may add that the I. L. I. distinguished itself no less conspicuously at the severe fighting at Pieter's Hill, on Majuba Day (27th February), on which occasion, among other casualties, their major (C. D. Hay) was severely wounded, and the corps was in the front fighting line, and materially assisted in carrying the day.
