Cases Adjudged At Georgetown

GEORGETOWN—A number of cases were adjourned yesterday when defence counsel were unavoidably detained and unable to attend court here before Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C. J. Arthur McGuigan, deputy attorney general, represented the Crown in all cases.

Alfred Roland Moore, Whim Road, represented by Kenneth B. Macdonald had two charges adjourned to May 22. They were a charge of impaired driving and a charge of having liquor in a place other than his residence. Venie Louis Henderson, Greek River, represented by J.P. Nicholson, had a charge of selling liquor and a charge of possession of liquor in a place other than his residence both adjourned to May 22.

A charge of assault against Clifford Gerard MacQuellan, Georgetown, was withdrawn by the informant, his wife. Lloyd Penna Sanderson, New Perth, represented by Mr. Nicholson and charged with driving while his license was suspended had his case adjourned to May 15 at Souris.

P.A. McLean, Georgetown, was fined \$100 and costs for driving while his ability was impaired by alcohol. Benedict Joseph Teak, Road, represented by Mr. Nicholson, was fined \$25 and costs for having liquor not purchased from a vendor. Charles Hampton Isborne, Murray Harbor, who previously pleaded guilty to having liquor not purchased from a vendor had his case adjourned to May 15 at Souris.

Guy Alexander Stewart, Petter River, charged with having liquor in a place other than his residence had the charge against him withdrawn. One man was fined \$20 on each of two charges of being intoxicated in a public place. For the same offence two others were each fined \$20 and costs. Six others were each fined \$20 and costs for having liquor in a place other than his residence.

Under the highway traffic section of the court, Wilbur L. May, Mr. Stewart, was fined \$50 and costs for driving while his license was suspended, and James Stephen Murphy, Sturgeon, was fined \$10 and costs for failing to provide for vehicle re-inspection. Douglas Charles MacMaster, Grandview, was each fined \$10 and costs for driving without due care and attention. V. Warner Martin, Brudenell and Dorothy Katherine Murphy, Sturgeon, were each fined \$10 and costs for permitting an unlicensed driver to drive.

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Potato Prices Higher; Holdover About Same

A strengthened potato market, with prices quoted at \$1.30 to \$1.25 to the farmer for the contents, was reported here yesterday and there was optimism that the balance of the crop will be cleaned up, though there was some difference of opinion on the quantity of potatoes left. One man suggested the holdover at this time would be 20 to 25 per cent less than the 2,847 cars that moved after May 1 in the last crop year. There were 2,386 cars moved in the period May 1 to July 31 in the 1962 crop year, it was learned from the office of the Provincial Potato Marketing Board.
But several other shippers suggested the number of potatoes remaining in the province at the

present time would be about the same as a year ago. The quality was reported to be exceptionally good.
There was no suggestion, though, that prices are likely to go much higher. Maine stocks are too heavy to permit such a development, one shipper said.
There were 10,417 carloads moved from the province to the end of April this year, reported Agriculture Minister Andrew MacIvor, who said shipments were up slightly more than 500 cars over the same time a year ago.
There were 13,417 carloads moved from the province in the last crop year, which was considerably more than the 11,267 cars moved for the crop year 1960-61.
