Queen Backs Co-operation By Britain With Continent

BRUSSELS (Reuters) — The Queen has thrown her prestige behind moves to bring Britain into closer co-operation with Continental Europe.

"The days when the nations of Europe could afford to maintain a complete independence from each other have long since passed," the Queen said at a state banquet on the first day of a state visit to Belgium.

Alluding discreetly to the issue of Britain's joining Europe's six-nation Common Market, the Queen said: "Like so many things in life, the desirable is not always immediately attainable, but I join with you in hoping that a way may be found before long to enable us, and all other European countries who wish to do so, to co-operate in building that wider European unity which is in the interest of us all."

Belgium has been one of the strongest advocates of British membership of the Common Market, which seemed near to becoming reality early in 1963, when President de Gaulle of France virtually vetoed further negotiations. "Today we all recognize that developments in the rest of the world have made it vital for our future that we should become interdependent and work more closely together," the Queen said.

Earlier a small group of Rhodesian tourists staged a pro-Rhodesian demonstration as thousands of Belgians cheered the Queen. Just before the Queen and Prince Philip came out of the town hall after being officially welcomed to the Belgian capital, a small placard appeared above the heads of the crowd reading: "God save (Rhodesian premier) Ian Smith."

At the same time, yellow leaflets were scattered with an inscription in French: "A pas les patites de la Rhodesia (Hands off Rhodesia)."

Police removed the placard and the incident went unnoticed by the royal party. Crowds cheered the Queen in three languages as she began a five-day state visit.


DONATE BLOOD

French Cuisine Enjoyed In Pleasant Atmosphere

One spring evening our guests, the Dominic Attridges, the Chef and I stepped into the quiet elegance of "Charles French Restaurant" in New York. We passed a huge stone urn filled with blossoming spring flowers, into the well-lighted dining room with its crystal chandeliers, sufficiency of table lights, quiet beige walls and beige carpeting.

Combine egg yolks and cream in a bowl and mix thoroughly. Beat a little of hot consommé into egg-cream mixture, then beat this into remaining hot consommé. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly. Do not boil. Add 3 tbsp. butter and 1/2 tsp. salt. Set aside. Snip off thick sorrel stems and discard. Chop leaves quite fine and slow-heat in remaining tbsp. of butter until slightly wilted. Stir into soup and serve immediately. Serves 6 to 10.

"Mr. Mike" the gracious manager and host conducted us to our table. Immediately we selected our hors d'oeuvres and beverage.

Note: If desired, use 1/2 c. each heavy cream and half 'n' half instead of 3 c. heavy cream.

CRABMEAT A LA DEWEY
2 tbsp. butter
1/2 lb. mushrooms, thin-sliced
1 green pepper cut into thin strips about 2" long
1/2 pimiento cut into thin short strips
1/2 c. sherry
2 lb. crabmeat cut bite-size
1 tsp. salt
1-16th tsp. cayenne pepper
3 c. cream sauce (basic recipe)
1/4 c. grated Swiss cheese
1/4 c. grated Parmesan cheese, divided

The waiters reflected the courteous attitude of "Mr. Mike". As each food was passed to be served directly on the plate, the waiter murmured "May-12". And if later on when you were talking to the person to your right a waiter came to replenish your coffee or wine, he didn't interrupt—just whispered a quiet "pardon" it was quite charming.

Melt butter in 2-qt. saucepan. Stir in mushrooms, green pepper and pimiento. Cook over low heat 10 min. Add sherry crabmeat, salt and cayenne.
