TROTTER AND PACER.

The meeting scheduled for July at Windsor, Ontario, has been postponed until August.

Mr. J. H. Weaver of Philadelphia has purchased the brown mare Madara, by Alcantara. The reported price is \$1,000.

Mr. Perry Stackhouse, the well known Kentucky trainer who was recently shot by Brock Payne, was not seriously injured.

Cough Honey, the bay gelding that won the 2:50 class for pacers at Carnegie, Pa., is by Progression and is driven by J. W. Sayles.

May Bloom, a 6-year-old bay mare by Patron, out of May Morning, by Daniel Lambert, won the 2:45 class for trotters at Rockport, O.

Rect, by Direct, is a 3-year-old trotter in Monroe Salisbury's stable that recently stepped a half in 1:06 1/4 in a race at Denver.

While being exercised recently at Nicholasville, Ky., a 3-year-old filly by Pamlico reared and fell backward, breaking her neck.

The great brood mare Boadicea, by Hambletonian, died recently in foaling at the Patchen Wilkes farm, Lexington.—Turf, Field and Farm.

Trainer John Tilden recently drove Ella T over the Red Oak (Ia.) mile track in 2:11 1/4. Tilden is now in the central New York circuit.

Trainer Harry Nethaway has evidently got a fast campaigner in the bay mare Florence C. At Rockport, O., recently she won the 2:28 class for pacers in straight heats in 2:22 1/2, 2:25, 2:22.

Senator A. 2:10, has thus far been given no fast miles by his owner and driver, Clarence Alexander. Senator A is a horse that comes to his speed slowly and is always best the latter end of the season.

TREES AND LUMBER.

The Spanish yew is a heavy wood, a cubic foot weighing 50.43 pounds.

"Doatiness" is a speckled stain appearing on the bark or wood of a tree.

"Brash" wood is porous, of a reddish color, very friable and regarded as a sign of age and decay.

Lumbermen say that the best times of the year for felling timber are mid-winter and midsummer.

"Dry rot" is the putrefaction of the vegetable albumen in wood and can be prevented only by some process of hardening or extracting this element.

The best process of seasoning is that accomplished by placing lumber under dry sheds, leaving it entirely open to ventilation, but protected from rain.

The time for seasoning wood varies very greatly, extending from weeks in the case of some timbers to many months or years in the case of hard, dense wood.

Timber is best hardened and preserved by withdrawing its fluid constituents, hardening its albumen and filling the cells as far as possible with antiseptic preparations.

As a rule trees which grow in moist ground produce wood that is more sappy and less durable than those which grow on dry earth. To this rule, however, there are several notable exceptions.—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.
